# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year 1906.

### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

THE Seventy-eighth Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Monday, April 29th, 1907. The Chair will be taken at 4 p.m. at the Rooms of the Society, 3, Hanover Square.

In accordance with the alteration made in the By-laws of the Society in 1904, this Report and the Report of the Committee of Auditors which accompanies it are issued to the Fellows before the Annual General Meeting.

PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

(By-Laws, Chapter VII., Sections 1, 2, as amended August 18th, 1904.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

Sect. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows:—

- 1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual Meeting.
- 2. The Appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
- 3. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously issued to Fellows.

- 4. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- 5. Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

# STATE OF THE ROLL OF MEMBERS.

The number of Fellows and Fellows Elect on the 1st of

# SCIENTIFIC WORK OF THE SOCIETY.

According to the terms of the Charter, the Society exists not only for "the introduction of new and curious subjects of the Animal Kingdom," but for the "advancement of Zoology and Animal Physiology." In addition to maintaining the Gardens for the education, study and pleasure of those interested in Zoology, the Society takes a share in the advancement of knowledge in more direct modes. At its evening Scientific Meetings, interesting zoological specimens are exhibited, and communications are read giving the results of the zoological investigations of a large number of scientific men at home and abroad, the more important of these being published in the 'Proceedings' By its support of the annual and 'Transactions.' 'Record of Zoological Literature' (now to be incorporated with the zoological portion of the 'International Catalogue of Scientific Literature'), it provides Zoologists with an invaluable aid to their work. The library of the Society is so useful to Zoologists that several have become Fellows, with no other object than to take advantage of it Through the Prosectorial Department at the Gardens, scientific use is made of the bodies of animals that have died. Of these, many go to enrich the collections in museums; others are used for anatomical study, whilst others are preserved to provide material for further research. Recent investigations have shown that parasites play a special rôle in the transmission of many diseases, and in the last two years great attention has been paid to the collection and examination of the rich material at the gardens. The Pathological Department has the primary function of supplying information that may be useful in raising the general health of the animals at the Gardens and in detecting preventable causes of death, but it is hoped that it may help also in the scientific study of disease.

### SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.

To the thirteen meetings for the despatch of scientific business held in the Society's Rooms in Hanover Square in 1906, 120 communications were made. Of these, 96 were from Fellows and 4 from Corresponding Members. The remaining 20 papers were from individuals not belonging to the Society, and were communicated to it by the Secretary or by other Fellows. The corresponding number of communications in the year 1905 was 132.

These communications were submitted to the Committee of Publication, by which 76 were ordered to be printed in the 'Proceedings,' and 1 in the 'Transactions,' such illustrations being in each case allowed as the Committee considered necessary for the purpose. Of the remaining communications abstracts or extracts were considered to be sufficient for publication.

### SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS.

## Proceedings.

As announced in the Report for 1900, the 'Proceedings' of the year are now issued in two volumes, each of which contains two parts. Beginning with 1906, the two volumes have consecutive pagination throughout.

#### Garden Guide.

The 'Official Guide to the Society's Gardens,' written by the present Secretary, consists of 112 pages, with 50 illustrations, a Plan of the Gardens, and a Railway and Street Map showing modes of access from different parts of London. The Guide is printed by Messrs. Bradbury, Agnew and Co.; it is published by the Society at the Offices, 3, Hanover Square, and sold there and at the Gardens at the price of sixpence in paper covers, or one shilling bound in art-cloth cover. The copyright and the profits of sale belong to the Society. Since 1903, when the first edition was published, 128,133 copies have been sold. The fifth edition, with 50 new illustrations from photographs taken by Mr. W. P. Dando, F.Z.S., Mr. Henry Irving, and Mr. B. L. Medland, will be on sale before this Report is issued.

A Special "Guide to the Prince of Wales' Indian Collection" written by Mr. Frank Finn, F.Z.S., with an introduction by the Secretary, and illustrated with 15 reproductions of photographs taken by Mr. W. P. Dando, F.Z.S., was issued early in June, and was disposed of by

sale and distribution.

Post Cards.—Pictorial Postcards made from illustrations in the Guide were on sale during the year, and have met with great approval from the public.

Upwards of 300,000 of these Postcards of the animals

have been sold during the past three years.

A series of 12 coloured Pictorial Postcards has been arranged for, and, it is expected, will be on sale before this Report is issued.

## LIBRARY.

The Library, under the superintendence of Mr. F. H Waterhouse, the Society's Librarian, was maintained in

good order throughout the year and has been much resorted to by working naturalists. Altogether 2,100 visits were paid to it by Fellows and persons introduced by them. About 1,690 volumes were borrowed from it under the usual regulations.

#### PROSECTORIAL DEPARTMENT.

The Prosector of the Society, Mr. F. E. Beddard, M.A., F.R.S., reports as follows:—

The work carried out in the Prosectorium may be considered, as in former reports, under four heads, viz., (1.) Anatomical Research carried on in the Laboratory. (2.) Material supplied for purposes of Research or to Museums. (3.) Preservation of Material for future use. (4.) Information given to various persons upon Zoological matters.

# (1.) Anatomical Research carried out in the Laboratory.

The Prosector has during the past year dissected a large number of the animals, particularly Mammalia and Reptiles, which have died in the Menagerie during the period. The results of the investigations into the structure of these animals are partly embodied in a long series of papers communicated to the Society and published in the 'Proceedings.' The amount of matter communicated by the Prosector to the four parts of the 'Proceedings' which appeared during the year 1906 amounts to about oneseventh of the whole; and the proportion which these contributions bear to memoirs upon anatomical subjects communicated by others to the 'Proceedings' is very much Dr. Sambon has carried out a great deal of work upon the parasites of the animals which have died in the Menagerie, and has accumulated much material for study.

# (2.) Materials supplied for purposes of Research and to Museums.

The Prosector has been able to assist a number of workers in Zoology with material for their researches. A series of thymus glands from many mammals has been forwarded to Prof. Noel Paton, some mammalian brains

to Dr. Mott, F.R.S., the placentas of two zebras and of the Javan chevrotain to Dr. Assheton, and a marsupial spinal cord to Dr. Ninian Bruce. Specimens have been sent to the British Museum and to the Bristol Museum, and a number of anatomical preparations to the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons. Some of the last illustrate new facts communicated by the Prosector to the Society. During the year, some papers have been published which were based upon material supplied to the authors by the Prosector. Among these are a memoir upon the internal ear of certain animals, by Dr. Gray, in the 'Proceedings' of the Royal Society, a detailed account of certain parts of the heart in a series of mammals by Dr. Keith and a colleague, whilst a memoir by Mr. L. Crawshay, which was written as the result of anatomical work carried out in the Prosectorium and elsewhere, has been accepted by the Society for publication.

# (3.) Preservation of material for future use.

Some additions have been made to the gradually increasing stock of spirit or formol preserved material for the future use of the Prosector or of others.

## (4.) Information given to various persons upon Zoological matters.

A number of letters have been written and verbal information given by the Prosector to persons enquiring upon zoological matters. The Prosector also has examined and reported upon collections of Oligochæta sent for this purpose by the British Museum, the Museum Christiania, and several private individuals. Three of the contributions to the 'Proceedings' made by the Prosector during the past year refer to such material.

Dr. C. G. Seligmann, F.Z.S., the Society's pathologist, has continued to study the causes of deaths at the Gardens. His detailed observations are preserved in permanent form at the Prosectorium, and his "Report on the Deaths" during 1906 was read at the Scientific Meeting of the Society on February 19th, 1907, and will be published in full in Part I. of the 'Proceedings' for

1907.

# THE GARDENS, REGENT'S PARK.

THE PRINCE OF WALES' INDIAN COLLECTION.

The most important event of the year was the exhibition, in the North Garden, of a fine collection of Indian animals. In the course of his tour in India in 1905 and 1906 H.R.H. The Prince of Wales, Vice-Patron of the Society, had arranged to visit the native State of Nepal. The Government of Nepal and His Highness Maharajah Sir Chandra Shum Shere Jung, R.B., G.C.S.I., had made a representative collection of the fauna of Nepal for presentation to His Royal Highness. The Prince of Wales, following the generous example of His Majesty The King, Patron of the Society, who, on returning from India in 1876, sent a magnificent collection of animals to our Gardens, telegraphed to London, asking if the Society would arrange to receive The Zoological Society and exhibit the collection. accepted the offer with the greatest pleasure, and our President, the Duke of Bedford, added to a long series of gifts to the Society, by promising to defray the heavy cost of transport to London. Mr. Arthur Thomson, Assistant Superintendent of the Zoological Gardens, and Keeper J. Shelley at once proceeded to Calcutta, where, at the Zoological Gardens, by the kindness of the Calcutta Zoological Society, the animals were received on their arrival from Nepal. The collection left Calcutta on May 6th, by the S.S. "Tactician," in charge of Mr. Thomson, Shelley, and two native keepers, and arrived at Tilbury Docks on June 8th, 1906.

Owing to a severe outbreak of cholera, the visit of the Prince of Wales to Nepal had to be postponed and ultimately abandoned. On account of this inevitable delay, and also of the great heat in Calcutta, the original collection had suffered severely, a representative series of pheasants, for instance, being practically completely lost. On the voyage to London, however, thanks to the care of those in charge, there were very few deaths,

The Council decided to arrange for the separate exhibition of the Indian Collection during the summer of 1906. The most suitable site was a large area on the north bank of the canal within the boundaries of the Gardens, but, on account of its inaccessibility, not hitherto occupied. By a fortunate coincidence, the Primrose Hill Bridge over the Canal was about to be repaired, and H.M. Commissioners of Works, in the special circumstances, most kindly agreed to allow the bridge to be doubled and to give the Society a right of way over two small unoccupied portions of ground, so that there is now direct access across the Canal at each end of the Gardens to the newly laid-out area. The new part of the Gardens is to be called "The Prince of Wales' Ground," and it is hoped that in later years special collections from other parts of the Empire may be displayed therein. The Prince of Wales' Collection was thus not only a valuable addition to the Society's Menagerie, but was the direct means of a great permanent improvement to the Gardens.

The Indian Collection was inspected on June 13th, 1906, by the Prince and Princess of Wales, with Princes Edward and Albert, Princess Victoria, and suite. Their Royal Highnesses were received and conducted round the Gardens by the President of the Society, the Duke of Bedford, the Duchess of Bedford, the Secretary, and the Members of the Garden Committee. Immediately afterwards the exhibition was opened to the public, and continued to be a great attraction throughout the summer.

In connection with the Indian Exhibition, the Council wish to record the indebtedness of the Society to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, to the Government of Nepal and His Highness Maharajah

Sir Chandra Shum Shere Jung, to Major Manners Smith, British Resident in Nepal, to the Zoological Society of Calcutta and the officials at the Calcutta Zoological Gardens, to His Grace the Duke of Bedford, our President, and to the Right Hon. L. V. Harcourt, M.P., F.Z.S., H.M. First Commissioner of Works. Special gratuities were given to Mr. Arthur Thomson and Keeper Shelley for their efficient services in Calcutta and on the voyage home. The Council also wish to state their high appreciation of the ability shown by Mr. Young, the Head Gardener, in laying out the new ground under great pressure of time.

# NEW WORKS AND REPAIRS.

#### NORTH GARDEN.

New Canal Bridge.—This was erected by H.M. Office of Works in less than three months from the time when negotiations with regard to it were begun, so that it was ready for use before the Indian Collection was opened. The boundary of the Gardens passes through the middle line of the bridge, the outer half replacing the old public footway, whilst the inner half is for the service of our visitors. The Society paid to H.M. Office of Works the difference between the actual cost and the sum that would have been necessary to repair the original public bridge.

Canal Bank Fencing.—The dilapidated wooden fence along the north bank of the canal where it passes through the Gardens was replaced by a light iron railing.

Prince of Wales' Ground.—The old site was cleared of undergrowth and rubbish; the upper portion of the ground was levelled, and sheds and enclosures for the animals were erected; a number of new paths were cut and laid with gravel, and the sloping bank of the canal was trimmed and planted.

#### MIDDLE GARDEN.

NEW Paths.—The path in front of the Zebra House was carried through the new ground to the south end of the new bridge. Very extensive alterations were made between the canal and the back of the Zebra and Giraffe Houses involving the clearing of much rough ground, removal of old buildings, and cutting and laying new paths.

JAPANESE DEER YARD.—The old shelter was replaced by a new wooden structure.

MINOR REPAIRS.—The Elephant Yard and many of the smaller buildings were cleaned and painted. The office was cleaned and repapered.

#### SOUTH GARDEN.

Deer and Cattle Sheds.—This was the largest and most expensive alteration carried out during the year. The old cattle sheds and paddocks were cleared away, and a new range of buildings was erected parallel with the deer sheds. This was provided with a passage for visitors and fitted for cattle, each stall being supplied with a rack and an earthenware combined feeding and water trough, water being laid on to each compartment. The old deer sheds were re-roofed and refitted, and a covered passage for visitors provided. A set of large paddocks was formed round the new buildings. An illustration of the new deer and cattle sheds, from a photograph by Mr. B. L. Medland, appears with this Report.

New Bird-House.—As stated in the Report for 1905, Mr. C. Czarnikow, F.Z.S., made the generous donation of £1,000 towards the cost of erecting a house suitable for the exhibition of tropical birds, now inconveniently housed with the parrots and in the Insect House. After considerable delay, due to difficulties arising under the London Buildings Acts, the plans were finally approved by the London County Council in the course of 1906, and the new house is now completed. It consists of an iron framework with roof and walls of the fireproof materials known as "Uralite" and "Kentish slab." The walls are double, enclosing a large air space, and the floor is of

concrete. In the interior there are large flight cages on the two longer sides, and tiers of smaller cages on the end walls and along the centre. On the outside, along the south side, there is a range of open-air aviaries. Combined heating and ventilating is provided on the "Langfield" system, by which a current of filtered, warmed and moistened air passes through the interior. An illustration of the new House, from a photograph by Mr. B. L. Medland, is issued with this Report.

Monkey House.—The interior was thoroughly washed and cleaned, and the old wooden cages removed. The building was then disinfected, and the Council desire to record their appreciation of the advice and practical assistance given by Dr. M. H. Gordon, a specialist on ventilation and disinfection. The interior was repainted and new cages fitted. Combined heating and ventilation were arranged for from the apparatus provided for the new Bird House.

Lion House. — Formerly the only communication between the inner dens and the large outdoor cages along the north side of the house was by a single moveable gangway. To make it possible to give the lions and tigers a more ready access to the open air, several bridges across the service passage have been erected. Wooden shelters have been placed in the outdoor cages.

Antelope Paddock.—The large open paddock, begun in 1905, was completed early in the year and appears to be suitable for the animals and to give great pleasure to visitors.


THE OTTER POND.—A large enclosure, with ornamental rock-work, on the site of the old cage and some adjacent ground, was completed.

THE TUNNEL POND.—This was repaired and decorated with rock-work.

THE EASTERN AVIARY.—Extensive repairs were done, including re-wiring of the outer aviaries.

Anthropoid Ape-House.—Small out-door cages were provided for some of the smaller apes.

GREAT AVIARY.—This was re-painted. In the end of the year the birds were removed from it, a new drain was put in, and the soil was dug over and left for some time to be purified by exposure to light and air.

Tortoise House.—This was thoroughly repaired and re-painted.

MAIN DRAIN.—A new drain was laid along the broad walk, to replace a dilapidated old brick conduit.

MINOR REPAIRS.—Very many were carried out all over the Gardens, and although the number of works going on made it impossible to roll all the paths, many were drained and relaid.

Gardening Department.—Under the active and capable superintendence of Mr. Young, the Society's Head Gardener, in addition to the laying out of the new paths and new ground, much clearing was done and a very large number of new shrubs were planted. The floral display, for which the Gardens have for long been well known, was extremely successful.

### NEW WORKS IN PROGRESS.

Owing to the unexpectedly heavy nature of the operations of 1906, due to the changes connected with the Prince of Wales' Ground and the New Bridge coming in addition to the programme that had already been arranged, the Council do not propose to undertake any extensive operations in the year 1907. The general maintenance and restoration of the Gardens will be proceeded with; special attention will be given to the condition of the roads and paths; flight-cages are to be added to the Kestrels' and Kites' Cages, and it is possible that a small building for the exhibition of Falcons may be built. Many of the ponds will be referred, cleared of undergrowth, and planted with suitable grasses and reeds.

A large number of workmen and labourers have been employed from time to time for special works.

### VISITORS.

The total number of visitors to the Society's Gardens during the year 1906 amounted to 896,423, showing an increase of 180,943 visitors as compared with the previous year. This large attendance of visitors may be accounted for by the presence of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales' Collec-

tion of Indian Animals, and by the increased attractiveness of the Gardens generally, as well as by the fine weather which prevailed during the greater part of the year. Upon reference to the Table of Visitors (page 33) it will be found that the number admitted during the year 1906 has been exceeded only once before in the history of the Society, namely, in 1876, when His Majesty King Edward presented his Collection of Indian Animals to the Society's menagerie.

With the approval of a very large majority of the Fellows resident in this country, whose opinion had been taken by circular, the Council made the experiment of reducing the price of admission to the Gardens to sixpence for the Saturdays in August. Partly as a compensation for the probable crowding on Saturdays (on which days a large number of Fellows have always visited the Gardens) it was arranged to have a band playing on Thursday afternoons. The reduction of the price of admission was extensively advertised in the press and by means of bill-posters. Notwithstanding the fine weather and the special attraction of the Indian collection, no great advantage was taken of the reduced rate, and the Council do not propose, at present, to continue the experiment.

Of the total number of visitors in 1906, no less than 133,255 were admitted on Sundays.

Visitors paying at the turnstiles continued to show an increase, the number admitted in this way during the past year having been 645,939, or an increase of 140,367 as

compared with the year 1905.

The numbers of visitors on Bank Holidays are always interesting. Easter Monday is the best day of the year, and the numbers depend less on the weather than in the case of other Bank Holidays. The greatest number admitted to the Gardens on any one day occurred on Easter Monday, 1901, when 46,599 visitors passed the Turnstiles. The total number of visitors admitted upon the three principal Bank Holidays in 1906 amounted to 106,724, an increase of 15,439, as compared with the corresponding holidays of the previous year.

Special packets of School Excursion Tickets for the admission of 25 School Children (under 14 years of age) and one Teacher, may also be obtained for any fixed date (except Sunday) at the Society's Office, 3, Hanover Square, W., at the reduced price of eleven shillings (11s.) per packet.

CHEAP ORDERS for the admission of any number from 50 upwards of the children of Council or Grant-aided Schools to the Society's Gardens may be had undated for any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays.

The charge for an order to admit 50 Children and 2 Teachers is 5s., and additional numbers may be obtained at the same rate, viz., Children 1d. each, Teachers 5d. each.

There is an increase in some of these quantities as compared with the corresponding figures for 1905, due partly to there being more animals and partly to the rations of many having been raised. The addition in the case of fruit is due to there having been a larger number of frugivorous birds and small mammals, whilst the quantities of fruit and potatoes supplied to the monkeys were raised. The rice and preserved milk were required for the young elephant, the young Indian and African rhinoceroses and for the young hippopotamus. The larger number of sea-lions and the penguins account for the increased consumption of fish. Beef has been required partly because on one occasion the supply of horses failed, and because it has been found that the Siberian tigers, presented by the President, thrive better on beef than on horse-flesh.

## GENERAL CONDITION OF THE ANIMALS.

The general health of the collection has been good. The most serious loss was that of the large female giraffe, which had been in poor health for some time, but which

unfortunately was found to be pregnant. There has been a notable improvement in the health of the monkeys since the Monkey House was disinfected and repaired. None the less, the health of those kept in open-air cages without artificial heat has been markedly better than that

of the inhabitants of the houses.

Every opportunity has been taken to increase the space given to animals. Some experiments have been made with setting animals at liberty. Several kites have complete freedom, and may be seen hovering above the Gardens, to which they return to be fed. From time to time some of the grey squirrels have been allowed to leave the squirrels' enclosure, and some of these appear to be establishing themselves permanently in the Gardens. A private Committee has deposited a number of exotic pigeons and doves, chiefly from Australia; and after these have become habituated to be fed in the open, it is intended to allow them complete liberty.

#### STATE OF THE FINANCES.

The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1906 is issued to Fellows, bound at the end of this Report. In 1905, the Auditors, acting on the advice of Mr. W. B. Keen, Chartered Accountant, the professional Auditor of the Society, issued their Report on the finances of 1904 in a new form, replacing the old statement of Assets and Liabilities by a formal Balance Sheet, and the old statement of Receipts and Payments within the year by a proper dissection of Income and Expenditure belonging to the year. The Auditors of the Accounts of the year 1905, after discussion of the principles involved, continued the new system, and the same course has been followed this year by the Auditors dealing with the Accounts for 1906.

The total sum actually received within the year was £39,953 13s. 6d. On January 1st, 1906, the overdraft from 1905, amounting to £4,267 3s. 8d. (=Banker's Overdraft £4,347 15s. 6d. less £80 11s. 10d., cash in hand January 1st, 1906), was paid off thus leaving £35,686 9s. 10d. net receipts. In the course of the year, an alteration in the By-laws was made, raising the amount of the Composition in lieu of the annual subscription from £30 to £45 in the case of all Fellows elected after November 22nd, 1906. The Council decided not to treat these Compositions as income, as has been done in the case of the £30 Compounders, but to place them to a new Reserve Account. Accordingly, the sum of £135 received from three Compounders elected in December, 1906, was taken from income and placed to the New Composition

Fund, leaving £35,561 9s. 10d. for the purposes of the The money paid out amounted to £40,519 9s. 11d., thus leaving a deficit at the end of the year amounting to £4,968 0s. 1d. (=Banker's Overdraft £5,073 11s. 1d. less £105 11s. 0d., cash in hand on December 31st, 1906). The Overdraft has thus been increased by a sum of £701 16s. 5d., whilst a sum of over £9,000 has been spent out of income in the course of the year, on new works at the Gardens. Owing to the expenses connected with the New Bridge and the laying out of the North Bank coming after a heavy programme of new works had already been arranged, the Council had to pay, in one year, what normally would have been spread over two years, and accordingly it has been decided to undertake no extraordinary expenditure in 1907.

The increase in the item "Sundry Creditors" on the liability side is accidental. The December bills are not paid until January, and they were a little heavier in 1906 than in 1905. The Composition Fund (not separately invested) is a liability that will decrease annually henceforward, as the compositions of all Fellows elected after the end of 1906 will be put to a separate account. The two items under the heading Zoological Society are placed on the liability side to balance; the first sum is the new Composition Fund, the second is the balance of assets over liabilities at the end of the year, the increases in these sums representing improvement in the financial position of the Society.

The increase in the expenditure on provisions has already been referred to (p. 37). That on the cost and carriage of animals was due to the purchase of an African Rhinoceros and a young Hippopotamus at the end of the year. In the Menagerie expenses there was a serious increase in the consumption of water, due partly to the dryness of the summer months and partly to the new large ponds. A considerable amount of the expenditure on works was in reality extraordinary, and there should be a large decrease on this item in the current year.

#### CONCLUSION.

The Council can again congratulate the Fellows on the prosperous condition of the Society. The number of Fellows has increased, and the surplus of income over

ordinary expenditure is still larger than in 1905. As was anticipated in the Report last year, it was impossible to reduce the deficit in the course of the year, but very large permanent improvements have been made at the Gardens. Even if the income from gate money in the course of 1907 should revert to the average of ordinary years, the Council still expect to make a large reduction in the deficit at the end of 1907.

# REPORT

APPOINTED JANUARY 17TH, 1907.

The Committee of Auditors to the Zoological Society of London (with the assistance of the professional Auditor, who has certified the whole of the accounts in detail) having examined the books and accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1906, submit to the Society an abstract of the accounts, together with an estimate of the assets and liabilities at the close of the year.

It will be seen that the balance of ordinary income over ordinary expenditure has been £7,078. 9s. 11d., whilst against this there has been an extraordinary expenditure of £8,355. 11s. 2d., which has resulted in the Bank overdraft being increased by £725. 15s. 7d.

The ordinary expenditure includes the disbursements in connection with the Indian Collection presented by H.R.H. The Prince of Wales, and the purchase of a Rhinoceros and a Hippopotamus. The extraordinary expenditure includes the bridge over the Canal, new Cattle Sheds, etc.
