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## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year ending 31st December, 1923.

### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

1. The Ninety-fifth Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Tuesday, April 29th, 1924, at 4 p.m., at the Offices of the Society, in the Gardens, Regent's Park, N.W.8.

### 2. PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING. (By-laws, Chapter VIII., Sections 1 and 2.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows:—

- 1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual Meeting.
- 2. The appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
- 3. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously
  - issued to Fellows.
- 4. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- 5. Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the Report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

5. LIST OF FELLOWS.—A revised edition will be published during the Summer of 1924. Any corrections should be sent to the Secretary before April 30th, 1924.

6. RETIREMENT OF CHIEF CLERK.—Mr. W. H. Cole retired on pension from his post as Chief Clerk on July 15th, 1923. Mr. Cole had been in the Society's Office since 1878 and will be much missed by a large number of Fellows to whom his courteous and efficient services were known personally. He has been succeeded by Mr. W. C. Harris, his senior Assistant.

7. MEDALS.-No Medal was conferred in 1923.

8. SCIENTIFIC GRANTS.—The Council made a donation of £10 to the National Trust towards the preservation of Wicken Fen and of £100 to a fund for the purchase of the Farne Islands as a permanent sanctuary for birds. The life composition fees were paid in respect of four Fellows on account of special services they had rendered to the Society.

9. THE WORLD LIST OF SCIENTIFIC PERIODICALS.— Permission was given to register the Society's House as the office of the "World List of Scientific Periodicals" an Association which is engaged in preparing and publishing a list of all the periodicals which publish the results of scientific research, with indications of libraries in Great Britain and Ireland filing the periodicals. It is hoped that this list when printed will be of great use to zoologists as well as to those engaged in other branches of science.

10. SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.—The usual twelve meetings for scientific business were held. The Society's Rooms were also lent to the British Ornithologists' Union, to the Avicultural Society, and to the Society for the Protection

of the Fauna of the Empire.

11. SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS.—The Abstract was issued as usual. The Transactions, suspended during the war, have not yet been resumed. The Proceedings, Part IV of 1922, were issued on February 15th, 1923; Part I of 1923 on April 12th, 1923; Part II on July 6th, 1923; Part III on September 3rd, 1923; and Part IV on December 27th, 1923.

12. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD. — Volume 58, containing Records of the literature chiefly of 1921, was published on October 22nd, 1923, under the editorship of Mr. W. L. Sclater, with a portrait and memoir of the late Dr. Sharp, F.R.S., F.Z.S., who had edited the annual volumes since 1892. Parts I to X inclusive and Parts XII, XIII and XV had been published on September 8th, 1923, and Parts XI, XIV and XVI on October 9th, 1923.

Volume 59, dealing with the literature of 1922, is now passing through the Press, and it is hoped that it will be issued complete early this summer, the separate Parts being issued as they are ready.

It will be remembered that in the Report for the year 1922, the Council stated that although it had sanctioned the compilation of Volume 59, it would not pay for the printing and publication of that volume or of subsequent volumes unless substantial aid came from other sources, especially from institutions or persons more directly concerned than this Society with zoological bibliography. In order to clarify the issue, the Secretary, with the cognisance of Council, made it known that a net loss of about £500 on each annual volume was to be regarded as a sufficient contribution from the Society to this part of its scientific work. By direction of the Council, the Secretary took steps to make this policy known to those who might be interested in the maintenance of the Record. The response, of which particulars are given on page 10, was sufficiently encouraging to justify the publication of Volume 59. The Council has further sanctioned the compilation of Volume 60 (literature of 1923) and 61 (literature of 1924) in order that there may be no delay if the continuation of outside support justifies publication. The Council are gratified to report that the Imperial Entomological Bureau which had undertaken the preparation of the Parts dealing with Insecta for 1922 and 1923 on receipt of the usual recorder's fees, has now agreed to undertake the same work for 1924 without fee. In consideration of this the Bureau is to be supplied with copies of the Insecta Record at a rate that will just cover cost.

The outlook for the Zoological Record is thus more promising than last year, but even with continued direct assistance it cannot be regarded as secure unless there is a great increase in the number of copies sold. The price of the whole volume makes a large circulation very unlikely, but there seems little reason why many more individual zoologists should not purchase the Sections with which they are specially concerned. These will be published and issued to subscribers as they are ready, in most cases considerably before the issue of the complete volume. On the advice of the Zoological Record Committee, the Editor and Recorders of Sections are to expand the subject index in future.

13. ZOOLOGICAL RECORD: PRICES.—On account of the greatly increased cost of production it has been found necessary to fix the price of the Annual Volumes of the Zoological Record at  $\pm 3$  (or Subscription price, paid in advance,  $\pm 2$  10s.).

15. GARDEN GUIDE AND PICTURE POST CARDS.—The twenty-first edition of the Garden Guide was issued in 1923, and in the course of the year 64,825 copies were sold. Since 1904, when the Guide became the property of the Society, 1,035,029 copies have been sold. The twentysecond edition, revised, and with many new photographs, will be published about Easter. Of picture post cards, 233,002 were sold in 1923.

18. CARD CATALOGUE.—The Librarian and his Assistant have made further progress with the Subject Card Index and the Geographical (Zoological) Card Index of the Works in the Library.

19. CINEMATOGRAPH RECORDS.—Mr. Martin Duncan and the operators of British Instructional Films, Ltd., have taken a further series of records in the Gardens. In this they have been assisted by the voluntary efforts of Miss Grace M. Callow, a Fellow of the Society who devotes most of her leisure to making friends with animals in the collection, acquiring their confidence by unusual patience and natural disposition. Some of the records have been exhibited commercially through the Instructional Films Company and under the agreement profits are accruing to the Society, most of which went last year in expenditure on electric equipment.

20. PROSECTORIUM.—Dr. Sonntag has continued to act as Anatomist, with general supervision of the Prosectorium, and Dr. Lucas as Pathologist. Professor R. T. Leiper, F.R.S., working through a panel of experts, has been responsible for the collection and identification of parasites. As before, type specimens of new species are presented to the British Museum (Natural History) in the name of the Society, and other material is dealt with under the direction of the Prosectorial Committee.

Reports from Dr. Sonntag, Dr. Lucas and Professor Leiper follow :--

Dr. C. F. Sonntag, the Society's Anatomist, reports: "During the year five papers, containing results of my investigations, have been published in the Society's Scientific Proceedings. These included studies on the nervous system, tongue, and generative organs, and the second of a series of monographs on the Primates.

The Department is proving of great use to students who are supplementing their course of human anatomy at University College by dissections of the Anthropoid Apes. Miss Kahan and Messrs. Henderson, Meneces, Ogden, Jackson, Awrounin, and Scheinfein have worked in the Prosectorium. Miss Knobel, and Dr. R. H. Hunter have carried out private investigations.

Specimens have also been sent to the British Museum, and the National Museum of Wales."

Dr. Lucas, the Society's Pathologist, reports: "During 1923, as a result of the systematic post-mortem examination of specimens dying in the menagerie, a large number of interesting pathological conditions have been observed and described in the special catalogue kept for the purpose. The more remarkable of these have been preserved as far as possible in the original colours, by means of the Kaiserling process, and microscopical specimens have also been kept. These specimens have been used for demonstration to the Society and to medical societies. Some illustrating diseases of birds were lent to Capt. Rice, F.R.C.V.S., of the Ministry of Agriculture. In addition to this, material has been sent to the Royal Army Medical College, Millbank; types of organisms isolated have been sent to the Collection of Type Cultures at the Lister Institute, and a strain of avian pneumococcus has been sent to the Pathological Department of St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

Material has also been sent to the following individuals:-Professor Wooldridge, F.R.C.V.S., of The Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons; Dr. J. Gaskell, Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge; Professor S. L. Cummings, C.B., C.M.G., The University of Cardiff; Dr. Barnard, Mr. Timbrell Fisher, Mr. F. S. Barrington, Dr. M'Nee, Dr. Wilson, University College Hospital.

The pathologist has isolated several organisms causing disease among the animals belonging to the Society. His work of isolating the active principle of the poison in the spores of the mould *Aspergillus fumigatus* has made considerable progress and it is hoped that it will be completed in the near future.

A summary of the pathological records for 1923 was read at the Scientific Meeting of February 5, 1924, and printed in the Part I. of the *Scientific Proceedings* for 1924."

Professor R. T. Leiper, F.R.S., reports :— "All animals dying in the Gardens during the past year, with the exception of rare specimens reserved for morphological studies by the Anatomist, have been examined for parasitic entozoa and the material collected has been identified and reported upon monthly to the Prosectorial Committee. The task of visiting the Prosectorium daily and of making the monthly returns has been undertaken by a panel of parasitologists formed by the Staff's associated workers of the Institute of Agricultural Helminthology (Ministry of Agriculture), and the Helminthological Department of the London School of Tropical Medicine. The following have participated in the scheme :—T. W. M. Cameron, M.R.C.V.S., Ph.D., B.Sc., R. J. Ortlepp, M.A., Ph.D., F.Z.S., H. H. Scott, M.D., M.R.C.P., F.R.S.E., T. Goodey, D.Sc., D. O. Morgan, B.Sc., G. S. Thapar, M.Sc., R. T. Leiper, M.D., D.Sc., F.R.S., F.Z.S.

A series of identified parasites has been formed and placed in a suitable cabinet in the Offices of the Society."

21. SANATORIUM.—During the War, the Sanatorium could not be fully used. It was refitted in 1922, both as a quarantine station and for the treatment of sick animals. Dr. Vevers, Superintendent of the Gardens, is in charge of it, with the assistance of Drs. Sonntag and Lucas in collaboration with the Curators and Professor Wooldridge, F.Z.S., Honorary Consulting Veterinary Surgeon to the Society.

22. VISITORS TO THE GARDENS.—The total number of visitors to the gardens in 1923 was 1,613,125, the largest in the history of the Society. The following Tables give comparative figures :—

23. Addission to the Gardens.\*—The Gardens are open daily throughout the year (except Christmas Day, when they are closed) from 9 a.m. until sunset, or 8 p.m., when sunset is later. The arrangements for admission are as follows :—

Fellows.—Every Fellow, Honorary Member, Foreign Member, Imperial Fellow or Corresponding Member may enter with two visitors by signing his or her name in the Gate-Book, but is not entitled to admit more than two visitors in this way on the same day. The husband or wife of a Fellow may use this privilege in the absence of the Fellow, but both husband and wife may not admit visitors on the same day.

Other Visitors.—On SUNDAYS only when personally accompanied and signed for as above, or on presentation of tickets. Written messages or the visiting cards of Fellows cannot be accepted. On WEEK-DAYS, when personally accompanied and signed for as above; on presentation of tickets; or by payment. The prices for admission by payment are as follows:—

Mondays throughout the year, except Bank Holidays, 6d. each person.

Bank Holidays, 1s. each adult; 6d. each child under 12 years.

Other Days, except Sundays, 1s. each adult; 6d. each child under 12 years.

Infants in arms are admitted free.

The following reduced prices for EXCURSION TICKETS for Parties on any fixed date (except Sunday) may be obtained upon application at the Society's Office. Should the date chosen for the visit to the Gardens be found unsuitable, the tickets, upon being returned will be redated for another day during the year of issue.

CHEAP ORDERS for the admission from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. of Children from Elementary Council Schools on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday (except during Easter and Whitsun weeks) may be obtained for parties of not less than 25 Children and one Teacher at the rate of one penny each child and fivepence for each Teacher. There must be at least one Teacher to every 25 children. The Children, with their Teachers, must be out of the Gardens by 1 p.m.

24. GARDENS' STAFF.-As stated in the Annual Report last year, Mr. R. I. Pocock, F.R.S., retired on pension last March, and Dr. G. M. Vevers became chief of the Gardens' staff on a year's probation. Dr. Vevers carried out his duties with such energy and success that in December, 1923, the Council shortened his year of probation and placed him on the regular annual staff from January 1, 1924. Mr. D. Seth-Smith, formerly Curator of Birds and Inspector of Works, gave up his duties in connection with works on the appointment of Dr. Vevers, and became Resident Curator of Mammals and Birds, and has occupied his new post with characteristic devotion. As the Aquarium approached completion it was found that it left Mr. Boulenger little time for other duties. Accordingly he was appointed Director of the Aquarium and was succeeded as Curator of Reptiles by Miss Joan B. Procter, F.Z.S., F.L.S., who was already highly distinguished for her scientific work on Reptiles and Batrachians at the British Museum (Nat. Hist.) and in addition had been accustomed from childhood to the care of living examples of these difficult creatures. Miss Cheesman, the Curator of Insects, was given ten months leave of absence from October, 1923, as she desired to go on a projected expedition to the South Seas, and Mr.

Bushby from the Entomological Department of the Imperial College of Science is acting as Curator during her absence.

Professor G. H. Wooldridge, F.R.C.V.S., F.Z.S., Honorary Veterinary Surgeon to the Society, has given most valuable advice and treatment. The Society is much indebted to his skill and attention.

Dr. Vevers after experience of his duties for some months, at the suggestion of the Secretary and in consultation with the Curators, drew up a scheme for the reorganisation of the Menagerie staff and a new set of rules for their direction. These were discussed by the Garden Committee and on its recommendation finally approved by the Council.

The chief change has been the formation of the new rank of Overseer and the abolition of the old rank of Head Keeper. There are at present four men holding the rank of Overseer

- J. Shelley in charge of Ungulates,
- C. Dixon in charge of Carnivora and Small Mammals,
- J. Bailey in charge of Birds,
- H. Vinall in charge of the Aquarium.

The Overseers are responsible to the Curators for the sections allotted to them and in control of the keepers and helpers attached to the sections. Apart from sectional duties they are responsible generally for the conduct of the Menagerie staff and for the organisation of the Riding. The remainder of the staff have been classed as 1st class, 2nd class and 3rd class keepers, helpers and miscellaneous staff.

All salaries and war bonuses have been consolidated.

The Council are glad to report that the changes made in staff and in organisation in the course of the year appear to have been followed by much greater efficiency which has already led to marked improvement in the general appearance of the Gardens and in the health of the animals. 25. GATEKEEPERS.—Until last year there were only three permanent Gatekeepers, but this number was too small on Bank Holidays and busy days and it was the practice to call upon keepers from the various houses to act as relief men. This meant that in many cases certain houses and stations were neglected.

Two additional permanent Gatekeepers have been taken on, and on busy days and Bank Holidays extra men, skilled in turnstile management, have been obtained from the Corps of Commissionaires.

26. GARDENING DEPARTMENT.—Under the supervision of Mr. Wall, the Society's Head Gardener, there has been an excellent display of flowers throughout the year. In addition to the ordinary routine, bedding and other work, many improvements have been made. Old shrubberies have been cleared and a number of new flowering and evergreen shrubs have been planted. The turf surrounding the flower beds in front of the Birds of Prey Aviaries has all been raised and relaid. New turf has been laid in all the Aviaries and Pheasantries.

There has been a marked improvement in the general cleanliness and absence of litter throughout the Gardens; this is a matter upon which the Gardening staff are to be congratulated.

# 27. WORKS, EXTRAORDINARY.

Roads.—It is intended, within the next few years, to make the main roads in the Gardens sufficiently strong to withstand the heavy traffic to which they are continually being subjected. The first section of this work was completed in the early part of the year. The road from the Stores yard to the Sanatorium was widened and laid with tarmacadam over a specially prepared foundation of hard core. A similar road from the Time-keeper's gate to the back of the Refreshment Rooms was also made.

Fellows' Tea Pavilion.—The service accommodation in this building, which was insufficient for busy days, has been greatly enlarged and additional seating for Fellows has been provided behind the Pavilion. Artesian Well.—A boring has been sunk to a depth of 605 ft. in the chalk, to provide an adequate supply of pure water for the Gardens and Aquarium. It is hoped that the yield will be 8,000 gallons per hour, but at the time of going to press with this Report the tests were not complete.

Lion House.—The fourteen show cages in the Lion House have been cleaned, steam disinfected and tiled with glazed tiles to a height of 5 feet. Corner shelves of wood and scratching posts have been provided in all the cages and large windows have been cut through the wall into the sleeping dens to provide light and ventilation.

The roof over the cages and sleeping dens has been entirely re-slated and made waterproof.

28. WORKS, ORDINARY.—In addition to a large number of minor work and repairs, the following more important works have been successfully carried out by the Works staff of the Gardens, under the supervision of Mr. W. Ball, Clerk of Works to the Society.

### NORTH BANK GARDENS.

The Brush Turkey Aviary and The Cranes' Paddocks have been re-wired and painted.

Pheasantries.—The floors of the Pheasantries have been laid in concrete throughout and dusting baths provided. The paths in each aviary have been dug up and relaid with ashes and gravel.

Lemur House.—A new boiler has been installed in this house.

MIDDLE GARDEN—*Hippopotamus House.*—Owing to the arrival of the young Pigmy Hippopotamus it was found necessary to provide extra accommodation in this house. A reinforced concrete partition was made dividing the sleeping place of the larger Hippos into two; a sliding door was made in this and both iron gates leading into the pond were put in working order.

Gazelle Sheds.—The outside yards have been walled round with reinforced concrete and wire fencing, all the drains have been put in order and wallowing troughs for Tropical Swine have been constructed in two of the yards. Canal Bank Aviary.—This aviary has been thoroughly repaired, the side walls renewed and the whole painted. Large shelters of canvas have been put up at each end and new perches fixed.

Beavers' Paddock.—The Paddock has been considerably enlarged and a concrete platform has been made for the animals to feed on. All foul earth and turf has been removed and a new surface laid down.

Insect House and Butterfly Cage.—Twenty two cases for Insects have been made to the design of the Curator of Insects and five of the Bays in the House have been fitted with blinds and sloping ceilings.

The Butterfly Cage has been re-covered with copper gauze.

MAIN GARDENS—Lion House.—In addition to the alterations and tiling of the show cages, the sleeping dens have all been disinfected and limewashed, breeding boxes have been provided in several of the outside and inside dens and the whole of the service passage cleared and whitewashed.

A metal bridge has been constructed connecting the two sides of the house, which will do away with the necessity of boxing up any animals which have to be moved from one end of the house to the other.

A large cage, for the reception of newly arrived or sick animals, has been constructed in the service passage.

The service yard at the back of the house has been enlarged and a fly-proof meat safe provided.

An additional outside cage has been constructed at the East end of the house; this communicates with a new den in the service passage.

Mappin Terraces.—Two enclosures for Musk Oxen have been made in front of the Mappin Terraces, in one of which a concrete shelter has been erected. Cattle Paddocks.—Ferro-concrete partitions have been erected between the Paddocks to replace the wooden ones, which had fallen into a state of disrepair. Concrete paths have been made in each paddock. The old surface of ashes has been removed and a thick layer of Thames ballast laid down.

Deer Paddocks.—The drains in these paddocks have all been put in order, and a new surface of Thames ballast has been laid.

Eastern Aviary.—The roof of the outside cages has been entirely re-wired.

Monkey House.—This house was thoroughly overhauled in the early spring. All the windows were made to open, the centre cages were re-wired, and small boxes with sliding doors were placed in each wall cage so that animals could be shut in for cleansing.

False bottoms of wire have been made for all the wall cages to prevent the food being fouled.

Ostrich Paddocks.—The old surface has been removed and a thick layer of Thames Ballast has been laid down in each Paddock.

Small Bird House.—It was found that the wooden aviary at the end of this house was unsuitable for small birds as it could not be properly cleaned. This was removed and two tiers of smaller cages were made and put in its place.

Llama House.—This house was altered to provide accommodation for two female Llamas and their calves. The passage behind was divided and two sleeping rooms made. Two extra paddocks have also been made on each side of the house, and these have been surrounded with a high fence.

29. WORKS, MISCELLANEOUS. -- Cinematograph Studio. --An outdoor studio has been made behind the Society's Offices to enable films of animals to be taken under the most favourable and natural conditions. Tarring the Roads.—In addition to the extensive repair to roads mentioned under special works, most of the main paths in the Gardens have been tarred and topped with shingle.

Ticket Office for Riding Tickets.—Owing to the large queues for Riding Tickets it has been found necessary to open another Ticket Office on busy days; this has been constructed in the porch of the Antelope House.

Canal Bank.—The Path along the South side of the canal has been widened and a number of recesses for seats have been made.

Laboratories.—The Laboratory over the Reptile House has been divided into two by a partition, one side being used by the Anatomist and Pathologist, the other by the Curator of Reptiles.

Sanatorium.—An operating theatre and pharmacy have been fitted up, and extra radiators for heating installed.

Seating Accommodation.—Thirty seven garden seats were purchased with a legacy of £150 left to the Society by the late C. Bogler, F.Z.S. A bronze tablet suitably inscribed has been attached to each seat. Forty garden arm-chairs were purchased for use on the Fellows' Lawn.

During the past year a great effort has been made to clean, overhaul, and paint all the houses in the Gardens. With the exception of the Elephant House the interiors of all large houses were cleaned, painted and distempered ; it is hoped that this year it will be possible to paint and overhaul the exterior of most of the houses.

Early in the year the Society purchased an Aerograph paint-spraying machine; this has been in continual use and proved very satisfactory a great saving being made in labour, time and brushes.

Another machine of the same type has been purchased with a view to increasing the amount of painting and distempering.

In the case of many of the Houses the painting and distempering has been done by the keepers of the various sections, with very good result. The following is a list of Houses and Aviaries which have been cleaned, painted, and distempered during 1923:

### 30. NEW WORKS FOR 1924.

Roads.—In continuation of the scheme, started last year, for laying down all the main roads of the Gardens with tarmacadam, the road from the South to Main Gates and the road from the Timekeeper's Gate to join it have been laid with tarmacadam suitable for withstanding heavy traffic.

Lion House.-It is considered that the successful

breeding of the Lion Cubs during the past year was in a measure due to the fact that they had free access to the open air. In order to extend the accommodation for breeding, two new outside Lion Cages with breeding boxes are being constructed, which will communicate by bridges with the interior of the Lion House.

Engineer's Workshop.—The large room at the western end of the Mappin Terraces will be converted into a workshop for the Engineers of the Aquarium. Reptile House.—The Pythons' Cage in the Reptile House has been altered and divided into three compartments by sliding doors so that the snakes can be more easily shut away for cleaning.

Tortoise House.—An enclosure is to be made in the Tortoise House for Monitor Lizards, which have hitherto had unsuitable quarters in the Reptile House.

Antelope Paddock.—A large rock shelter is being con structed in the Antelope Paddock.

Diving Bird House.—The Diving Bird House has been altered to provide accommodation for Tropical Wading Birds during the winter months.

31. HYGIENE AND SANITATION.—A special effort has been made during the past year to improve the surroundings of the animals from the hygienic point of view, and also to ensure a clean and wholesome food supply.

Particular attention has been paid to the Butcher's Shop and Stores Department; many changes have been made in the method of distribution of food to the different houses, a higher standard of quality of every class of food being insisted upon; meat safes and storage bins have been issued to all houses, and new cutting-up tables and butcher's blocks have been provided.

A regular inspection of these ensures that they are kept clean; as a result there is already a marked improvement in the condition and health of all the animals.

Experiments with various types of disinfectants have

been made with the result that a derivative of sodium hypochlorite has been found to be the most satisfactory for fish-eating birds and mammals, both as an antiseptic and a deodoriser.

32. COLOURED LABELS.—The coloured labels, painted in fusible enamels on tiles, appear to stand the weather successfully and their use is being extended as quickly as possible. 33. BAND.—On the advice of a special committee, with the object of improving the quality of the performances of music given in the Gardens, the Council appointed the Band of the 65th (8th London) Brigade, R.F.A., to play last season. The results were judged highly successful and the same band of 25 men and the conductor have been selected to play in the Gardens on Saturday and Sunday afternoons from May 31st, 1924, to August 31st, 1924, both dates inclusive.

34. REFRESHMENT DEPARTMENT.-The Accounts have been audited, as usual, by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons. The gross profits for 52 weeks amounted, after feeding the Staff, to £31,090 5s. 9d. The working expenses for the same period amounted to £14,381 17s. 9d., leaving a trading profit of £16,708 8s. 0d. After making the usual allowances for rent, depreciation, and licence duties, etc., and allotting the receipts from the lavatories on the same lines as last year, and deducting the Manager's salary and percentage, there was a net profit to the Society amounting to £10,880 9s. 1d. Of that amount, the sum of £330 9s. 1d. was allotted to repaying the Works Department for work carried out at the Refreshment Rooms. The balance of £10,550 has been carried forward, but out of this £2,500 must be reserved towards the payment of Income Tax, Schedule D.

At the request of the Council, the Committee of Auditors appointed in January, 1923 held a special meeting to audit the accounts of the Refreshment Department. The results of their investigations have been incorporated in the accounts of the Society for the current year.

In addition to the ordinary repairs and redecoration of the Refreshment Department's premises, the following improvements were put in hand early in 1924 and will be completed or well-advanced by the Annual Meeting :---

(1) A Small Refreshment Bar is being built in the corner between the Small Bird House and the Old Bears' Den in the place of the Shed which has been used for that purpose since the war.

- (2) A Cheap Tea Pavilion is being erected on the concrete base prepared last year between the Wolves' Dens and the Reptile House, hitherto occupied by a tent.
- (3) A Soda Fountain and Bar is being erected on the Old Terrace. There will be covered-in seating accommodation provided in connection with this building.
- (4) The Service Department of the Refreshment Room is being rebuilt.

35. AQUARIUM.—As announced to the Fellows by circular letter in March of this year, the opening of the new Aquarium by the President was arranged for April 5th. On that day and the following Sunday it was reserved for Fellows each of whom was invited to have one guest. From Monday, April 7th, it was open to Fellows and visitors under the Rules for Admission which were announced at the Monthly General Meeting last July and are set on p. 33 and on the cover.

The decision to complete the Mappin Terraces by the construction of a first-rate aquarium for fresh-water and marine animals was explained in the Report for 1921 (par. 24) and further details were given in the Report for 1922 (par. 27). The Aquarium contains a fresh-water hall, a sea-water hall, a tropical room, large service accommodation and laboratories for research. The tanks on the north side are lighted both by daylight and by electricity; those on the south side by electricity alone. The filters are on ground level and there are large storage reservoirs in the basement and high level reservoirs under the peaks of the Terrace. The heating is by steam and the circulating and aerating plant have electric motors. The course of circulation is from the high level reservoirs by gravity to the exhibition tanks and from these also by gravity through the filters to the underground storage tanks from which the water is pumped to the high level reservoir. The sea water has been obtained from the Atlantic near the entrance to the English Channel and the first supply will probably be sufficient for many years, although it may be useful to refresh it by the addition of small quantities every other year.

Since 1912 the Secretary and Mr. E. G. Boulenger, by personal visits and correspondence, had been making themselves acquainted with the details of all the existing They also received specially valuable advice Aquaria. from Dr. E. J. Allen, F.R.S., F.Z.S., Director of the Plymouth Laboratory of the British Marine Biological Association, Mr. A. F. J. Portielje, C.M.Z.S., Inspector of the Amsterdam Aquarium, Dr. C. F. Townsend, Director of the Aquarium of the New York Zoological Society, and from many other experts. Acting on their instructions, Mr. J. J. Joass, F.Z.S., of Messrs. Belcher and Joass, prepared the detailed architectural plans and Sir Alexander Gibb and Partners designed and superintended the construction of the circulating, lighting, heating and ventilating plant. Miss Joan B. Procter, now the Society's Curator of Reptiles, designed and constructed scale models from which the very successful rockwork of the exhibition tanks was carried out. The Council desire to record their appreciation of the devotion and energy which Mr. E. G. Boulenger has given to superintending every detail of the construction, equipment and stocking of the Aquarium. They regard it as a special advantage that he will bring to his new duties as Director a complete knowledge of all the details of construction and equipment. He has taken as his chief assistant at the Aquarium, Vinall, formerly headkeeper at the Reptile House, who, under his direction, has shewn great aptitude for his new duties. In the course of last summer Vinall was sent to Amsterdam for a fortnight where, by the courtesy of Dr. Kerbert, Director of the Zoological Gardens, he was given every facility for studying a well-managed aquarium in actual operation.

It will be remembered that the preliminary estimate of

the cost of the Aquarium was  $\pounds 50,000$ . This was to be met by the proceeds of the sale of the Society's freehold in Hanover Square which realised  $\pounds 23,000$ , and by a loan from the Bankers of  $\pounds 27,000$ , generously guaranteed by the President, His Grace the Duke of Bedford, K.G., F.R.S., and the Fishmongers' Company. At the time of writing this Report, the complete accounts had not been received. There were some unforeseen details which entailed additional expenditure and the decision to defer the opening from late autumn to the spring of this year, although doubtless advantageous in the long run, added to the cost of maintenance. But, including stocking and professional fees, the total cost will be only between £2,000 and £3,000 over the estimate. It has been arranged to defray this additional cost as well as £5,000 of the estimated cost out of the surplus of 1923, so that at the end of 1924 the loan from the Bankers will be less than the amount arranged for.

An Illustrated Guide to the Aquarium has been prepared and is on sale at the price of 6d. It belongs to the Society.

#### RULES FOR ADMISSION TO THE AQUARIUM.

Fellows (including Honorary Members, Foreign Members and Corresponding Members) have free personal admission on Sundays and Week-days by signing in the book at the Aquarium Entrance Hall; but this privilege cannot be transferred.

They also have the privilege of purchasing books of 20 Aquarium tickets for  $\pounds 1$ , each ticket to admit 1 adult or 2 children. Smaller numbers of Aquarium tickets can be purchased by Fellows at the Office, but not at the Aquarium.

The Public have admission to the Aquarium on Weekdays by paying an extra charge, which follows the charge for admission to the Gardens: that is to say, 1/- for adults and 6d. for children under 12 on Week-days and Bank Holidays, except ordinary Mondays, when it is 6d for everyone. On Sundays admission is limited to Fellows and to those to whom they have given Aquarium tickets.

Children from the Public Elementary Schools admitted

to the Gardens on five Week-day mornings at the rate of 1d. each, are also admitted to the Aquarium at the rate of an additional 1d. each, the tickets to be purchased in advance, but the regulation as to the children keeping in queue in charge of their teachers must be strictly observed.

Parties admitted to the Gardens at reduced rates pay the full price for admission to the Aquarium.

36. MENAGERIE.—The collection of animals has now been more than restored to its pre-war condition and in many sections is finer than ever before in the history of the Society.

The general health of the collection has been good. Crude statistics give misleading accounts when they relate, as in the case of the Zoological Gardens, to collections of animals with different natural lengths of life. The Society's pathologist reads each year, usually at one of the Scientific Meetings in February, an analysis of the deaths in the preceding year with their causes. Fellows who desire information are referred to Part I of the Scientific Proceedings each year in which the pathologist's report is published in full.

The statistics as to breeding are also not wholly satisfactory as an indication of the general state of health of the animals, for the obvious reason that a collection intended primarily for exhibition requires different arrangements from one suitable for breeding. An instructive example is the breeding of lions. For the first time for over a quarter of a century the Society bred and reared two litters of lions. The success was due to several reasons. Sir Edward Northey had presented two very fine young males which were mated with two lionesses already in the collection. Very special care was given by the new Curator of Mammals to the housing and feeding of the mothers, both before and after birth. But probably the most important factor was securing absolute privacy for the mother and cubs for many weeks, which could be done only by forbidding the keepers to take Fellows or visitors "behind the scenes"-a step which caused many protests.

# ACCOUNTS.

40. STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1923 is issued to Fellows, bound with this report.

41. Assets 1922 AND 1923.—The Total Assets of the Society amounted to  $\pm 91,599$  6s. 9d., a decrease of  $\pm 24,783$  3s. 5d. on the corresponding figures for 1922. This is the net result of various changes, including the sale of No. 3 Hanover Square, towards the cost of the Aquarium. The full effect of that undertaking will appear in the Report for 1924.

42. LIABILITIES 1922 AND 1923.—The cash liabilities amounted to  $\pounds 8,036$  4s. 2d., an increase of  $\pounds 2,239$  8s. 4d. on the corresponding figures for 1922, due to the greater amount of work actually in progress at the end of the year.

43. BALANCE 1922 AND 1923.—The balance, a surplus of assets over liabilities, amounted to £83,563 2s. 7d., a decrease of £27,022 11s. 9d. on the corresponding figure for 1922, and representing the sum of the decrease in assets (paragraph 41) and increase in liabilities (paragraph 42).

44. INCOME 1922 AND 1923.—There was a net increase in income of about £8,000 due largely to gate-money.

45. EXPENDITURE 1922 AND 1923.—There was an increase of about  $\pounds 6,000$  in expenditure, as the larger income of the Society made it possible to proceed with improvements.

46. GENERAL STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The finances of the Society are in a satisfactory condition which would be more apparent if credit could be taken for the large outlay on improvements and additions to the buildings in the Gardens. 47. The Council wishes to acknowledge the assistance received during the past year from the members of the Committee of Publication, upon whom devolved, in accordance with the By-laws, the arrangement and supervision of the Society's Scientific Publications.

The Council has finally to ask you to thank those Fellows of the Society who have audited the Accounts for the past year.



In accordance with Chapter X of the By-laws, we have examined the Accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December, 1923, as presented to us by Messrs. W. B. Keen & Co., the Chartered Accountants appointed to assist us in our duties. We report to the Society that at that date the Total Assets amounted to  $\pm 91,599$  6s. 9d., and the Liabilities to  $\pm 8,036$  4s. 2d. The General State of the Funds of the Society therefore showed a surplus of Assets over Liabilities amounting to  $\pm 83,563$  2s. 7d., subject to the estimated values of some of the Assets. The Cash in the Bankers' hands and at the Office amounted to  $\pm 12,878$  17s. 1d.

For the further information of the Fellows of the Society a Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account for the year are annexed hereto. These have been audited and are certified by Messrs. W. B. Keen & Co. The result of the working of the Refreshment Department for the year ended 29th September, 1923, is incorporated in the Statements, the Accounts of that Department having been separately audited and certified by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons, Chartered Accountants. We have examined the Statements of Account and in our opinion the Balance Sheet is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the Funds of the Society (subject to the estimated values of some of the Assets) according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us and as shewn by the Books of the Society.
