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### REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year ended 31st December, 1928.

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

1. The Council has pleasure in presenting its hundredth Annual Report to the General Meeting of the Society to be held on Monday, April 29th, 1929, at 4 p.m., at the Offices of the Society, in the Gardens, Regent's Park, N.W.8.

Only the necessary formal business on the Agenda will be taken in the Society's Meeting Room at the Gardens, and the Meeting will be adjourned to be resumed at 5 p.m., on the same day, at the Great Hall of University College, entrance in Gordon Street, W.C.1, kindly lent by the Provost, where it will become the Centenary Celebration Meeting of the Society. Tickets, not transferable, admitting a Fellow can be obtained from the Secretary of the Society, with, when special request is made in writing, an extra ticket for a friend. No seats will be reserved after 4.45. As the accommodation at the Gardens is limited, Fellows, unless they desire to raise questions on the Reports, should go direct to the Centenary Meeting. (See Paragraph 3.)

2. PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING. (By-law, Chapter VIII, Sections 1 and 2.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows:—

- 1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual Meeting.
- 2. The appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
- 3. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 4. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the Report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

Although the Zoological Society of London was founded in 1826, it did not receive its Royal Charter until 1829. Its Annual Meeting must take place on April 29th, or the nearest convenient day thereto, and must be held in the Rooms of the Society. It has been arranged, as stated in paragraph 1, to adjourn the Ordinary Annual General Meeting, when the routine business has been concluded, to University College Great Hall, where at 5 o'clock, the President will receive British and Foreign guests and Celebration speeches will be delivered. On the same evening the Society's guests will be entertained at dinner, past and present members of Council, of the Committee of Publication and of the Audit Committee acting as hosts, but paying for their own dinner tickets.

It has also been arranged to hold a function at which all the Fellows can join in the Centenary Celebration. This is to take the form of a Garden Party to be held at the Gardens of the Society, Regent's Park, from 8.15 p.m. to 11 p.m., on the evening of Thursday, June 20th.

A circular invitation will be posted in May to each Fellow, inviting him to apply for a ticket admitting him or herself and one guest. Fellows will be permitted to purchase not more than two additional tickets, for members of their family at 5s. each. The various Houses will be opened and light refreshments will be provided.

7. Corresponding Membership.—As described in the Annual Report for 1924 (Paragraph 5), the Society, on

the initiation of Council, formed a new class of Corresponding Members, with the object of giving some of the privileges of the Society to professional zoologists, especially those holding junior posts out of London, at the reduced subscription of £1 1s. a year and without entrance fee. Full particulars and proposal forms can be obtained from the Office.

The rules for Corresponding Members of the original class have not been altered. Candidates, who must not be resident in Great Britain or Ireland, are selected by Council usually at the November Meeting, and are afterwards submitted to ballot. They are persons of British or Foreign nationality who are either Zoologists of distinction, or have done the Society special service or have otherwise assisted in promoting its objects.

10. Ex-Enemy Corresponding Members.—During the war the names of Corresponding Members belonging to Nations then at war with this country were removed from the List in accordance with By-Law, Chapter VII, Section 4. As stated in the Annual Report for 1926 (par. 7), the Council decided in principle that the time had now come when members so removed might be restored to the List in accordance with the By-law, as vacancies occur, on their application to the Council. - 11. List of Fellows and Members.—A revised edition will be published during the Summer of 1929. Any corrections should be sent to the Secretary before April 30th, 1929.
- 12. Scientific Grants.—The Council made a donation of £10 to the National Trust towards the preservation of Wicken Fen, of £25 to the Society for the Protection of the European Bison, and of £2 to the British Correlating Committee for the Protection of Nature. A donation of £100 was promised to a Committee for the Exploration of the Great Barrier Reef; half was paid in 1928 and half is to be paid in 1929.
- 13. Loan of the Society's Rooms.—The Society's Rooms have been lent to a General Meeting of British Zoologists, The British Ornithologists' Union, The Avicultural Society, and the Society for the Protection of the Fauna of the Empire, to which also clerical assistance and office accommodation have been given.

THE FAUNA SOCIETY.—The Council commend the Society for the Protection of the Fauna of the Empire, mentioned in the last paragraph, to the notice of Fellows. There are few parts of the world in which modern firearms, modern facilities for travel, the spread of civilization and the extension of agriculture are not restricting the numbers and bringing danger even to the existence of wild animals. The objects of the Fauna Society are to collect information on, and to stimulate interest in, the preservation of wild animals, directly in the British Empire and by co-operation with similar Societies, in other countries. It pays special attention to the formation and maintenance of Reserves and Sanctuaries for Wild Animals. Fellows of the Zoological Society are invited to become members of the Fauna Society and so to extend its activities. The annual subscription is 10s. a year, and applications should be addressed to the Secretary of the Fauna Society, c/o The Zoological Society.

15. Scientific Meetings and Publications.—The Abstract was issued as usual. The Transactions, suspended during the war, have been resumed, the Council having given the Publication Committee power to re-open them for memoirs deemed of unusual scientific value, and requiring quarto illustrations. Volume XXI, of which the first and only issued Part appeared in 1916, has been left open to be completed as suitable memoirs may be accepted. Volume XXII is being devoted to a series of memoirs dealing with the zoological results of the Cambridge Expedition to the Suez Canal, 1924. Of this, Part I was published on December 15th, 1926; Part II on March 15th, 1927; Part III on July 1st, and Part IV on December 30th, 1927; Part V on June 30th, 1928; Part VI on January 28th, 1929.

Of the *Proceedings*, Part I, 1928, was issued on April 16th, 1928; Part II on July 18th, 1928; Part III on September 18th, 1928; and Part IV on January 31st, 1929.

The Council decided, at the request of the Publication Committee, to issue future volumes of the *Proceedings* 

beginning with 1929, in a larger size, to provide better for illustrations, and to make the volumes of the same format as those of many other scientific Societies.

16. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD.—The complete Volume, No. 64, dealing principally with the literature of 1927, was published on November 15th, 1928. It contains an Appendix with a List of Abbreviations with Titles of Periodical Publications containing papers dealing with matters of Zoological importance. The List was compiled by the Editor of the Record, with the kind assistance of Dr. S. A. Neave, at the end of 1927. The abbreviations are on the system devised in The World List of Scientific Periodicals, but are arranged in their own alphabetical order, not that of the Periodicals. The chief libraries in London containing the Periodicals are indicated by symbols following each entry. This List was published separately on February 17th, 1928, to be in time for the use of the Recorders of the separate Divisions. Of the latter, Echinoderma and Mollusca were published on June 8th, 1928; Insecta on July 23rd; Porifera, Vermes and Protochordata on July 25th; Brachipoda and Bryozoa on August 1st; Mammalia on August 16th; Aves on September 9th; Crustacea on September 22nd; Comprehensive Zoology, Protozoa, Pisces and Reptilia and Amphibia on October 5th; Cœlenterata and Arachnida on October 11th; and the List of New Genera and Sub-Genera on October 14th, 1928.

Volume 65, dealing with the literature of 1928, is in active preparation.

17. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD: PRICES.—On account of the greatly increased cost of production it has been found necessary to fix the price of the Annual Volumes, from Volume 58 onwards, at £3 (or Subscription price, paid in advance, £2 10s.). As it is recognised that many individual workers do not require the whole volume, it has been arranged to sell the separate Divisions, in paper covers, at the following prices:—

18. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD; FINANCE.—Beginning with Volume 59 (literature of 1922), the Society undertook to continue responsibility for the Record if its loss on each volume did not exceed the sum of £500. In response to an appeal, several Societies, Institutions and individuals interested in the continuation of the Record agreed to assist. Some made donations, and others, in accordance with what, at the time, was thought a useful form of support, "guaranteed" certain sums towards the loss on volumes. Experience has shewn, however, that a "guarantee" is a difficult form of support, as only an arbitrary date can be chosen for estimating the liability under the guarantee for any volume. Moreover, as was explained in the Annual Report for 1925, p. 11, the compilation and therefore the liability must be undertaken sometime before the volume can appear, and the receipts come in a considerable time after its publication.

It has been arranged, for the information of donors, to keep accounts of the Record, beginning with Vol. 59 (the first to which extraneous financial assistance was given), in the form of a "Zoological Record Fund" made up to the 31st of December each year. To this will be credited all receipts (subscriptions and sales of the current Volume and of other Volumes from 59 onwards) taken within the year, including the Society's own contribution of £500. From it will be deducted the cost of compilation (Editor, Recorders, Searchers and other expenses) and printers' bills. It is hoped that the Record Fund will eventually show a balance sufficient to cover the cost of an annual issue, thus providing "capital" for the concern. Societies, Institutions and individuals who wish the Record to be maintained, are requested to give

their support in the form of annual donations to the "Record Fund." It will be seen that because of a smaller number of contributions, and because of the increased size and cost of the volume, the Record Fund is now reduced from last year.

- 19. Garden Guide and Picture Post Cards.—The twenty-fifth edition of the Garden Guide was issued in 1928, and in the course of the year 79,619 copies were sold. On account of unexpectedly heavy sales the 25th edition was sold out before the end of the year and a new edition was prepared and issued. Arrangements have been made to keep the type standing during 1929. Since 1904, when the Guide became the property of the Society, 1,336,096 copies have been sold. Of the Aquarium Guide 3,759 copies, and of picture post-cards 319,973 were sold in 1928.

22. Card Catalogue.—The Librarian and his Assistant have made further progress with the Subject Card Index of the Works in the Society's Library. The Cards for the Geographical (Zoological) Card Index have been completed, and several sections are now available for reference.

- 23. Prosectorium.—This Department continues to do great service to the Society, directly by enquiries into the causes of death of animals in the collection, and indirectly by increasing knowledge in Anatomy, Pathology and Parasitology. Anatomical and pathological material has been distributed to many private workers and institutions.
- 24. Pathology—Change of Pathologist.—To the great loss of the Society, Dr. H. H. Scott, M.D., F.R.C.P., who had been Pathologist to the Society since January 1st, 1925, under an arrangement by which his Fellowship was financed jointly by the Society and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, resigned his post on May 31st, on his appointment to an important position under the Secretary of State for the Colonies. During his tenure of Office Dr. Scott gave valuable advice on the health and causes of disease of animals in the Collection, and made contributions to knowledge of comparative pathology by a series of investigations. The Council, on the advice of the Prosectorial Committee, arranged that in future the Pathologist should be entirely an officer of the Society, as although the assistance of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine had been of very great service, it seemed probable that as the work of that Institution progressed, the time of members of their staff would be fully occupied. After considering several candidates, the Council appointed Lt.-Colonel A. E. Hamerton, C.M.G., D.S.O., late R.A.M.C., as Pathologist to the Society. Dr. Zuckerman very kindly undertook the pathological work in the interim. Colonel Hamerton took up the duties of his post at the beginning of November, and has already done much useful work.
  - 25. Pathological Report.—Col. Hamerton reports:—

"The number of cases examined in the Prosectorium during the year was 1,195—of these 289 were Mammalian, 634 Avian and 272 Reptilian.

"The total is 158 in excess of the number of examinations made up to the last quarter of 1927, and represents the highest number of autopsies recorded during the last three years.

"540 or 45·1 per cent. of the total deaths recorded occurred within six months of arrival in the Gardens. The mortality, as usual, was highest amongst birds, and is 53·07 per cent. of the total deaths recorded.

"The 'average strength' of the Society's Collection (excluding Aquarium and Insect Houses) for 1928 is estimated at 4,003.33, and on this estimate the ratio of deaths for the year is 29.8 per cent.

"The deaths in mammals were 11 in excess of 1927, and in birds 160; but in reptiles, there were 13 fewer deaths in 1928 than in the preceding year.

"There has been no outbreak of epidemic disease.

"The increase in the deaths among mammals and birds is accounted for by the increase of the Collection, which was made practicable by the opening up of new buildings and extending the outdoor accommodation.

"The general and progressive improvement in the health of the menagerie as a whole has been maintained.

"The following remarks concerning important prevailing diseases may be of interest:—

"1. Tuberculosis.—An increase of 33 cases over the number recorded for 1927. The increase is, in part, due to the policy of weeding out and destroying animals affected with this disease as soon as the condition can be definitely diagnosed during life, and when the possibility of recovery is considered remote.

"The three Orang-utans, 'Micky,' 'Marcus' and 'Nellie,' who died within 9 months of their arrival in the Gardens, almost certainly contracted the disease before they came to London, and the same assumption applies to two cases of tuberculosis in Cercopithecus Monkeys that died about 3 months after their arrival in the Gardens. A simple test for tuberculosis in Apes and Monkeys is at present on trial.

"2. Enteritis.—This disease is especially prevalent amongst new arrivals, and the advent of substantial additions to the Collection during 1928 has considerably increased the number of cases recorded.

"Mr. Reginald Lovell, M.Sc., M.R.C.V.S., D.V.S.M., of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, has continued during the year his researches in the bacteriology of this disease, and has obtained results of considerable academic interest, and of practical utility in that they have indicated the preventive measures required.

"3. Pulmonary Diseases.—Pneumonia and capillary bronchitis have taken a heavy toll in deaths during the year. The incident was highest during the long spell of cold damp foggy weather in November and December, and new arrivals, especially small birds and reptiles, suffered most.

"4. Mycosis.—The number of cases is 22 in excess of that recorded for 1927, but is less than might be expected, considering the increase in the Collection of birds in which most of the cases occur.

"In birds the disease usually invades the body through the respiratory system whence it spreads to the thoracic and abdominal viscera, the tissue cells being strangled and replaced by a tangle of mould threads and spores. The onset of the disease is insidious and produces no symptoms in its early stages, and therefore early segregation of the infected is not practicable. In reptiles, however, the disease usually commences as a recognisable cutaneous lesion which in certain cases can be cured by treatment.

"5. Rickets and Allied Bone Defects.—A small increase in the number of deaths is mainly accounted for by the weeding out and destruction of inbred animals and birds that have been born in the Gardens, and become affected with grave bone disease. In the case of valuable animals the disease is treated by special antirachitic diet and artificial sunlight. Such treatment appears to have been beneficial in at least one instance.

- "6. Subjects of special pathological interest will be dealt with in a further Annual Report. They may, however, be mentioned briefly as follows:—
- "(1) Diseases of the Heart and Cardio-Vascular System number 50 and include 9 cases of endocarditis, in 3 of which the valves of the heart were affected; 4 cases of myocarditis, and 3 of rupture of the heart. 6 cases of pericarditis are not included.

"(2) New Growths.—Cases of Neoplastic disease have been fewer than in 1927. They include 7 cases of malignant growth in mammals, 2 in birds and 1 in a reptile.

"Applications for material for research from investigators in London and the Provinces have been met as heretofore, and valuable information has been given in return."

26. Anatomy. — Dr. Zuckerman, the Society's Anatomist, reports:—

"Research work has been carried out on the following subjects:—

- "1. The Spinal-Accessory Nerve in certain Ungulates.
- "2. A case of Placenta Prævia in a Rhesus Macaque.
- "3. The association of Anthracosis and Acid-fast Bacilli in the lungs of Birds.
- "4. Times of eruption of the teeth in the Chimpanzee.
- "5. The relationships between Body-weight, Brainweight, and Cranial Capacity in Mammals.

"A demonstration of specimens of animals preserved by a trade process involving the use of paraffin was made at a Scientific Meeting of the Society on the 20th November, 1928.

"During the year Anatomical material was prepared and sent to numerous Institutions and private workers."

27. Helminthology.—Professor R. T. Leiper, F.R.S., reports:—"The animals dying in the Gardens during the past year, with the exception of rare specimens reserved by the Anatomist for morphological studies, have been examined for parasitic entozoa. The material collected has been identified and reported upon periodically to the

Prosectorial Committee. The collection and identifications have been undertaken by a panel of parasitologists formed by the staff and associated workers of the Helminthological Department of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. The following have participated in the scheme:—Mr. J. J. C. Buckley, M.Sc., Dr. T. W. M. Cameron, M.R.C.V.S., D.Sc., Professor J. E. Guberlet, M.A., Ph.D., Professor R. T. Leiper, F.R.S., Miss J. Leishman, B.Sc., Mr. R. Lovell, M.R.C.V.S., M.Sc., Dr. D. Robertson, Ph.D."

- 28. Sanatorium.—This was refitted in 1922 as a quarantine station and a hospital for the treatment of sick animals. It is in charge of Dr. G. M. Vevers, the Superintendent of the Gardens, who receives valuable advice from Professor G. H. Wooldridge, F.Z.S., Honorary Consulting Veterinary Surgeon to the Society, and from the Curators.
- 29. Visitors to the Gardens in 1928 was 2,225,662, the largest in the history of the Society. The following Tables give comparative figures:—

30. Admission to the Gardens.—The Gardens are open daily throughout the year (except Christmas Day, when they are closed) from 9 a.m. until sunset, or 8 p.m., when sunset is later. The arrangements for admission are as follows:—

Fellows.—Every Fellow may enter with two visitors by signing his or her name in the Gate-Book, but is not entitled to admit more than two visitors in this way on the same day. The husband or wife of a Fellow may use this privilege in the absence of the Fellow, but both husband and wife may not admit visitors on the same day. Honorary, Foreign and Corresponding Members have personal admission only.

Fellows' Tickets.—Until further notice, Fellows, unless they have exercised the option stated in the next sentence, receive each year 40 undated green cards, available on any Sunday or weekday up to the end of January of the year following the year of issue, and also available for the Aquarium, and 20 white cards available on any weekday up to the same date. For 20 green tickets, however, they may receive a book of dated Sunday orders, each admitting two persons, but valid only for the actual days printed on them, and in exchange for twenty white tickets, a similar book of weekday orders, each valid only for the week printed on it.

Other Visitors.—On Sundays only when personally accompanied and signed for as above, or on presentation of tickets. Written messages or the visiting cards of Fellows cannot be accepted. On Week-Days, when personally accompanied and signed for as above; on presentation of tickets; or by payment. The prices for admission by payment are as follows:—

Mondays throughout the year, except Bank Holidays, 6d. each person.

Bank Holidays, 1s. each adult; 6d. each child under 12 years.

Other days, except Sundays, 1s. each adult; 6d. each child under 12 years.

Infants in arms are admitted free.

Excursion Party Rates.—Excursion Tickets for parties of not less than 25 persons for any fixed date (except Sunday) may be obtained upon previous application at the rates given below. Should the date chosen for the visit to the Gardens be found unsuitable, the tickets, upon being returned, will be re-dated for another day during the year of issue.

Payment for admission at the reduced prices cannot be accepted at the turnstiles.

All inquiries regarding reduced terms of admission should be made at the Secretary's Office.

Elementary Schools.—Cheap Orders for the admission from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. of Children from Elementary Council Schools on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday (except during Easter and Whitsun weeks) may be obtained for parties of not less than 25 Children and one Teacher at the rate of one penny each child and fivepence for each Teacher. There must be at least one Teacher to every 25 children. The Children, with their Teachers, must be out of the Gardens by 1 p.m. School orders admitting to the Aquarium on Tuesdays only between 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. are issued at the same price.

AQUARIUM: RULES FOR ADMISSION.—Experience continues to show that some restrictions on admission to the Aquarium are necessary, apart from finance, to prevent the crowded state from spoiling the pleasure of visitors. Since 1925, when Fellows were allowed to take two visitors with them on Sundays, the proportion of Sunday to Week-day visitors has been greater than in the year of opening. If all visitors to the Gardens on Sundays were also admitted to the Aquarium, the Fellows' day would be spoiled. Fellows are to retain their privilege of taking two visitors personally with them on Sundays, but if they desire to admit or to send others, they must provide them with additional green tickets or purchase tickets from the Office in advance for them. The Council arranged that from January 1st, 1929, a green ticket may be used for admission to the Aquarium. On Sundays, Fellows, therefore, by providing each friend with two green tickets secure for them admission both to the Gardens and the Aquarium.

The rules for admission to the Aquarium are therefore as follows:—

On Sundays, admission is restricted to Fellows who come in person and two friends whom they may take in with them, and to persons to whom they have given extra green tickets or for whom they have purchased Aquarium tickets in advance at 1s. each, but Fellows are requested to use this privilege sparingly.

Fellows may also purchase Aquarium ivory tickets for the sum of £10, valid for the duration of the Fellowship, and admitting two persons to the Aquarium on any day, Sunday or Week-day.

On Week-days Fellows have free personal admission; all others must be provided with Aquarium tickets or pay at the Aquarium turnstile 1s. each for adults, and 6d. each for children under 12, except on Mondays, not Bank Holidays, when the price will be 6d. for everyone. On Bank Holidays the price for adults is 1s. each and for children under 12, 6d. each.

33. AQUARIUM EXHIBITS.—The exhibits have been more numerous and varied than in any year since the opening of the institution. Numerous additions have been made to the Collection, including a number of brilliantly coloured tropical and semi-tropical specimens. Several consignments were received from Madeira, travelling in the permanent tank on board the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company's R.M.S. "Windsor Castle," built in 1927, in which the water can be circulated and kept at a uniform temperature.

A collection from the coast of Bermuda, presented by the Bermuda Aquarium, was received in June, and was brought back in a similar tank erected last year on board the s.s. "Changuinola," by kind permission of the owners, Messrs. Elders and Fyffes.

34. AQUARIUM RESEARCH.—Miss E. M. Brown, B.Sc., the Society's Aquarium Research Fellow, reports:—

"As a result of post mortem examinations of fish and invertebrates, a small collection of parasites has been made and a new species of Monogenetic Trematode was obtained. A description of this species of *Microcotyle*, together with a brief account of the genus and family, has cleared up some doubtful points in the general anatomy of the group and confirmed some of the older work. (P.Z.S., 1929, Pt. 1.)

"Material is available for the further study of Monogenetic Trematodes of the group Octocotylidæ.

"Observations have been made on variations in temperature, pH and salinity of the Aquarium sea-water circulation, and particular attention has been paid to the 'alkaline reserve' and its relations with the pH and CO<sub>2</sub> pressure of the water as these factors seem to be of paramount importance to the well-being of the animals, particularly the invertebrates. Determinations of this nature, together with estimations of oxygen, were carried out in the summer at the Marine Biological Laboratory at Plymouth, both on open sea-water and on water in use in the Plymouth Aquarium. These completed results, together with a discussion of their significance will, it is hoped, be submitted to the Society early this year.

"When the sea-water is renewed, samples are sent to the Laboratory before the main consignment reaches the Aquarium, in order to ensure that the new sea-water is satisfactory in every way.

"Preliminary experiments on the keeping of sea urchins under aquarium conditions have been carried out, and work with these and other invertebrates will be continued during the present year, with special reference to the effects on them of the pH, 'alkaline reserve' and oxygen content of the water."

35. Insect House.—During the year the Insect House, under the care of Mr. L. C. Bushby, has well maintained its interest to visitors to the Gardens. Representatives of many orders, not only of the Insecta, but of the Arachnida, Crustacea and Myriopoda also, have been exhibited. Interesting species from north African regions such as Algeria, Tunisia, etc., have been shown and have been found to do well in captivity. Gambian Land Crabs, Wood Ants and the observation bee-hive have been great attractions, as have also the large and beautiful wild silk moths from America, China, India, etc. The remarkably good season for British lepidoptera generally enabled large numbers of many showy species of butterflies to be exhibited in the outdoor Butterfly House during the summer and early autumn.

- 36. MEDICAL ATTENDANCE AT THE GARDENS.-With over 2,000,000 visitors to the Gardens every year and with a numerous staff, illness and accidents requiring "firstaid" assistance inevitably take place. There is a wellequipped Red Cross Room attached to the Prosectorium to which cases are taken. On week-days from 10 until 5 and on Saturdays from 10 until 1, the Anatomist, Dr. S. Zuckerman, who is a qualified medical man, gives first-aid, and Colonel Hamerton, the Pathologist, is always willing to give his advice. On Saturdays and Sundays, after 1 p.m., and all day on Bank Holidays, Dr. J. R. McDonnell, who lives at a few minutes distance from the Gardens, is retained by the Council to be at telephone call. Dr. Vevers, the Superintendent, who also is a medical man, and Mr. Hicks, the Superintendent's Assistant, who is highly trained in first aid, are never both away from the Gardens, and the Prosectorial Assistant is also skilled in first-aid dressing.
  - 37. Gardens Staff.—There has been no change of importance during the year.
  - 38. Gardeners' Department.—The Gardening Staff, under the supervision of Mr. W. Wall, Head Gardener, aided by the exceptionally fine Spring and Summer, succeeded in eclipsing all previous years in producing a wonderful succession of colour from April well into November. In addition, many new trees and flowering shrubs were planted. All the aviaries were returfed in the early Spring. The Society has again to thank the President for another gift of five thousand daffodil bulbs which have been planted on the North Bank of the Canal.
  - 39. Special Works.—The programme of works for 1928, described in Paragraph 41, p. 36, of the Council's Report for 1927, was completed. The new Main Gate, with its additional turnstiles, entrance court and lavatories, was completed in June. The open-air Reptiliary was completed and planted in September. The enlargement of the Hippopotamus House by the provision of three additional sleeping-dens, was also completed, so that there is now room when these animals breed. The old Small

Birds' House was converted into a Tortoise House with adequate outside paddocks for use in summer, and sufficient space, heating and lighting, for the reptiles in winter. Heated tanks for terrapins and other aquatic tortoises were provided. The new conditions proved as efficient or flies as for tortoises, but steps have been taken to subdue this plague. The path between the Reptile House and the Ostrich House was widened and a large area of the paths in the South Garden was made up with tarmacadam. In continuation of the scheme to replace defective old main drains, a sum of £500 was expended on relaying them. The old oak Boundary Fence in the Outer Circle and along the Albert Road has been replaced by an iron fence, the Society paying to H.M. Office of Works the additional cost of making the fence high enough to suit our requirements. The privet hedge planted within the iron fences has much improved the appearance of the boundary of the Gardens. The transformation of the Exhibition House near the Monkey Hill into a Tapir House was completed early in June.

- 40. Ordinary Works Executed during 1928.—The Superintendent reports on the ordinary works carried out during the year:—
- "Lion House.—The sleeping dens, show cages in the interior of the house, and service passage were limewashed and painted. All the outside cages were painted. One of the outside cages was entirely re-floored, and the verandah and sleeping den at the back were entirely reconstructed. A large tree with a machan or platform was erected in the centre of the cage. It is proposed to make similar alterations to the other cages.
- "Monkey Hill.—The inside dens of the Monkey Hill were cleaned, disinfected and limewashed.
- "Lemur House.—This house, which was formerly the Experimental Monkey House, was converted, in the early part of the year, into a house for the temporary reception of a family of Orangs. All three Orangs subsequently died and the house is now given up entirely to Lemurs.

"Ostrich and Cranes Paddocks.—The fencing surrounding the paddocks on both sides of the Ostrich House was renewed entirely.

"Streatfeild Memorial Shelter.—A shelter was erected opposite the outside aviaries of the new Bird House with a legacy of £300 left by the late Mr. F. H. T. Streatfeild, F.Z.S.

"Birds of Prey Aviaries.—The roof of the outside Birds of Prey Aviaries was rewired throughout.

"Gulls Aviary.—This aviary was entirely rewired and

the iron framework painted.

"Deer Paddocks.—All the Deer Paddocks on the East side of the Cattle Sheds were resurfaced with ballast and new drains were laid where necessary.

"Cattle Shed Paddocks.—Reinforced concrete gates were fixed in all the partitions of these paddocks to replace the old wooden ones which were not strong enough to withstand the repeated attacks of some of the Bison and Buffalos.

"Mappin Terrace.—Owing to the erection of the new Restaurant on the site of the old Llama Sheds, Takin Yard and Penguin Pond, provision had to be made elsewhere for the animals from these stations. The Llamas were removed, some to the Park Paddocks and some to the Antelope House. A new yard with rockwork was made on the lower level of the Mappin Terrace for the Takin, and the Penguins were transferred to the Mappin Terrace pond which was specially wired to receive them.

"Timekeeper's Office.—The old Timekeeper's Office was also situated on the site of the new Restaurant and had to be removed to the Store Yard where a temporary office was erected.

"Conversion of Old Tortoise House into Tropical House.—
The Old Tortoise House, after the transference of the Tortoises to their new quarters, remained empty for several weeks. It was then cleared out and suitably prepared to receive the young Pigmy African Elephant and the small East African Rhinoceros.

"Waders' Aviary.—This was entirely rewired.

"Tunnel Approach.—The approach to the old tunnel on the north side was formerly very narrow and on busy days much congestion took place. On the side opposite the Tunnel Bar there was a high bank covered with ivy which was for many years a stronghold of rats. The ivy was stripped, the rats exterminated, and the retaining wall was set back about three feet.

"Curator of Insects.—The old office at the end of the Curator's House which for some time past has been used as a general store, was altered and put into good repair for the use of the Curator of Insects.

"Small Mammal House.—Further accommodation for Squirrels was made in this house by putting extra partitions to all the outside cages.

"Painting.—(a) Over 200 garden seats were repainted during the early part of the year.

"(b) The Store Department was cleaned, painted and

put in good repair.

"(c) All the lavatories in the Gardens were cleaned and painted before Easter.

"(d) The exterior of the Antelope House was painted. "(e) The interior and exterior of the new Tea Pavilion

was painted.

"(f) The Raccoons' Cages were repaired and painted.

"(g) The Civets' Cages were painted and put in good repair.

(h) The interior and exterior of the Fellows' Tea

Pavilion was painted.

"(i) The interiors of the Cheap Tea Pavilion and Mappin Terrace Pavilion were painted.

"(j) The exterior of the Curator's House was painted. "(k) The exterior of the Camel House and the Clock Tower were painted.

"(l) The outside dens and service passage of the Wolves'

Dens were limewashed.

"(m) The interior and all the cages in the Rodent House were painted.

" (n) The Sanatorium was painted and decorated throughout.

med) Pranantines Parent

"Road Repairs.—Road repairs were carried out at various places in the Gardens.

"Carts.—Two new carts were made for the carting of material and refuse in the Gardens.

"In addition to the above, a large number of items of maintenance and repairs have been carried out by the Works Staff of the Gardens under the supervision of Mr. W. Ball, Clerk of Works to the Society. Mr. Ball was also responsible for the building of the new Main Gate and Pergola, under the direction of the Architect, Mr. E. Guy Dawber, A.R.A."

41. ELECTRICAL DEPARTMENT.—The installation of electric lighting and heating into the various houses in the Gardens is being continued. During the year the following houses were wired and connected:—

Tapir House.

New Tortoise House.

Prosectorium.

Sanatorium.

Curator's House.

Giraffe House.

Keeper's Lodge, and the adjoining House.

All the cooking in the new restaurant will be done by electricity, and, in view of this, a large cable has been laid to an intake room in the building. The work of installing the cooking plant and wiring the new restaurant has been carried out under the direction of Mr. H. P. Davolls, the Society's Head Electrician, who has also been responsible for the wiring of all the other houses in the Gardens.

42. Special Works for 1929.—The chief new work for 1929 is the new Restaurant, described in Paragraph 45, p. 38. In addition to the ordinary maintenance and improvement of the Houses, enclosures and paths, the replacement of the old drains, the surfacing of paths with tar-macadam and the laying out of paths and lawns near the new Restaurant will be carried out as early in the year as possible.

- 43. Band.—The Band of the 65th (8th London) Field Brigade, Royal Artillery, has again been engaged for the season. It will play on Saturday and Sunday afternoons from May 25th, 1929, to August 31st, 1929, inclusive.
- 44. Refreshment Department. -The Accounts have been audited, as usual, by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons. The gross profits for 52 weeks to September 29th, 1928. amounted, after feeding the Staff, to £43,644 3s. 4d. The working expenses for the same period amounted to £18,467 15s. 8d., leaving a trading profit of £25,176 7s. 8d. After making the usual allowances for rent, depreciation, and licence duties, etc., allotting the receipts from the lavatories on the same lines as last year, and deducting the Manager's salary and percentage, there was a net profit to the Society amounting to £19,005 5s. 8d. Of that amount, the sum of £205 5s. 8d. was allotted to repaying the Works Department for work carried out at the Refreshment Rooms. The balance of £18,800 has been carried forward, but out of this £3,760 must be reserved towards the payment of Income Tax, Schedule D. At the request of the Council, the Committee of Auditors appointed in January, 1928, held a special meeting to audit the accounts of the Refreshment Department. The results of their investigations have been incorporated in the accounts of the Society for the current year.
- 45. New Restaurant.—An institution like the Gardens of the Society, which receives no support from the public funds, but has to depend on the subscriptions of Fellows and Gate-money, must consider not only the health, comfort and display of the animals which are its first object, but the convenience of visitors. The Council has long been aware that the accommodation at the old Refreshment Room building was insufficient to provide for the wants of Fellows and the public. Plans for a new Restaurant were prepared before the War, but conditions from 1914 onwards prevented carrying them out. Since the War, the new Tea Pavilion and the Popular Tea Pavilion have been built and various Tea and Light

Refreshment Bars have been constructed in different parts of the Gardens. It was decided early last summer that the great step of constructing a new Restaurant with accommodation for Fellows and for the public should be taken. The plans drawn up before the War were revised and brought up to date, as, for example, by substituting electric plant in the kitchens for the older modes of cooking. In order to prevent the very heavy cost of the new building absorbing for several years funds available for other improvements, a loan of £45,000 from the Society's Bankers was arranged, to be repaid as to principal and interest by an annual sinking fund of £5,000. The construction of the new Building was begun last autumn, and there seems no reason why it should not be completed and in use early this summer. The architect is Mr. J. J. Joass, the contractors are Messrs. Godson and Son, the General Electric Company is supplying the cooking installation, and the wiring is being done by the Society's Staff, under Mr. Davolls, the Society's electrician. The Restaurant will contain separate lunching, dining and tea accommodation, and also lavatories for Fellows and the public.

46. Transport of Animals.—As described in Paragraph 44 (p. 30) of the Report for last year, Council appointed a Committee to consider and report on methods of improving the conditions under which animals are transported. The Report, under the title:

"HINTS ON THE TRANSPORT OF ANIMALS;

Being Practical Advice on the Selection, Packing and Hygiene of Living Mammals, Birds, Reptiles, Amphibia and Fishes for Transport by Sea and Land"

was published in the Proceedings of the Society, 1928, pp. 631–652. It has been reprinted as a pamphlet, copies of which can be obtained from the Society's Offices, at 6d. each. Presentation copies were given a very wide distribution to Societies, Institutions and persons concerned with living animals, and it is hoped that considerable improvements will be brought about in the conditions under which animals travel.

47. Whipsnade Park.—As explained in the Council's Report last year, paragraph 45 (p. 41), Parliamentary powers were required for the transformation of the estate purchased by the Society at Whipsnade into an Animal Park. The Bill promoted by the Society passed through both Houses of Parliament and received the Royal Assent on July 2, 1928, as The Zoological Society of London Act, 1928. In accordance with the Act, an alternative Right of Way round the eastern boundary of the Society's property has been opened, the Society acquiring a small strip of land to complete the connection with existing rights of way. The paths traversing the Park have accordingly been closed, and a boundary fence enclosing the whole property will be completed before this Report is issued. A contour survey of the property has been made from which accurate maps and a scale model have been made. Sites for entrance gates have been selected and the lines of the principal future avenues, paths and enclosures have been mapped out. A gravel pit has been opened and a staff of local men has been engaged on fencing, road-making, planting trees and shrubs and clearing out elder and getting the woods into order. A reservoir to hold 500,000 gallons of water has been constructed alongside the deep well sunk last year and pumping plant is being installed. Negotiations for a supply of electricity are well advanced. Mr. E. Guy Dawber, A.R.A., who has taken special interest in the preservation of the characters of a locality, has made plans for the transformation of the farm buildings into a restaurant and for lodge gate cottages. It is hoped to proceed with these in the course of the year.

The Council recognises that the development of a derelict estate into an animal park will require a very large expenditure of time and money. They are anxious not to prejudice the future by proceeding with any work that will not form part of a well-considered plan. They hope, therefore, that Fellows will exercise patience, as it is impractical to open the Park until further progress has been made. They would point out, however, that

there is a wide opportunity for generous donors. Three Fellows of the Society have purchased and presented a strip of land 80 feet wide and about two-thirds of a mile long which will form a magnificent avenue of approach to the Park from the south. Lady Yule, F.Z.S., of Hamstead House, Bricket Wood, Herts., has made a gift of £1,000 to assist in the development of the Park. Gifts either for the general development or for specific objects will be welcome.

48. Menagerie.—The Society is as usual much indebted to Fellows, Corresponding Members, Private Donors, and to Institutions, Societies and Shipping Companies for their most kind help in maintaining the collection of animals by gifts and by assistance in transport. Specially to be mentioned in respect of 1928 are H.M. The King, Patron of the Society, the Duke of Bedford, K.G., President of the Society, Mr. Alfred Ezra, F.Z.S., Mr. J. Spedan Lewis, F.Z.S., Mr. A. A. Haserick, F.Z.S., Mr. G. B. Chapman, F.Z.S., the Bombay Natural History Society, the Zoological Gardens of Calcutta, the Rangoon Zoological Gardens, Messrs. Alfred Holt & Co., Messrs. Henderson & Co., the Ellerman Line, the Union-Castle Steamship Co., Messrs. Elders & Fyffes, and the British India Steam Navigation Co., through Messrs. Gray, Dawes & Co.

- 54. STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1928 is issued to Fellows, bound with this Report.
- 55. Assets 1927 and 1928.—At the end of the year the total Assets of the Society amounted to £142,258 9s. 9d., a decrease of £1,878 19s. 10d. on the corresponding figure for 1927. The reduction is more than accounted for by the realisation of part of the Refreshment Room Renewals Fund, which had outgrown its purpose, for special works in the Gardens.
- 56. Pension Fund.—The Pension Fund, instituted in 1926, increased in 1928 by £525, being the amounts of the composition fees of five compounders who had died in the course of the year, and a contribution of £300 from the General Funds of the Society.
- 57. LIABILITIES 1927 AND 1928.—The liabilities amounted to £13,688 10s. 3d., a decrease of £738 11s. 4d. on the corresponding figures for 1927.
- 58. Balance 1927 and 1928.—The balance, a surplus of assets over liabilities, amounted to £128,569 19s. 6d., a decrease of £1,140 8s. 6d. on the corresponding figure for 1927, representing the difference between the decrease in assets (paragraph 55) and decrease in liabilities (paragraph 57).
- 59. Income 1927 and 1928.—There was again a net increase in income, amounting to £5,613 16s. 8d., due largely to gate-money.

- 60. EXPENDITURE 1927 AND 1928.—There was a total increase of £8,729 15s. 8d. in expenditure, made possible by the Society's prosperity.
- 61. Whipsnade.—This new head of expenditure appears in the Accounts for the second time. The cost of purchase appears in the Balance Sheet, under Assets, as an investment of part of the Life Composition Fund. The details are set out in the Account, and it will be seen that they relate to the development of the Estate.
- 62. Legacies and Donations.—In 1928 the Society received a legacy of £50 from the late Colonel J. W. Yerbury. In accordance with the wishes stated in a letter written many years ago to the Secretary by the testator, this is being spent on the library chiefly in the purchase of books dealing with Entomology. The late Mr. F. H. T. Streatfeild, F.Z.S., also bequeathed the sum of £300 without specifying an object. The Council employed it in erecting a shelter near the new Bird House, called the Streatfeild Shelter.
- 63. The Council wishes to acknowledge the assistance received during the past year from the members of the Committee of Publication, upon whom devolved, in accordance with the Bye-laws, the arrangement and supervision of the Society's Scientific Publications.
- 64. The Council has finally to ask you to thank those Fellows of the Society who have audited the Accounts for the past year.

In accordance with Chapter X of the By-laws, we have examined the Accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December, 1928, as presented to us by Messrs. W. B. Keen & Co., the Chartered Accountants appointed to assist us in our duties. We report to the Society that at that date the Total Assets amounted to £142,258 9s. 9d., and the Liabilities to £13,688 10s. 3d. The General State of the Funds of the Society therefore showed a surplus of Assets over Liabilities amounting to £128,569 19s. 6d., subject to the estimated values of some of the Assets. The Cash in the Bankers' hands and at the Office amounted to £13,156 15s. 8d.

For the further information of the Fellows of the Society a Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account for the year are annexed hereto. These have been audited and are certified by Messrs. W. B. Keen & Co. The result of the working of the Refreshment Department for the 52 weeks to 29th September, 1928, is incorporated in the Statements, the Accounts of that Department having been separately audited and certified by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons, Chartered Accountants. We have examined the Statements of Account and in our opinion the Balance Sheet is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the Funds of the Society (subject to the estimated values of some of the Assets) according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us and as shewn by the Books of the Society.
