# **REPORT OF THE COUNCIL**

for the year ended 31st December, 1953.

The Council has pleasure in presenting its one hundred and twentyfifth Annual Report to the Annual General Meeting of the Society, to be held on Thursday, 29th April, 1954, at 4 p.m., in the Society's Offices in Regent's Park.

In accordance with Chap. 3, Sect. 4 of the Bye-laws the course of proceedings at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows :—

- 1. Reading of the minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting.
- 2. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 3. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- 4. Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 5. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.

Notice of any motion arising out of the discussion shall be given in writing to the Secretary after the Annual General Meeting and the motion shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 8, Section 4 of the Bye-Laws.

6. Announcement of the names of the Fellows elected as Officers and ordinary members of Council.

The President or other Fellow in the Chair may at his discretion close the discussion of the Auditors' Report or the discussion of the Council's Annual Report.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

ORDINARY GENERAL MEETINGS.—Until further notice, these meetings are being held in the Meeting Room at the Society's Offices on the third Wednesday in January, April, July, and October, at 4.30 p.m.

SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.—These meetings are held in the Meeting Room at the Society's Offices on the second Tuesday in the months February to June and October to December. The meetings commence at 5 p.m., and tea is served in the Library at 4.15 p.m.

OBITUARY.—The Society has shared the grief of the nation at the death of her late Majesty Queen Mary who had been a Fellow since 1937. Among the other deaths of Fellows the following should be specially mentioned.

The Duke of Abercorn, K.G., K.P., P.C., who was a member of Council for several years between 1902 and 1910.

The Duke of Bedford, who was a member of Council with the statutory intervals from 1948 to 1953 and Vice-President on three occasions during that period.

General Sir Reginald Wingate, Bt., G.C.B., G.C.V.O., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., who had been an Honorary Fellow since 1912.

SILVER MEDAL .- The Silver Medal of the Society was awarded to Mr. H. F. Vinall, Curator of the Aquarium, for over 50 years devoted service. The Bronze Medal of the Society was awarded to Head Keeper H. Jones for the first successful rearing of a King Penguin in England.

STAFF.-In the Coronation Honours List three members of staff were honoured by Her Majesty. Mr. G. B. Stratton, the Society's Librarian was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire and Overseer E. B. Tanner, Overseer of Birds, and Mr. William Lawrence, Senior Assistant at the Prosectorium, were awarded the British Empire Medal.

Mr. William N. Hill, Catering Manager at Regent's Park, has been elected a member of the Education Standing Committee of the British Employers Confederation as the representative of the Caterers Association of Great Britain.

In the early part of the year the duties of the post of Superintendent at Regent's Park were re-allocated among the other members of the staff.

CORONATION.-Special arrangements were made to celebrate suitably the year of the Coronation which also was the 125th anniversary of the opening of the Gardens at Regent's Park. An extensive programme of painting, repairs and cleaning was undertaken which effectively counteracted the unavoidable neglect of appearances during and immediately after the war years. For the Coronation Year the Gardens were decorated with bunting and flags and the Gardening Department staged a magnificent display of flowers largely owing to the generosity of some of the well-known bulb firms. For the evening openings floodlights and other illuminations were installed.

Many animals of special interest were presented to the Collection during the year in honour of the Coronation, and were given distinctive labels as part of the "Coronation Collection." Special mention may be made of the rehabilitated Tropical Bird House where the display of Humming Birds among tropical vegetation has attracted much attention, and to the open air exhibition of Hawks and the apparatus of Hawking as used during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I which made a most attractive display.

At the Scientific Meeting held on the 9th June, 1953, the Librarian arranged a most interesting exhibition of rare books, original drawings, manuscripts and matter relating to the early history of the Society. This was held in the Library to which Fellows repaired after the Scientific Meeting and where they were entertained by the Publications Committee.

PRESIDENT'S RECEPTION .- On the evening of June 10th the President held a reception to meet Fellows and their guests in honour of the Coronation and the 125th anniversary of the opening of the Gardens. Some 5,000 Fellows and their guests attended and were fortunate in the weather which produced one of the few fine evenings of the period. The Gardens and houses were illuminated and many special attractions were provided. The band of The 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards played during the evening and the party was acknowledged as one of the most outstanding and successful in London during the summer.

ROLL OF FELLOWS.—The number of Fellows at 31st December, 1953, was 7,729 as compared with 7,472 at the end of 1952.

VISITORS.—The number of visitors during 1953 was 1,972,222 at Regent's Park and 502,627 at Whipsnade Park. The corresponding figures for 1952 were 1,970,050 and 566,446 respectively.

AQUARIUM.—The number of visitors during 1953 was 346,800 compared with 322,902 for the year 1952.

CHILDREN'S ZOO.—The Children's Zoo was open from the 23rd March until the 26th October, 1953. The number of visitors was 245,677 compared with 222,615 for the 1952 season.

LATE EVENINGS.—The Gardens at Regent's Park were kept open until 11 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays from the 17th June until the 10th September, 1953. Special lighting was installed and a band engaged.

WHIPSNADE PARK.—The figure of a Lion carved in the chalk on the Downs was again illuminated at night, throughout the season. An Oak Tree, commemorating the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was planted by the Lord Lieutenant of the County of Bedfordshire, Lt.-Col. Dealtry C. Part, O.B.E., J.P., F.Z.S.

Whipsnade was honoured by the visit of many notabilities during the Coronation period, including H.R.H. The Prince of Liège, Prince Akihito of Japan, The Omugabe of Ankole, and Chieftains from the Gold Coast.

H.R.H. The Prince of Liège was entertained to luncheon at Whipsnade Park by the Honorary Secretary, Viscount Chaplin; others present included the Belgian Ambassador and the Marquise du Parc Locmaria, Baron Carton de Wiart, Comte G. d'Henricourt de Grunne, Lieutenant Colonel Staquet, the Earl of Birkenhead, Dr. L. Harrison Matthews and Mr. E. H. Tong.

The Omugabe of Ankole was entertained to luncheon by the Honorary Secretary, Viscount Chaplin; others present included Captain C. R. S. Pitman, Mr. E. C. Cook, Mr. H. Clifford, Dr. L. Harrison Matthews and Mr. E. H. Tong. During his visit, the Omugabe of Ankole was presented with the first born Ankole Bull from the Whipsnade herd. This bull (named "Ankole") was deposited with the Society by the Omugabe.

CONFERENCES.—The Society was represented at the 14th International Congress of Zoology held at Copenhagen from the 5th to the 12th August, 1953, by Dr. L. Harrison Matthews.

The Society was represented at the Annual Conference of the International Union of Directors of Zoological Gardens, held in Antwerp from the 13th to the 19th September, 1953, by Dr. L. Harrison Matthews and Mr. E. H. Tong.

The Society was represented at the 12th Congress of the International Association of Limnology held at Cambridge and Windermere from the 20th to the 30th August, 1953, by Dr. E. Trewavas. SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS.—The attention of Fellows is called to the subscription rates, payable on the 1st January each year. These are as follows :—

The published price of the complete volume of the *Proceedings* is 120s. and the advance subscription price to Fellows is 40s. Fellows therefore, are privileged to obtain this publication at one-third of the charge to the general public, and it is hoped that more Fellows will take advantage of the opportunity of obtaining their scientific publications, which are offered on such favourable terms.

The 123rd volume of the Proceedings has been completed by the issue of part 4 in February, 1954. The fifty-two papers on animal morphology, general, experimental, and systematic zoology, contained in the volume cover a variety of subjects and are illustrated with fifty-nine plates and 395 figures in the text. Each of the papers is a valuable contribution to our knowledge of zoology and it is difficult to select any for special mention, but attention is drawn to a monograph on the succession of teeth in elasmobranchs by W. Warwick James ; several papers by W. C. Osman Hill, Prosector to the Society, on the taxonomy and physiology of Tarsius ; a further contribution by Hugh B. Cott on the palatability of the eggs of birds; the ecology of rocky shores around Anglesey by John R. Lewis; two important systematic papers, a revision of the British leeches of the family Glossiphoniidae by K. H. Mann and revisions of the genera of Mallophaga-the Rallicola-complex by Theresa Clay; the absence of slugs in a garden and an experiment in re-stocking by H. F. Barnes; and the endoparasites of some North American snakes and their effects on the Ophidia by the late H. B. Fantham and the Honorary Parasitologist to the Society, Annie Porter.

Volume 27 of the *Transactions* was concluded with the issue of part 6 in February. This comprised a monograph on the biology of the Reduviidae of Southern Rhodesia by N. C. E. Miller, illustrated with nine coloured plates and fifty-eight figures in the text. The first part of volume 28, comprising a zoo-geographical study by the late G. D. Hale Carpenter on the genus *Euploea* (Lep. Danaidae) in Micronesia, Melanesia, Polynesia and Australia, illustrated with nine plates, was issued in July.

ZOOLOGICAL RECORD.—Bound copies of two volumes were published during the year. Volume 87 dealing principally with the literature for the year 1950 was issued on the 17th February 1953, and volume 88, dealing with the literature for 1951 was issued on the 28th October 1953. Contained in volume 87 are the titles of 13,599 zoological articles which appeared mainly in 1950 and in volume 88 are the titles of 14,902 zoological articles published chiefly in 1951. In addition, the separate sections, Comprehensive Zoology, Echinoderma, Brachiopoda, Arachnida, Insecta and Mammalia of volume 89 (1952) were issued during the year.

Receipts from sales are still inadequate to meet the cost of production and, as in the past, the *Record* is largely dependent on donations to the Zoological Record Fund. Among these special mention should be made of £500 from the Royal Society, £450 from the British Museum (Natural History), and £250 from the Zoological Society of London. In addition, its international importance has again been recognized by the International Union of Biological Sciences, which has made its annual grant of £285 out of funds allotted to it by UNESCO.

It should be emphasised that the services of the specialists responsible for the compilation of the various sections are obtained more or less on a voluntary basis, and Council records its appreciation for these valuable services to science.

NOMENCLATOR ZOOLOGICUS.—This work now comprises five volumes covering the literature from the 10th Edition of Linnæus 1758 to the end of 1945, at the published price of  $13\frac{1}{2}$  guineas. The cost of the fifth volume has been provided out of the Neave-Lloyd Nomenclator Zoologicus Fund, and it is hoped that if sufficient subscriptions are received, the Fund will be able to finance further volumes every ten years.

Zoo LIFE.—Three parts of the 8th volume had been issued by the end of the year and the 4th part shortly afterwards.

The main theme of Part 1 of this volume was animals of the British countryside with articles on hedgehogs, shrews, badgers, weasels and otters. Special mention should be made of "Deer in Britain" by the late Duke of Bedford, "Bat Banding in Devon" by John Hooper illustrated by outstanding photographs, and also "Populations of the Sea Shore" by C. M. Yonge. Part 2, the Coronation Issue, opened with an interesting account of the long association of the Zoological Society of London with the Royal Family, and also contained an article on "Edward Topsell and Elizabethan Natural History" by Richard Carrington. "Land Crabs" by L. C. Bushby, "King Crabs" by H. H. Goto, "The Leathery Turtle" by M. W. F. Tweedie and the "Tuatara" by J. W. Lester were among the articles on the more unusual animals dealt with in Part 3, and Part 4 will also deal largely with animals that are seldom seen in menageries.

Zoo Life continues to be published quarterly, the subscription rate being 11s. per annum, post free, and 8s. 6d. to Fellows. All subscriptions for Zoo Life should be forwarded to the publishers, Messrs. Gale & Polden Ltd., Ideal House, Argyll Street, W.1, and not to the Society's offices. A few copies of the first eight volumes are still available and may be obtained from Messrs. Gale & Polden.

CHRISTMAS LECTURES.—Three lectures, "Collecting Animals in Africa" by J. W. Lester, "Insect House Close-Ups" by L. C. Bushby and "Pets Usual and Unusual" by Maxwell Knight, O.B.E., were given in the Society's Meeting Room during the Christmas holidays for the children of Fellows and their friends, and as in previous years they were extremely popular and greatly appreciated.

LIBRARY .- The Library was again well attended by Fellows and several thousand volumes were consulted by them. In addition they borrowed from the Library 3,194 books, and a further 400 volumes were made available to libraries of scientific and technical institutions.

The additions to the Library acquired by purchase, presentation and exchange were ninety-seven books and 3,932 parts of 717 serials. The volumes bound were 926 in number and repairs were made to the bindings of a small number of other works. A considerable sum is needed for further repair to the bindings of valuable books in the Library.

Gifts of books will be greatly appreciated, particularly copies of Fellows' own works.

LEGACIES.—The following legacies were received during the year :— £25,000 on account of the bequest from the late Arthur Louis Allen; £30 from the late Mrs. Edith Pattman.

PROSECTORIUM.—During the year 853 necropsies were performed on animals dying at Regent's Park. Of these 251 were mammals, 352 were birds and 250 were reptiles or amphibians. In addition reports were made on a number of fishes from the Aquarium. The number of necropsies carried out by Mr. Martin Senior at Whipsnade was 192 (85 on mammals and 107 on birds), and five necropsies on mammals dying at Whipsnade were carried out by the Prosector, Regent's Park.

Material for investigation from outside sources included animals from other zoos.

Besides specimens preserved for use in the Prosectorium a considerable quantity of anatomical, physiological, biochemical and pathological material has been supplied to other institutions, and the results of work on it have appeared in various scientific publications.

VISITING SCIENTISTS AND RESEARCH STUDENTS .- During the year accommodation has been made available for four visiting scientists to pursue their researches in the Society's laboratories. In addition nine research students have made visits of varying duration to the Society's laboratories where they have received guidance and assistance with their researches. The scientific results of the researches of students working at the Society's laboratories in former years are now in course of publication, some in the Society's *Proceedings*.

Special coaching in methods of research has also been provided for two officers in the Colonial Service before they left this country to take up scientific posts abroad.

At the request of the Colonial Office a special course for officers of Game Departments and others interested in wild life conservation and research was held during the autumn, in conjunction with the Royal Veterinary College. The course gave instruction on systematics, the physiology and ecology of animals, with particular reference to the animals of Africa. This course, the first of its kind to be provided, was received most favourably and the Colonial Office has requested that it may be repeated in the coming year.

The investigator appointed by the Otter Committee has continued to make the Society's laboratories her headquarters. The Otter Committee was set up as the result of a recommendation by the Home Office Committee on Cruelty to British Wild Animals, and is financed by the Nature Conservancy.

The investigator appointed by the Game Sub-Committee of the Tsetse Fly and Trypanosomiasis Committee of the Colonial Office has continued to make use of the accommodation provided in the Society's Library for research and consultation of the literature on African mammals. A preliminary report was prepared and submitted to the Inter-African Fauna and Flora Conference that met at Costermansville in October 1953.

REGIMENTAL MASCOTS.—The Society has the safe keeping of the Windsor herd of white Goats, formerly kept at Windsor, and has undertaken to provide regimental mascots from it when required. During the year mascots were presented to both the 4th and 5th Battalions of The Welch Regiment (T.A.).

LECTURES FOR L.C.C. TEACHERS.—During the autumn a course of lectures and demonstrations was arranged for L.C.C. teachers. These were designed to help teachers when they bring classes of children to the Zoo. The course was given by Professor H. R. Hewer, assisted by Dr. D. M. Ross and Dr. K. A. Kermack. The course was well attended and a request has been received from the L.C.C. that it may be repeated in the coming year.

# ANIMALS AT REGENT'S PARK.



- (a) REGENT'S PARK. The income was £267,690 (an increase of £13,936). and the expenditure amounted to £262,749 (an increase of £5,850.)
- The income was £86,903 (a decrease of (b) WHIPSNADE PARK. £7,854), and the expenditure amounted to £76,551 (a decrease of £7,231).
- (c) SURPLUS. The net surplus (after making appropriations to Funds to meet future liabilities) carried to the General Purposes Account, amounted to £5,193, as compared with £725 for 1952.

# ASSETS, LIABILITIES AND BALANCE.

- (a) ASSETS. At the end of the year the total assets of the Society amounted to £1,054,638, an increase of £59,014 on the corresponding figure for 1952.




