

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## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL.

April 29, 1872.

In accordance with the provisions of the Society's Charter, the Council have the pleasure of submitting to the approbation of the Fellows their forty-third Annual Report

upon the progress of the Society.

This, in conformity with former Reports, they have divided into three heads, the first of which relates to the general condition of the Society, the second to the operations carried on at the Office in Hanover Square, and the last to the state of the establishment in the Regent's Park.

# I. GENERAL CONDITION OF THE SOCIETY.

# 1. STATE OF THE ROLL OF MEMBERS.

# a. Fellows and Annual Subscribers.

The number of Fellows, Fellows Elect, and Annual Subscribers at the close of the year 1871 amounted to 3047. Of these there were:—

The corresponding number of Fellows, Fellows Elect, and Annual Subscribers on the 31st of December 1870 was 3021, showing a net increase of 26 Members during the year. ### 2. STATE OF THE FINANCES.

#### a. Income.

The total Income of the Society received during the year 1871 was £24,620 11s. 5d., exceeding that of the previous year by the sum of £1362 17s. 8d. The following Table will show the various sources whence this Income proceeded, and the corresponding amounts received under the same heads in 1870:—

giving an average annual Income of £23,232.

It thus appears that the Income of the past year has exceeded the average of the eight years immediately pre-

ceding it by the sum of £1388.

The Council can point with particular gratification to the steady annual increase of the amount realized by the admission of the public on week-days to the Society's Gardens, which still continues. In 1871 the sum received under this head was £13,813 4s., being £608 5s. 6d. more than the corresponding amount received in 1870, and considerably exceeding the sum thus received in any of the last eight years, as will be seen by the subjoined Table:—

The large increase of the amount realized by the "Compositions" paid in lieu of Annual Subscriptions is also a noticeable feature in the Table of Income for 1871.

# b. Expenditure.

The balance of £968 6s. 1d. carried over from 1870 added to the Income of 1871, gave a total of £25,588 17s. 6d. available for the expenditure of 1871. This sum was disposed of in the following manner. The sum of £21,367 19s. 9d. was required for the ordinary Expenditure of the Society. The sum of £669 9s. 10d. was devoted to extraordinary Expenditure. This raised the total expenditure for the year 1871 to £22,037 9s. 7d. The sum of £1506 5s. 0d. was devoted to repayment of the prin-

cipal and interest of a temporary loan effected with the Bankers of the Society in December 1870, and the sum of £916 5s. 0d. was invested in the purchase of £1000 Reduced 3 per Cents. This left a balance of £1128 17s. 11d. at the Society's Bankers on the 31st of December last, which was carried forward for the benefit of the present year's account.

The subjoined Table gives the various items of expenditure paid during the year 1871, and a comparison of them with the amounts paid under the corresponding heads in

Deducting the increase from the decrease, it will be seen that the expenditure of 1871 was less than that of 1870

by the amount of £2371 2s. 2d.

This reduced expenditure arose from the following causes:—In 1871 the ordinary expenditure of the Society, under which head is included every item required for the maintenance of the Society's whole establishment in a perfect state of efficiency, required the sum of £21,367 19s. 9d. The corresponding amount for 1870 was £21,364 12s. 10d., showing an increase of only £3 6s. 11d. against

the year 1871.

The ordinary expenditure of the two years may therefore be for all practical purposes considered as identical. But the extraordinary expenditure of 1871 (or amount devoted to new buildings in the Society's Gardens, and to other items of the nature usually charged to account of capital) was less by £2374 9s. 1d. than in 1870. The extraordinary expenditure of 1871 amounted in fact to £669 9s. 10d. only, consisting of certain items of special expenditure on the Garden establishment, which are fully explained in the 3rd section of the Report.

#### c. Davis Fund.

The item of £58 11s. 10d. placed under expenditure as the "interest of the Davis Bequest" requires some further explanation from the Council.

As mentioned in the last Anniversary Report, the Society's receipts during the year 1870 were increased by a legacy of £2000, left to them by the late Alfred Davis, Esq., F.Z.S.

The following are the exact terms of Mr. Davis's

bequest:—

"To the Zoological Society of London the sum of Two Thousand pounds, such sum to form a Perpetual Fund, the Income from which is to be applied to, or to the creation of, Annual Prizes, or any other purpose which may seem to the Council or governing body of the Society most conducive to its interests."

After payment of the Legacy Duty of 10 per cent., the sum handed over to the Society by Mr. Davis's executors, in respect of this Legacy, was £1800. This was invested by the Council in the purchase of £1994 9s. 2d. Consols,

After carefully considering various ways in which it might be proposed to expend this sum in the interests of zoological science, in accordance with the primary objects contemplated by their Charter, the Council determined to give the interest of the Davis fund for 1871 to the "Zoological Record Association." This Association was instituted in 1871 for the purpose of publishing a series of annual reports containing a complete index of the zoological literature of each year—an object acknowledged by all naturalists to be of primary importance as regards the progress of zoology, but one which cannot be carried on, at any rate for several years, so as to render it self-supporting.

#### d. Reserve Funds.

The Society's principal Reserve Fund now consists of a sum of £8000 3 per Cents Reduced instead of £7000, as it stood last year: the additional amount of £1000 of this stock having been purchased out of the Income of the Society in 1871 at a cost of £916 5s.

Besides this the Society are in possession of the sum of £1994 9s. 2d. Consols, obtained by the investment of the legacy left by the late Alfred Davis, Esq., as already

mentioned.

# e. Assets and Liabilities.

The Assets of the Society on the 31st of December 1871, and corresponding amounts on the 31st of December 1870, stand as follows:—

From this it appears that the Liabilities on the 1st of January of the present year (1872) were less by £1475 10s. 8d. than those of the corresponding date in 1870, while the Assets were greater by the sum of £892 6s. 8d.

# II. OFFICE, 11 HANOVER SQUARE.

### 1. Scientific Meetings.

The Scientific Meetings have been regularly held on the first and third Tuesdays of the month during the year 1871. Of the 161 different communications on various zoological subjects made to them during the year, 113 were from Fellows, 7 from Foreign Members, and 27 from Corresponding Members of the Society; the remaining 14 papers were from individuals not belonging to the Society, and were communicated to it by the Secretary or by other Members. The corresponding number of communications in the year 1870 was 165.

These communications were submitted to the Committee of Publication, by whom the following orders were made respecting them. Seven were ordered to be printed entire in the 'Transactions' of the Society, and 154 in the 'Proceedings,' such illustrations being in every case allowed as the Committee considered necessary for the purpose. Of ten of the communications, abstracts or extracts were considered to be sufficient for publication, while 39 were ordered to be simply noticed in the Society's 'Proceedings.'

### 2. Scientific Publications.

The third and last part of the volume of 'Proceedings' for 1871 has been completed and issued to the Subscribers. The whole volume for 1871 contains upwards of 800 pages, and is illustrated by 76 plates (mostly coloured) and a large number of woodcuts.

The first part of the 'Proceedings' for the present year is nearly complete, and will be ready for issue very shortly.

#### 3. LIBRARY.

Mr. R. B. Sharpe, the Society's Librarian, having tendered his resignation, in order to be able to devote more time to several important works on ornithology which he has in progress, the Council accepted it with regret, and appointed in his place Mr. A. Waterhouse, recently Assistant Librarian to the Geological Society.

Mr. Waterhouse is busily engaged in revising the proofs of the new Library Catalogue prepared by Mr. Sharpe, and hopes to be able to issue it in a complete state in a

few weeks.

The sum of £239 19s. 8d. has been devoted to the purchase of new zoological works for the Library during the

past year.

# III. GARDENS, REGENT'S PARK.

### 1. BUILDINGS AND WORKS.

The new Elephant-house having been finally completed in 1870 (with the exception of some slight additional works to the amount only of £39 14s. 5d., executed in 1871), the Council determined to proceed with the bridge over the Regent's Park canal, to connect the Society's grounds on the north bank with the present Gardens, this, as announced in their previous Reports, being considered to be the next special work which claimed attention. The Council had hoped and expected to have been able to commence this undertaking last summer, and had in fact actually entered into a provisional contract for its execution. But it was not possible to commence the work without the full approval of the Crown, as represented by the Government Board of Works, and also of the Regent's Canal Company, of the plans and specifications. The negotiations consequent upon this necessity caused great delay, and were not, in fact, brought to a final conclusion until about a month ago. All difficulties having been at length successfully surmounted, a contract for the erection of the bridge was entered into with Messrs. D. Cross and Son for the sum of £1295, and the works are now being rapidly proceeded with.

Under these circumstances the only special works executed in the Society's Gardens in 1871 were of quite a minor character, as will be seen by the following list, and involved only the expenditure of £669 9s. 10d.:—

The largest item, it will be observed (No. 5), is that of

the cost of two new water-mains, which were laid down during the past summer. One of these is a new supplymain from the engine in the North Gardens to the Reservoir at the extreme end of the South Gardens. Before this was made the supply from the Engine to the Reservoir was effected by the same main as the delivery to the Gardens, which produced many inconveniences. The second main was laid chiefly for the purpose of giving a direct delivery from the Reservoir to the Hippopotamus-pond, and was found necessary in consequence of the length of time required to fill that large basin by the old main.

Besides these items of a special expenditure, the sum of £2712 11s. 3d. was devoted to the ordinary maintenance and repair of the buildings in the Gardens during the year

1871.

#### 2. PROSECTOR'S DEPARTMENT.

Dr. James Murie, the Society's Prosector appointed in 1865, having tendered his resignation in March 1870 on the ground of ill-health, the Council thought it advisable to request him to continue nominally in his post, without requiring of him any of the ordinary duties of the office, for a further period of six months, in order to enable him to complete, ready for publication, if his state of health should permit, certain zoological memoirs intended for the Society's 'Transactions,' and containing the results of his examination of some important animals. This period having expired in the autumn of 1870, and Dr. Murie's memoirs having been completed, the Council thought it desirable to make a new appointment to the vacant Office, and, on the recommendation of the Zootomical Committee, have nominated Mr. Alfred Henry Garrod, B.A., Scholar of St. John's College, Cambridge, to the post.

Mr. Garrod entered upon his duties on the 1st of

January of the present year.

### 3. VISITORS.

The total number of visitors to the Society's Gardens during the year 1871 was 595,917, being 22,913 more than the corresponding number in 1870, as will be seen by the following Table:—

The greatest number of admissions in any one day in 1871 was 31,400; this took place on the 29th of May (Whit-Monday): the least (27) was on the 3rd of February. The average daily number of admissions throughout the year was 1632.

#### 4. MENAGERIE.

The number of animals of the first three classes of Vertebrates in the Society's Gardens at the close of the year 1871 was 2072, showing a slight decrease in comparison with the corresponding period of 1870, as will appear from the following Table:—

As regards the Society's Menagerie, the most interesting event that took place in 1871 was the birth of the first young Hippopotamus on the 14th February. The male

Hippopotamus in the Society's Gardens was received by the Society as a present from the then Viceroy of Egypt in May 1850. The female was obtained from the same source four years later; but although the pair have been kept together for the last eighteen years, no symptoms of the female being likely to produce young were ever observed until the autumn of 1870. All that is worthy of record of the mode of birth, and of the endeavours made to preserve the young one, have been duly recorded in some notes on this event prepared by the Superintendent, Mr. Bartlett, which will be found in the Society's 'Proceedings' for the past year. It having unfortunately been impossible to exhibit the young Hippopotamus while alive, it was thought advisable to have its skin carefully mounted. This, together with a plaster cast of the little animal prepared and presented by Mr. F. Buckland, F.Z.S., have been placed for exhibition in a recess of the Giraffe-house, while the skeleton and various preparations of the internal organs have been preserved in the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons.

The Council regret to have to add that a second young Hippopotamus, born in the Gardens early in the present year, was likewise lost shortly after its birth. They have, however, ordered certain alterations to be made in the house assigned to the female Hippopotamus, which will, they trust, render it more easy to get access to the animal, and, in the event of a third interesting occurrence of this nature, allow the young one to be easily removed, and

brought up by hand.

The total number of registered additions to the Society's

Menagerie in 1871 was 1180.

The most remarkable accessions to the collection during the year 1871 were as follows:—

## January 1871.

1. A living specimen of the Kakapo, or Ground-parrot of New Zealand (Strigops habroptilus), presented by D. L. Murdoch, Esq., of Auckland, New Zealand.

2. Two Derbyan Screamers (Chauna derbiana), imported from Santa Martha by one of the Royal Mail Steampacket

Company's vessels.

3. An Annulated Snake (Leptodira annulata) from Panama. This is a well-known Central-American species,

but has not been previously exhibited alive in the Society's

Menagerie.

4. A pair of the Splendid Grass-Parrakeet (Euphema splendida, Gould, B. of Austr. v. pl. 42). These are believed to be the first examples of this beautiful Grass-Parrakeet ever brought alive to this country.

## February 1871.

Amongst the additions almost the only one of special interest was two pairs of a small West-African Finch (Spermestes fringilloides), purchased February 14th. The birth of the young Hippopotamus, which occurred February 21st, has been already alluded to.

## March 1871.

1. A Squirrel from Acapulco, in Western Mexico, presented March 2nd by Lieut. G. R. Bromley, R.N., which appears to agree best with *Sciurus castanonotus* of Baird.

2. A young male Cape Hunting Dog (Lycaon pictus), purchased March 15th. This peculiar Carnivore has not been represented in the Society's collection for many years.

3. Two male Amherst's Pheasants (Thaumalea amherstiæ), purchased March 18th, being the first examples of this splendid Pheasant acquired alive by the Society, although others have been previously received "on deposit."

4. A Civet Cat (Viverra) from Quiah, north of the Cameroons River, purchased March 27th, which may perhaps

belong to an undescribed species.

## April 1871.

1. A female of the new Deer which was lately described and figured as Cervus alfredi (P.Z. S. 1870, pl. xxviii.), received in exchange April 1st. This animal closely resembles the male in general appearance (except in the absence of horns), and is of very great interest, as confirming the validity of the species.

2. A second young one of the Collared Fruit-bat (Cynonycteris collaris), born in the Gardens, April 7th, and produced by the same pair as the former one, born in

February last year.

3. A young female Spider Monkey, purchased April 11th. This animal was obtained at Colon by an officer of the R. West-Indian Mail Co., is believed to belong to an undescribed species proposed to be called Ateles rufiventris.

4. A Geoffroy's Marmoset (Midas geoffroyii), purchased April 11th, having been brought from Colon along with

the Ateles just mentioned.

5. Four Nose-horned Vipers (Vipera nasicornis, Shaw), presented by William Cleaver, Esq., of Cape-Coast Castle,

West Africa, April 13th.

6. A Rat-tailed Serpent from Sta. Lucia (Trigono-cephalus lanceolatus), presented by G. W. Des Vœux, Esq., C.M.Z.S., Administrator of the Government of the island. We are not aware that any example of this much-dreaded scourge of the West-India Islands has been previously brought to England alive.

7. Two Kiwis, purchased April 14th, one being of the ordinary species Apteryx australis, and the other Apteryx owenni. As there remained only a single specimen of Apteryx (of the latter species) living in the Society's collection, this addition to our series is a very acceptable one.

8. A Bay Lynx (Felis rufa), said to have been brought

from Mexico, purchased April 15th.

9. A pair of the little Hanging-Parrakeet of the Phi-

lippines (Loriculus culacissi), purchased April 24th.

10. An example of the Blue-crowned Parrot (Tany-gnathus luconensis) of the same islands. Both these beautiful species are new and welcome additions to the Society's extensive collection of living Parrots.

# May 1871.

1. Three specimens of a rather scarce and remarkable Water-Tortoise (Sternothærus subniger), purchased May 3rd out of a vessel coming from Madagascar.

2. A pair of the White-eared Fruit-bat of India (Cynopterus marginatus), purchased May 4th out of a collection

of living animals brought from Calcutta.

3. Two Marmots (Arctomys), also purchased at the same date. These animals are said to have been brought down to Calcutta by the Bhotanese, who conveyed a large number of Tragopans (Ceriornis melanocephala) from the Himalayas. They appear to be referable to A. bobac, the

Siberian Marmot, and are quite new to the Society's collection.

4. A Lory, apparently of a new species, described by the Secretary as Lorius tibialis.

5. A rare Lorikeet, believed to be referable to Tricho-

glossus mitchelli, G. R. Gray.

6. Three Crowned Partridges (Rollulus coronatus) from Malacca.

7. Four Black-throated Hill-Partridges (Arboricola torqueola) from the Himalayas.

8. A Long-billed Francolin (Rhizothera longirostris)

from Malacca.

9. A Monteiro's Galago, purchased May 5th, and said

to have been brought from Port Natal.

10. A young male Chimpanzee (Troglodytes niger), brought home for us on his return from Africa and presented by Mr. J. J. Monteiro, C.M.Z.S.

11. A Land-Tortoise of the genus Cinixys, also presented by Mr. Monteiro. It appears to agree in every respect with specimens of Cinixys belliana in the British

Museum, except in having a divided caudal plate.

12. A young Lemur, born in the Society's gardens on the 7th of May. Its mother was one of the so-called Black-fronted Lemurs (Lemur nigrifrons, Geoffr.); and its male parent must have been one of our Red-cheeked Lemurs (Lemur collaris, Geoffr.).

13. A young male of the peculiar Bovine type of the island of Celebes, the Anoa (Anoa depressicornis), obtained by purchase of the Zoological Gardens of Rotterdam on the 10th of May, and being the first specimen of this

animal exhibited in the Society's collection.

14. A young Eagle from the port of Fow-Chow in China, purchased May 11th. This bird is in the striated plumage which has been usually attributed to the young of A. imperialis.

15. A selection from a collection of animals brought from Santiago, Chili, by Mr. Weisshaupt, consisting of the following animals, acquired at a total cost of £136:-

1 Long-haired Armadillo (Dasypus vellerosus) from Men-

doza.

4 Buenos-Ayres Cow-birds (Molothrus bonariensis) from Mendoza.

2 Chilian Starlings (Curæus aterrimus) from Chili.

- 2 Long-winged Milvagos (Milvago megalopterus) from Chili.
  - 2 Chilian Swans (Cygnus coscoroba) from Chili.
  - 2 Andean Geese (Bernicla melanoptera) from Chili. 2 Dominican Gulls (Larus dominicanus) from Chili.
- 5 Rufescent Teguexins (Teius rufescens, sp. nov.) from Mendoza.

Of these, the Dasypus vellerosus, Bernicla melanoptera, Milvago megalopterus, and Tejus rufescens were species new to the Society's collection.

16. A Tamandua Ant-eater (Tamandua tetradactyla, Linn.) from the vicinity of Santa Marta, purchased

May 29th.

17. Two examples of the peculiar Short-winged Rail of Lord Howe's Island, which have been lately described in the Society's 'Proceedings' as Ocydromus sylvestris. For our specimens of this singular bird, as well as for many rarities previously received, we have to thank our excellent friend and correspondent Dr. George Bennett, F.Z.S., of Sydney, N.S.W., and the authorities of the Botanic Gardens of that city.

June 1871.

1. Two Turtledoves (*Turtur aldabranus*) from Aldabra Island, an atoll lying between Madagascar and the Seychelles, presented to the Society by Mr. Edward Newton, C.M.Z.S., Colonial Secretary, Mauritius, June 10th.

2. A Nisnas Monkey (Cercopithecus pyrrhonotus, Ehr.) from Southern Nubia, presented by Col. the Hon. P.

Fielding, June 16th.

3. Two examples of a fine large species of Tortoise of the genus *Platemys*, from the fresh waters of the Argentine Republic, presented by our late active correspondent Mr. Geo. Wilks, of Buenos Ayres, June 17th.

4. Three young Imperial Eagles from Southern Spain,

presented by Major Howard Irby, June 24th.

5. A second specimen of the Tamandua Ant-eater (Tamandua tetradactyla), probably from Brazil, purchased of a dealer in Liverpool, June 27th.

July 1871.

1. Three Daubenton's Curassows (Crax daubentoni) from Tucacas in Venezuela, presented July 11th by Mr. A. Warmington.

- 2. A collection of Ceylonese animals, brought home on his return from Ceylon and presented to the Society by Mr. E. W. H. Holdsworth, F.Z.S., July 17th. It embraced examples of the following species, mostly new to the Society's collection:—
  - 1 Paddy-field Deer (Cervus porcinus, var.).

1 Bacha Eagle (Spilornis bacha).

2 Ceylonese Spur-fowl (Galloperdix ceylonensis).

4 Indian Crows (Corvus splendens). 1 Russell's Viper (Vipera russelli).

3. An example of the Long-nosed Crocodile of Western Africa, Crocodilus (sive Mecistops) cataphractus, purchased

July 19th.

4. Six Dorsal Squirrels (Sciurus dorsalis, Gray), purchased July 20th. These and some previously acquired examples of this beautiful species have been placed in one large cage together, and there are great hopes that they will breed with us.

### August 1871.

1. A third specimen of the Tamandua Ant-eater (Tamandua tetradactyla), probably from Brazil, obtained by purchase August 7th.

2. Two Bonteboks (Damalis pygarga), purchased August 11th, being the only examples of this beautiful Ante-

lope that have reached us for the last twenty years.

3. Two Peruvian Thicknees (Œdicnemus superciliaris, Tsch.), presented by the Baron de Rivière, August 14th.

4. Three specimens of a Land-Tortoise of the genus Cinixys, which seem to be referable to Home's Cinixys (Cinixys homeana, Bell). These Tortoises were brought home by H.E. Governor Ussher on his recent return to this country, and presented by him and Staff-Surgeon Mosse jointly to the Society.

5. A young male specimen of Baird's Tapir (Tapirus bairdi) from Nicaragua, purchased August 15th, being the first example of this newly discovered Mammal that has

yet reached us.

6. A specimen of the singular little mud-inhabiting fish of New Zealand, being an aberrant form of the family Galaxiidæ recently described by Dr. Günther as Neochanna apoda, presented August 18th by the Acclimatization So-

ciety of Canterbury, New Zealand. Unfortunately it did

not live long in our Gardens.

7. Two Frigate or Man-of-War Birds (Fregata aquila), which arrived August 28th, having been forwarded to us by our excellent friend and correspondent Capt. John M. Dow, F.Z.S., who is always on the look out for something that may prove acceptable to the Society's collection.

### September 1871.

1. A Javan Fish-Owl (Ketupa javanensis), purchased September 8th, being the first example of this well-marked

genus of Owls obtained by the Society.

2. A young bird of the South-American Flamingo (*Phænicopterus igni-palliatus*), received by one of the Brazilian Mail-steamers from Buenos Ayres, and believed to have been forwarded to the Society by their late energetic correspondent Mr. George Wilks of Buenos Ayres, since unfortunately deceased.

3. A rare Iguana, presented to the Society by Mr. J. B. Rowe, and stated to have been brought from the Chincha Islands. But Dr. Günther, who has examined it, refers it

to Metopoceros cornutus, Wagler, of St. Domingo.

4. A young Kaup's Cassowary, obtained by exchange from the Zoological Society of Amsterdam, September 20th.

5. A young female Ibex (Capra picta), from the Island of Crete, presented to the Society, September 30th, by T. B. Sandwith, Esq., H.B.M. Consul for that island.

# October 1871.

- 1. A collection of animals from Chili, purchased (as on two former occasions, from Mr. Weisshaupt) on October 4th. This consisted of the following animals:—
  - 2 Andean Geese (Bernicla melanoptera).
  - 2 Magellanic Geese (Chloëphaga magellanica).

1 Chiloe Wigeon (Mareca chiloensis).

2 Chilian Teal (Querquedula flavirostris).

9 Pampas Cats (Felis passerum).
1 Spectacled Bear (Ureus ornatus)

1 Spectacled Bear (Ursus ornatus).

Of these, the Chilian Teal and the Spectacled Bear (which has been deposited with the Society for safe custody

since the 16th of May, 1871) are new to the Society's collection.

2. A Cape Eared Seal (Otaria pusilla), presented by H.E. Sir Henry Barkly, C.M.Z.S., October 5th. Sir Henry Barkly, having obtained three living examples of this species at Cape Town, sent them home to the Society by the steamship 'Norseman,' under the kind care of Capt. Coxwell; but only one of these survived to reach the Society's Gardens.

### November 1871.

1. Maleo bird (Megacephalon maleo), presented by Capt.

Parish, R.N., November 6th.

Capt. Parish obtained this rare Celebean bird in St. Helena out of a vessel coming from Java. Only upon one previous occasion has the species been before exhibited in the Society's Gardens; and that was many years ago.

2. A male Chinese Pucras (*Pucrasia xanthospila*), presented by the Duke of Wellington, K.G., November 10th.

3. Two Grey Seals (Halichærus grypus), purchased November 11th, through the kind agency of Mr. Samuel Williams of St. David's, Pembrokeshire. Though the Grey Seal is said to be not uncommon on some parts of the British coast, we have never previously succeeded in obtaining living specimens of it.

4. A fine young male Sæmmerring's Antelope (Gazella sæmmerringii), presented by Charles M'Iver, jun., Esq., on

the 29th of November.

Mr. M'Iver states that this animal was obtained in the desert about 100 miles south of Suez.

## December 1871.

1. A Cuvier's Toucan (Ramphastos cuvieri), purchased December 14th, being the first example of this fine species received alive by the Society.

2. A Grey-winged Blackbird (Turdus pæcilopterus, Vigors), brought from Cashmere, and presented to the

Society by Mrs. W. A. Ross, December 21st.

3. A young female Prince-Alfred's Deer, born in the Gardens December 27th, having been bred between the male presented by the Duke of Edinburgh May 5th, 1870, and the female obtained in exchange April 1st, 1871.

The acquisition of both sexes of a Cervus previously unknown to science, and its propagation in our Gardens, must be regarded as occurrences of special interest.

As regards the former view, the fact of the Society's Gardens having been the resort of nearly 600,000 visitors in the past year is sufficient proof that their unrivalled collection of living animals is fully appreciated as a source of instruction and recreation, and that the arrangements under which it is opened to public inspection are such as to render it an agreeable resort.

At the same time the Council believe that the more strictly scientific branches of the Society's affairs have by no means suffered from this popularity, but have, in fact, gained much by the increase of income thus produced. The Society's publications are the medium whereby most of our leading naturalists seek to make the results of their labours known to science, and the Library has become the resort of many

of the working zoologists of the metropolis.

The acquisition of so many rare and singular animals as have been lately received not only serves to keep the public interest in the Society's living collection alive, but is also highly beneficial to science, as ultimately furnishing specimens for the principal Museums of Zoology and Comparative Anatomy, and providing the materials from which many of the most valuable memoirs published in the Society's 'Proceedings' and 'Transactions' are elaborated.

In conclusion the Auditors beg to express their thorough approval and satisfaction with the perfectly clear and accurate manner in which the accounts have been arranged and laid before them by the Society's accountant Mr. Leigh.
