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REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year ending 31st December, 1919.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

1. The Ninety-first Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Thursday, April 29th, 1920, at 4 p.m. at the Offices of the Society, in the Gardens, Regent's Park, N.W.

2. PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING. (Bye-laws, Chapter VII., Section 1 and 2.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows:—

1. The reading of the Minutes of the previous Annual

- Meeting.
- 2. The appointment of Scrutineers and opening of the Ballot.
- 3. Presentation of the Auditors' Report, previously issued to Fellows.
- 4. Discussion of the Auditors' Report.
- 5. Presentation of the Council's Annual Report, previously issued to Fellows.

- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the Report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

3. RETURN OF STAFF FROM ACTIVE SERVICE.—Demobilisation, so far as it concerned the members of the Society's service, was completed during 1919. The Society's normal staff consisted of about 150 males, including those unfitted for active service. Of these, 92 volunteered or were called up, and 14 were rejected on medical grounds. The following 12 were killed :— H. D. Monro, W. Bodman, A. G. Whybrow, G. Patterson, William Dexter, William Perkins, Alfred L. Day, and Charles W. Dare, *Menagerie Staff*; A. A. Dermott, Office *Messenger*; H. G. J. Peavot, *Librarian*; R. Jones and Albert Staniford, *Gardeners*.

4. WAR MEMORIAL.-The Council decided to place a permanent war memorial in a prominent position in the Gardens to commemorate those members of the staff who had died in the war. Consideration was given to several suggestions, and the choice fell on an adaptation of a mediæval French "Lantern of the Dead," at La Souterraine, in the valley of the Creuse. A wood and canvas model, of the dimensions thought suitable, was prepared by Messrs. John Bull & Sons, from photographs of the original, under the direction of the Secretary. This was placed on the proposed site, near the main gate, and after its effect had been studied, working drawings were prepared by the Society's architect, Mr. J. J. Joass, and the monument was constructed in Portland stone. It consists of a hexagonal column, placed on steps, with six lights, surmounted by a conical roof bearing a cross. A bronze memorial tablet will be placed on the pedestal. These "Lanterns" date from remote antiquity, and their symbolical meaning has not been ascertained definitely. They were hollow, and contained a pulley by which a lantern could be hoisted to the level of the lights. A twelfth century ecclesiastic, Peter of Cluny, said that the light shining by night was a homage paid by the faithful to dead Christians.

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5. ROLL OF MEMBERS.—The number of Fellows and Fellows Elect on January 1st, 1919, was 4,688, and on January 1st, 1920, was 4,803.

6. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.—During the war, in compliance with the Bye-laws (Chapter VI., Section 4), the names of a number of corresponding members, chiefly subjects of the Central Powers, were removed from the list. It is within the power of the Council to restore these, as vacancies arise, on their application to the Council. The following were elected to fill vacancies on the list :--

7. LIST OF FELLOWS.—The printing of this was suspended during the war, but a new edition, revised to date, is in preparation. Fellows can assist by posting now to the Secretary their permanent address and description desired.

8. LECTURES TO SCHOOL TEACHERS.—The scheme for the instruction of School Teachers, arranged in 1910, by the Council in co-operation with the Education Committee of the London County Council, but suspended during the war, has been resumed. Mr. Frank Balfour-Browne, M.A., F.Z.S., F.R.S.E., conducted a complete course in the autumn of 1919, which was attended by 150 School Teachers. It consisted of three lectures with lantern demonstrations in the Society's Meeting Room, and sufficient practical tours in the Gardens to give the Teachers, in groups of 25, a demonstration for each lecture. The object of the course is to give Teachers such information as may be useful to them when they bring school children to the Gardens. The London County Council makes a grant towards the expenses of the Scheme. A second course begins on May 8th, 1920.

9. GARDEN GUIDE—LECTURER.—The Council arranged with Mr. E. Kay Robinson, to conduct parties of visitors round the Gardens twice weekly, from May to October. Mr. Robinson's lectures were highly appreciated by the fellows and visitors who accompanied him, and it has been arranged to repeat the experiment during the Months of April, May, June and October of 1920. The tours start from the main gate on Tuesdays at 11 a.m., and on Thursdays at 4-30 p.m.

10. PROTECTION OF ANTARCTIC FAUNA.—The Council made representations to the Governments of Australia, New Zealand and Tasmania, with regard to the protection of Seals, Sea-lions, as well as Penguins and other Sea-birds in the Antarctic Seas. The Governments responded favourably and protection has been increased.

11. SCIENTIFIC GRANTS.—The Council made a grant of ± 10 to the National Trust towards the preservation of Wicken Fen, and of ± 30 to the Conjoint Board of Scientific Societies.

12. GODMAN MEMORIAL.—The Council made a donation of £100 to a fund established to commemorate Dr. F. du Cane Godman, F.R.S., by a relief bust in the British Museum (Natural History) and by the establishment of a Fund for Zoological Exploration.

Dr. Frederick du Cane Godman, F.R.S., who died on February 19th, 1919, had been a Fellow of the Society since 1859, and a Member of Council and Vice-President at frequent intervals since 1877. In addition to the great services he had rendered the Zoological Society, he had been one of the most devoted and successful of English Zoologists.

13. RAT EXHIBITION.—The Council arranged in conjunction with the Board of Agriculture and the Local Government Board, each of which made a grant of £100 towards the expenses, to hold an exhibition in the Gardens illustrating the harm caused by Rats and Mice, the lifehistory of these animals, and the known means of destroying them, and also to conduct investigations into methods of dealing with these pests. The work was placed under the immediate direction of Mr. E. G. Boulenger, assisted by Mr. W. C. Harris. The Exhibition was highly appreciated by visitors, and many Sanitary Officials, and Officers in the Navy and Army were given special demonstrations. The results of the investigations were published in a memoir contributed to the Society's Scientific Proceedings by Mr. Boulenger, in which he found it possible to recommend simple measures.

14. SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.—The usual twelve meetings for scientific business were held.

15. SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS.—The Abstract was issued as usual. The Transactions, suspended during the War, have not yet been resumed. The Proceedings have been continued on a smaller scale, with some irregularity due to war delays. Volume fifty-three of the Zoological Record, dealing with the literature of 1916, was published on June 25th, 1919. Volume fifty-four, dealing with 1917, appeared on January 28th, 1920, and the preparation of Volume fifty-five is well advanced and that of fifty-six, dealing with 1919, has been arranged for.

16. GARDEN GUIDE AND PICTURE POST CARDS.—The seventeenth edition of the Garden Guide was issued in 1919, and in the course of the year 78,494 copies were sold. An eighteenth edition is in preparation and it is now possible to resume the larger size and better paper, but the cost of each copy has been raised to 1s., on account of the increase in all the items of production. Since 1903, 769,922 copies of the Guide have been sold. Of picture post cards, 102,815 were sold in 1919.

18. LIBRARIAN.—Mr. F. Martin Duncan, F.Z.S. acted as temporary Librarian and Clerk of Publications during the year, to the complete satisfaction of the Council and the Committees concerned. At the end of the year, after consideration of a number of candidates, his appointment was made permanent.

19. LIBRARY.—The Visitors Book was signed by 433 Fellows and persons introduced by them, and 903 volumes were borrowed under the usual regulations.

The Librarian has commenced the formation of a Subject Card Index and a Geographical (Zoological) Card Index in the Library. Over three thousand cards dealing with Invertebrata have been classified and arranged, and it is hoped these Indexes will be of considerable help to Fellows using the Library.

20. CINEMATOGRAPH RECORDS.—Mr. Martin Duncan, the Society's Librarian, is an expert in taking cinematograph films. The necessary apparatus has been purchased, a developing room has been installed in the basement of the offices, and a series of films of rare animals and interesting events in the gardens has been begun.

21. PROSECTORIUM. — Professor Wood Jones, D.Sc., M.B., F.Z.S., who had very kindly given voluntary superintendence of the Laboratory during the latter years of the war, was unable to continue this work, as he had accepted a chair of anatomy in Australia. Dr. J. A. Murray, F.Z.S., and Miss K. Lander, B.Sc., F.Z.S., who had also voluntarily acted respectively as Pathologist, and as Anatomist, were recalled by their ordinary duties. The Society is much indebted to these Fellows for having carried on the scientific work at the Prosectorium until it became possible to make more permanent arrangements.

Dr. Leiper, F.Z.S., Professor at the Royal School of Tropical Medicine, has been appointed as Director of the Prosectorium, with Dr. Sonntag, F.Z.S., as Anatomical Assistant, Dr. Lucas, F.Z.S., as Pathological Assistant, and Dr. Vevers, F.Z.S., Beit Research Fellow, as honorary Parasitologist.

The work of the reorganised department is now in full operation. Requests for material or for facilities for research should be addressed to Dr. Leiper, or to the Secretary of the Society.

22. VISITORS TO THE GARDENS.—The total number of visitors to the gardens in 1919 was 1,515,042, the largest

23. WORKS.—Every effort was made by the Council to begin restoration of the buildings, enclosures and paths, expenditure having been reduced to the lowest possible margin during the war. In the earlier part of the year such work was limited to repairs and painting, but as soon as the state of the finances justified more expenditure, extensive operations were put in hand, and the reconstruction of the Gardens planned in 1913 and 1914, was begun. The second tunnel, more necessary than ever with the increase of visitors, was the first large work to be set going, and will be completed this year. The elephant walk has been doubled in width, and the Fellows' lawn has been carried through the site of the Old Bear's Terrace, the greater part of which has been removed. The open space in front of the Monkey House has been carried

eastwards to meet the enlarged elephant ride, and a convenient path for the riding camels, and the llamacarriages has been formed. The path in front of the Lemur-house in the north garden is being supported by ferro-concrete piles. The Mappin Terrace Pavilion, incomplete when the war broke out, has been decorated, and a new lavatory for ladies has been placed under the Terrace. The ladies' lavatory at the Eastern Aviary has been rebuilt and enlarged accommodation for female school children provided. An extensive programme of repairs and painting has been carried out all over the Gardens.

24. GARDENERS' DEPARTMENT.—Mr. Young, the headgardener, was even more successful than usual, and the floral display he maintained throughout the season was in itself a special attraction to visitors.

25. BAND.—The "Comrades of the Great War" Headquarters Band performed in the Gardens on Saturdays and Sundays from May 31st to August 31st. There is no evidence that the performances increased the actual number of visitors, but they appear to have been much appreciated by the Fellows and the public, and it is proposed to continue them this season.

26. REFRESHMENT DEPARTMENT.—The Accounts have been audited, as usual, by Messrs. Edward Moore & Sons. The gross profit amounted, after feeding the Staff, to £20,532 11s. 10d. The working expenses for the same period amounted to £8,599 18s. 2d., leaving a trading profit of £11,932 13s. 8d. After making the usual allowances for rent, depreciation, and licence duties, etc., and allotting the receipts from the lavatories on the same lines as last year, and deducting the Manager's salary and percentage, there was a net profit to the Society amounting to £6,768 18s. 8d. It was decided that £3,500 should be invested and added to the Refreshment Room Re-building Fund, which thus now amounts to over £10,000, and that the balance should be applied to improving the lavatory accommodation for ladies in the Gardens, and to completing and decorating the Mappin Terrace Pavilion.

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At the request of the Council, the Committee of Auditors appointed in February, 1919, held a special meeting to audit the accounts of the Refreshment Department. The results of their financial investigations are embodied in the accounts of the Society for 1919. They reported favourably on the business management of the Department. The Council appointed a Committee from its own body to discuss the catering arrangements with the manager in detail. After considering their report, the Council agreed that, in view of the special difficulties with regard to food and labour, the management of the department had been efficiently conducted. It was not expected that the situation would be much easier in 1920, but an endeavour was to be made to improve the quality and quantity of the provisions supplied to all classes of customers, although that would almost inevitably result in a considerable diminution in profits.

27. RATES OF ADMISSION TO THE GARDENS .- During the War officers and men in uniform, together with ladies and children whom they brought, were admitted to the Gardens on Sundays on payment of a shilling for each person. They were also admitted at sixpence each on week-days, and the price of admission for the general public was reduced to sixpence on Saturdays until the end of June, 1919.

From March 31st, 1920, the normal conditions were restored.

Admission to the Gardens on week-days is by payment of the usual rates or by ticket. On Sundays admission is absolutely limited to Fellows and the visitors they are entitled to bring with them or to whom they have given tickets, and to other ticket-holders.

28. MENAGERIE.—During the War the collection suffered chiefly because there were relatively few additions to replace the normal loss from death, and partly because when difficulties with regard to food increased it was thought right to dispose of, or to destroy, animals that could easily be replaced and that consumed food required by man or domestic stock. During 1919 it became possible to acquire new animals, and a number of important additions, including a hippopotamus, were made by purchase. Arrangements were made to bring home a collection of Indian animals, and a collection from Singapore, early in the current year. A collector is obtaining birds and marsupials for us in the Malay Archipelago, and is expected to return in August of this year.

ACCOUNTS.

29. RETIREMENT OF THE SOCIETY'S ACCOUNTANT.— Mr. John Barrow, the Society's Accountant, retired on December 31st, 1919, after 50 years' service. The Council granted him a pension at the rate of £300 a year. Mr. Barrow was well known to all Fellows who had any concern with the official business of the Society and was highly esteemed for his courteous manners and the conscientious and efficient discharge of his duties.

30. APPOINTMENT OF ACCOUNTANT.—Mr. F. W. Bond, Assistant Accountant, was appointed to succeed Mr. Barrow. He has been in the Society's Service since November 1903, except for the period when he was on Active Service during the war, and is already well acquainted with his duties. 31. STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1919 is issued to Fellows, bound with this report.

32. Assets 1918 AND 1919.—The Total Assets of the Society amounted to £111,350 7s. 8d., an increase of £16,698 8s. 7d. on the corresponding figures for 1918. The increase is due chiefly to the increased cash balance.

33. LIABILITIES 1918 AND 1919.—The cash and contingent liabilities amounted to $\pounds 23,595$ 12s. 0d., an increase of $\pounds 9,860$ 11s. 4d. on the corresponding figures for 1918, due chiefly to the amount reserved for contracts not completed.

34. BALANCE 1918 AND 1919.—The balance, a surplus of assets over liabilities, amounted to $\pm 87,754$ 15s. 8d., an increase of $\pm 6,837$ 17s. 3d. over the corresponding figure for 1918, and representing the difference between the increase in assets (paragraph 32) and increase in liabilities (paragraph 33).

35. INCOME 1918 AND 1919.—There was a very large increase in the income for 1919, due chiefly to increase in the numbers of visitors to the gardens.

36. EXPENDITURE 1918 AND 1919.—As soon as the increasing receipts justified it, the Council began the necessary restoration of the gardens and increased the purchases of animals. The general lowering in the purchasing power of money greatly increased the cost of provisions and of materials. It was also necessary to increase the remuneration of the staff. The war bonus granted to the menagerie gardeners and works' staff and to the junior clerical assistants was increased to £1 a week in the case of adults, and ten shillings a week for those under 18 years, and was made a permanent addition to the pre-war rate of wages. In the case of the higher officials, an increase of approximately one-third of their former salaries was granted, after confirmation at a monthly meeting of the Society.

37. GENERAL STATE OF THE FINANCES.—The Council look forward with confidence to the future prosperity of the Society. The policy they adopted in August 1914 of cutting down the expenditure to the barest requirements for maintenance has justified itself. The Society has come through the war without having to employ its reserves, and was thus able to begin restoration as soon as the income began to increase.

38. The Council wishes to acknowledge the assistance received during the past year from the members of the Committee of Publication, upon whom devolved, in accordance with the Bye-laws, the arrangement and supervision of the Society's Scientific Publications.



REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF AUDITORS OF THE ACCOUNTS

OF THE

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY

OF LONDON,

APPOINTED JANUARY 21st, 1920.

The Committee of Auditors of the Zoological Society of London, appointed on 21st January, 1920, submit to the Society the annexed Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1919.

We have pleasure in reporting that we have examined the Statement of Accounts of the Society at 31st December, 1919, with the books of the Society, that we have verified the balances in the Bankers' hands and that in our opinion the Balance Sheet exhibits a correct view of the general state of the Funds of the Society according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us and as shewn by the Books of the Society.

The Accounts for the year have been audited in detail by Mr. W. B. Keen, Chartered Accountant, and his certificate is appended thereto. The Accounts of the Refreshment Department for the year ended 27th September, 1919, have been separately audited by Messrs. Edward Moore and Sons, and submitted to the Committee of Auditors, appointed on 15th January, 1919, and the results are incorporated in the Accounts now submitted.

It will be seen that the excess of Expenditure over Income has been $\pm 1,377$ 10s. 4d., which is arrived at after creating Reserves amounting to $\pm 16,678$ 18s. 8d. in respect of various works, etc., and transferring to the Refreshment Room Rebuilding Fund the sum of $\pm 3,500$, which Fund now stands at $\pm 10,562$ 17s. 8d. There is also charged ± 302 15s. 4d., Interest on Loan from the Bankers for the new buildings, which Loan has been reduced this year by $\pm 2,000$, leaving a balance of $\pm 7,000$ still outstanding, for which the Bankers hold security.

The Old Composition Fund not separately invested has been reduced by the transfer of ± 150 to Income and Expenditure Account in accordance with the usual practice, while the New Composition Fund has been increased by Composition Fees received amounting to $\pm 1,020$. This Fund now stands at $\pm 9,495$ and is separately invested, the Income therefrom being carried to the Income and Expenditure Account.

which appear among the Assets in the Balance Sheet at the cost price of £24,652 17s. 8d., were at 31st December, 1919, of the value of £21,732 7s. 2d., shewing a depreciation of £2,920 10s. 6d. The sum of £2,192 10s. 10d. had been provided to meet depreciation to 31st December, 1916, and a further sum of £727 19s. 8d. has now been set aside, bringing the Reserve up to £2,920 10s. 6d.


