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REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year ending 31st December, 1920.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

1. The Ninety-second Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Friday, April 29th, 1921, at 4 p.m., at the Offices of the Society, in the Gardens, Regent's Park, N.W.8.

2. PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING. (By-laws, Chapter VII., Sections 1 and 2.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows:—

1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual

- Meeting.
- 2. The appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
- 3. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 4. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- 5. Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.

- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the Report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

6. IMPERIAL FELLOWS.—The Society has often wished to have some special means of signifying its appreciation of Donors to our collection, of distinguished position such as Indian Rajahs. For this purpose, it was decided to institute a limited class of Imperial Fellows. In accordance with the provisions of the Charter, the Council on November 17th, 1920, gave notice of the following alterations in the By-laws, which, after having been read at three successive Monthly Meetings of the Society and suspended in the Society's Rooms in the interval, were balloted for and passed at the General Monthly Meeting on February 16th, 1921.

ALTERATION IN THE BY-LAWS.

The following to be Chapter IV of the Society's By-laws, the present Chapter IV to be renumbered V, and the subsequent Chapters renumbered accordingly.

CHAPTER IV.

OF IMPERIAL FELLOWS.

Section I. The Imperial Fellows of the Society shall be zealous patrons of Zoology, of high esteem and position in India, or a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, but not eligible for election as Honorary or Foreign Members, and shall not exceed twelve in number.

Section II. Every person proposed as an Imperial Fellow shall be recommended by the Council and be balloted for and elected, and be liable to be removed, in the like form and manner, and be subject to the same rules and restrictions as the Ordinary Fellows.

Section III. Imperial Fellows who on their election were

already Ordinary Fellows of the Society shall have the option of continuing to pay their annual subscription and shall then enjoy all the privileges of Ordinary Fellows. Imperial Fellows who at the time of their election were not already Ordinary Fellows shall have the option of paying or of compounding for the annual subscription of Ordinary Fellows and of so acquiring all the rights and privileges of Ordinary Fellows.

Section IV. Imperial Fellows who do not pay the annual subscriptions of Ordinary Fellows or shall not have compounded for them, shall have the privilege of attending the Meetings and visiting the Gardens and Library of the Society, but shall not be entitled to vote at Meetings nor enjoy any other rights and privileges than those above mentioned.

7. LIST OF FELLOWS.—A new edition (the first since 1914) of the Society's List of Fellows was published in July, 1920, and distributed to all Fellows subscribing to the Publications. A revised edition will be published during the Summer of 1921. Any corrections should be sent to the Secretary before April 30th, 1921.

8. LECTURES TO SCHOOL TEACHERS.—The scheme for the instruction of School Teachers, arranged in 1910 by the Council in co-operation with the Education Committee of the London County Council, was continued. Mr. Frank Balfour-Browne, M.A., F.Z.S., F.R.S.E., conducted two complete courses during 1920, each course being attended by 150 School Teachers. The first course consisted of three lectures with lantern demonstrations in the Society's Meeting Room, and three tours in the Gardens to give the Teachers, in groups of 25, a demonstration for each lecture. To the second course was added a Lecture upon Insects.

The object of the courses is to give Teachers such information as may be useful to them when they bring school children to the Gardens. The London County Council.makes a grant towards the expenses of the Scheme. The first course for 1921 begins on April 9th.

9. GARDEN GUIDE—LECTURER.—The Council arranged with Mr. E. Kay Robinson to conduct parties of visitors round the Gardens twice weekly during the months of April, May, June and October. Although Mr. Robinson's lectures were much appreciated by those who accompanied him, it was agreed in consultation with the lecturer that insufficient advantage of them was taken to justify continuation of the experiment.

10. SCIENTIFIC GRANTS.—The Council made a donation of £10 to the National Trust towards the preservation of Wicken Fen, of £30 to the Conjoint Board of Scientific Societies, and of £100 to the Marine Biological Association, Plymouth.

11. SALMON AND TROUT EXHIBITION.—In co-operation with the Salmon and Trout Association a small Exhibition illustrating Fresh-water fisheries was held in the fish house.

12. SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS,—The usual twelve meetings for scientific business were held. The Society's Rooms were also lent to the British Ornithologists' Union, to the Avicultural Society and to the Society for the Protection of the Wild Fauna of the Empire.

13. SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS.—The Abstract was issued as usual. The Transactions, suspended during the war, have not yet been resumed. Of the Proceedings Parts III and IV of 1919 were issued together on February 25th, 1920; Parts I and II of 1920, together on July 21st, 1920; Part III on September 15th, 1920, and Part IV on January 15th, 1921. It is hoped that the irregularity in publication which could not be avoided during the war, will cease.

14. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD.—Considerable progress has been made in dealing with the arrears due to the war. Volume fifty-four, containing the literature of 1917, was published on January 28th, 1920; Volume fifty-five dealing with 1918, on November 30th, 1920. Preparation of Volume fifty-six dealing with 1919 is far advanced, and Volume fifty-seven has been arranged for. These volumes, under the Editorship of Dr. David Sharp, F.R.S., are prepared according to the scheme of the International Catalogue of Scientific Literature, and would have formed the "N. Zoology" volumes of that series. The co-operation with the International Catalogue was formally broken when the Royal Society gave notice that it would undertake no financial responsibility for any volumes subsequent to the 14th annual issue (Volume LI of the Record). The Council of the Zoological Society has produced Volumes LII to LV at the sole expense of the Society, printing and reserving an edition of each volume for the International Catalogue, in case the publication of that should be resumed. The same course is being adopted with regard to Volumes LVI and LVII. But as no steps appear to have been taken with regard to the issue of the International Catalogue for the literature of 1921 and subsequently, the Council has instructed the Zoological Record Committee to prepare a new scheme for the issue of an Annual Record of Zoological Literature.

15. GARDEN GUIDE AND PICTURE POST CARDS.—The eighteenth edition of the Garden Guide was issued in 1920, and in the course of the year 76,316 copies were sold. This edition was enlarged and printed on better paper, and the cost of each copy was raised to 1s., on account of the increase in all the items of production. Since 1903, 846,238 copies of the Guide have been sold. Of picture post cards, 201,097 were sold in 1920.

18. CARD CATALOGUE.—The Librarian and his Assistant have made further progress with the Subject Card Index and the Geographical (Zoological) Card Index of the Works in the Library.

19. CINEMATOGRAPH RECORDS.—Mr. Martin Duncan has made film studies of the animals in the gardens, especially of the rarer species. A series of these have been shewn at a Scientific Meeting, and the negatives are carefully preserved.

20. PROSECTORIUM.—Dr. R. T. Leiper, F.Z.S., Professor at the Royal School of Tropical Medicine, has continued to act as Director of the Prosectorium, with a Staff consisting of Dr. Sonntag, F.Z.S., Anatomist, Dr. Lucas, F.Z.S., Pathologist, Dr. Vevers, F.Z.S., Beit Research Fellow, Honorary Parasitologist, and two laboratory assistants. Mrs. Markbreiter has examined the blood of animals which have died, for micro-parasites, and a number of other workers have made use of the laboratory. The type specimens of new species described from material obtained from the collection are presented in the name of the Society to the British Museum (Natural History), and anatomical and pathological material has been presented or sold to various institutions and private workers. Reports are submitted to the Prosectorial Committee, and suggestions relating to the care of the animals or to the need for disinfection are forwarded to the Garden Committee, or given directly to the Curators. Many communications containing the results of original investigations have been presented to the Publication Committee, and published in the *Proceedings*. Requests for material or for facilities for research should be addressed to Dr. Leiper, or to the Secretary of the Society.

21. VISITORS TO THE GARDENS.—The total number of visitors to the gardens in 1920 was 1,590,642, the largest in the history of the Society. The following Tables give comparative figures of some interest.

22. ADMISSION TO THE GARDENS.—The Gardens are open daily throughout the year (except Christmas Day, when they are closed) from 9 a.m. until sunset, or 8 p.m., when sunset is later. The arrangements for admission are as follows :---

Fellows.—Every Fellow, Honorary Member, Foreign Member, Imperial Fellow or Corresponding Member may enter with two visitors by signing his or her name in the Gate-Book, but is not entitled to admit more than two visitors in this way on the same day. The husband or wife of a Fellow may use this privilege in the absence of the Fellow, but both husband and wife may not admit visitors on the same day.

Other Visitors.—On SUNDAYS only when personally accompanied and signed for as above, or on presentation of tickets. Written messages or the visiting cards of Fellows cannot be accepted, and admission by payment is not allowed. On WEEK-DAYS, when personally accompanied and signed for as above; on presentation of tickets; or by payment. The prices for admission by payment are as follows :—

Mondays throughout the year, except Bank Holidays, 6d. each person.

Bank Holidays, 1s. each person.

Other Days, except Sundays, 1s. each adult; 6d. each child under 12 years.

Infants in arms are admitted free.

The following reduced prices for Excursion Tickets for Parties of not less than 25 for any fixed date (except Sunday) may now be obtained upon application at the Society's Office, Regent's Park, N.W.8, and if the date chosen for the visit to the Gardens should, through unforeseen circumstances, be found unsuitable, the Tickets, upon being returned to the Society's office, will be made available for another day during the year of issue. Children under 14 Years. Adults. 25 to 100 at 5d. each. 25 to 100 at 11d. each. 101 and upwards at 4d. each. 101 to 200 at 10d. each. 201 to 300 at 9d. each. 301 and upwards at 8d.each. CHEAP ORDERS for the admission from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. of Children from Council or Grant-aided Schools on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday (except during Easter and Whitsun weeks) may now be obtained :— (1) For a party of 25 or less Children, with one or two Teachers, three shillings (3s.); (2) for a party of 26 to 50 Children, with two teachers, five shillings (5s.); and any number additional to 50 Children at the rate of one penny (1d.) each child, and fivepence (5d.) each Teacher. The Children, with their Teachers, must be out of the Gardens by 1 p.m.

23. WORKS.—The large balance carried forward from 1919 made it possible to undertake, at a total expenditure of nearly £20,000, many long-delayed and much-needed improvements. The second tunnel, the construction of which was suspended during the war, was completed, and the banks, shrubberies and cuttings at the approaches were made up and planted. The relief to the circulation of visitors on crowded days has been great. The path in front of the Lemur-house in the North Garden and the house itself were in a dangerous condition on account of slipping of the bank. A concrete viaduct, supported on ferro-concrete piles, driven deep into the solid clay, has restored the path and secured the foundations of the house. A step has been taken towards the reconstruction of the Gardens, planned in 1913 and 1914, by removing the greater part of the old terrace, making a new elephantride, and widening the space occupied by paths and flower-beds from the War Memorial towards the South Entrance. A new Ladies' Lavatory has been made under the Mappin Terraces. The Mappin Terrace Tea Pavilion, left incomplete at the outbreak of the war, has been finished and decorated. The Ladies' Lavatory near the Eastern Aviary was rebuilt and extended, provision for female school children being added. Much general painting and repairs were carried out. The Kangaroo sheds were rebuilt, and electric lighting was added to the Insect-house.

The continued very high cost of work has prevented an extensive programme for 1921. But a new Gentleman's Lavatory is being constructed at the Main Gate, and the reconstruction of the South Garden is being continued. It is hoped that it will be possible to repair and waterproof most of the paths in the Gardens. 24. GARDENERS' DEPARTMENT.—Under the able superintendence of Mr. Young, the Society's head-gardener, the floral display was unusually fine last year. The alterations in the Gardens threw a great burden of work on this department, which was very successfully undertaken. A number of old trees, unsightly or dangerous, were removed, but very many more were planted.

25. BAND.—The "Comrades of the Great War" Headquarters Band performed in the Gardens on Saturdays and Sundays from May 29th to August 29th. There is no evidence that the performances increased the actual number of visitors, but they appear to have been much appreciated by the Fellows and the public, and it is proposed to continue them this season.

In accordance with the undertaking given at the Annual General Meeting last year, a Special Committee interviewed a number of bandmasters and discussed the Band arrangements for 1921. On the recommendation of the Committee, Council has engaged the Queen's Westminster Rifles Band, consisting of the conductor and 28 performers, to play in the Gardens on Saturday and Sunday afternoons from the last Saturday and Sunday in May to the last Saturday and Sunday in August, inclusive.

26. REFRESHMENT DEPARTMENT.—The Accounts have been audited, as usual, by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons. The gross profit amounted, after feeding the Staff, to $\pm 23,256$ 10s. 2d. The working expenses for the same period amounted to $\pm 11,689$ 13s. 9d., leaving a trading profit of $\pm 11,566$ 16s. 5d. After making the usual allowances for rent, depreciation, and licence duties, etc., and allotting the receipts from the lavatories on the same lines as last year, and deducting the Manager's salary and percentage, there was a net profit to the Society amounting to $\pm 4,854$ 10s. 6d. It was decided that $\pm 3,000$ should be invested and added to the Refreshment Room Re-building Fund, which thus now amounts to over $\pm 13,000$, and that the balance should be applied to garden improvements.

At the request of the Council, the Committee of Auditors appointed in January, 1920, held a special meeting to audit the accounts of the Refreshment Department. The results of their financial investigations are embodied in the accounts of the Society for 1920. The Council appointed a Committee from its own body to discuss the Refreshment Department and make recommendations. On their Report the Council is enquiring into the possibility and cost of providing the greatly increased accommodation required for serving the public with tea, and for plant and stores. If such accommodation can be provided at a reasonable cost, it is intended to begin the operations immediately after the end of this season.

27. MENAGERIE.—Great progress was made in restoring the Collection to its pre-war condition. Important collections were received from New York, Calcutta and Singapore, and Mr. Frost, whom the Society sent to the Malay Archipelago, brought back many interesting birds. Among the individual purchases made, a young female hippopotamus and three polar bear cubs were the most notable. Mr. Frost has been sent on a second expedition to the Malay Archipelago, and is expected to return in July.

ACCOUNTS.

28. STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1920 is issued to Fellows, bound with this report.

29. Assets 1919 AND 1920.—The Total Assets of the Society amounted to $\pm 108,171$ 10s. 8d., a decrease of $\pm 3,178$ 17s. 0d. on the corresponding figures for 1919. This is due to the nature of our tenure of the gardens, which prevents us from including amounts spent on new buildings and other structural improvements among our assets.

30. LIABILITIES 1919 and 1920.—The cash and contingent liabilities amounted to £12,945 8s. 2d., a

decrease of $\pounds 10,650$ 3s. 10d. on the corresponding figures for 1919, due chiefly to the smaller amount reserved for contracts not completed.

31. BALANCE 1919 AND 1920.—The balance, a surplus of assets over liabilities, amounted to $\pm 95,226$ 2s. 6d., an increase of $\pm 7,471$ 6s. 10d. over the corresponding figure for 1919, and representing the difference between the decrease in assets (paragraph 29) and decrease in liabilities (paragraph 30).

32. INCOME 1919 AND 1920.—There was again an increase in the income for 1920, due chiefly to increase in the numbers of visitors to the gardens.

33. EXPENDITURE 1919 AND 1920.—There are very few heads under which there was not an increase. It was found necessary to increase the wages of the staff by a further 13s. weekly in the case of adults, and 6s. 6d. weekly in the case of those under 18. These increases were in addition to the permanent rises of £1 and 10s. granted in 1919 and are regarded as a bonus to be reconsidered if prices shall fall.

34. GENERAL STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Council have good reason to be gratified with the general financial position of the Society. The income from nearly every source has risen rapidly, and the negotiable reserves have increased.

35. The Council wishes to acknowledge the assistance received during the past year from the members of the Committee of Publication, upon whom devolved, in accordance with the By-laws, the arrangement and supervision of the Society's Scientific Publications.

The Council has finally to ask you to thank those

Fellows of the Society who have audited the Accounts for the past year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF AUDITORS OF THE ACCOUNTS

OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY

OF LONDON,

APPOINTED 19th JANUARY, 1921.

The Committee of Auditors of the Zoological Society of London, appointed on 19th January, 1921, submit to the Society the annexed Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1920.

We have pleasure in reporting that we have examined the Statement of Accounts of the Society at 31st December, 1920, with the books of the Society, that we have verified the balances in the Bankers' hands and that in our opinion the Balance Sheet exhibits a correct view of the general state of the Funds of the Society according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us and as shewn by the Books of the Society.

The Accounts for the year have been audited in detail by Mr. W. B. Keen, Chartered Accountant, and his certificate is appended thereto. The Accounts of the Refreshment Department for the year ended 25th September, 1920, have been separately audited by Messrs. Edward Moore and Sons, and submitted to the Committee of Auditors, appointed on 21st January, 1920, and the results are incorporated in the Accounts now submitted.

It will be seen that the excess of Expenditure over Income has been £2,009 10s. 6d., which is arrived at after charging expenditure to the amount of £7,369 18s. 1d. excess of amounts set aside last year for new works, and after transferring to the Refreshment Room Rebuilding Fund the sum of £3,000, which Fund now stands at £13,562 17s. 8d. There is also charged £223 15s. 8d., Interest on Loan from the Bankers for the new buildings, which Loan has been reduced this year by £2,000, leaving a balance of £5,000 still outstanding, for which the Bankers hold security.

The Balance standing to the credit of the Old Composition Fund, amounting to ± 100 , has been transferred to Income and Expenditure Account. The New Composition Fund has been increased by Composition Fees received amounting to ± 810 . This Fund now stands at $\pm 10,305$ and is separately invested, the Income therefrom being carried to the Income and Expenditure Account.

The sum of £2,920 10s. 6d. had been provided to meet depreciation to 31st December, 1919, and a further sum has now been set aside, bringing the Reserve up to £4,967 10s. 3d.
