for the year 1907.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Seventy-ninth Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Wednesday, April 29th, 1908. The Chair will be taken at 4 p.m. at the Rooms of the Society 2 Hanguage Square

PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

(By-Laws, Chapter VII., Sections 1, 2, as amended August 18th, 1904.)

- 7. To receive the report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

SCIENTIFIC WORK OF THE SOCIETY.

According to the terms of the Charter, the Society exists not only for "the introduction of new and curious subjects of the Animal Kingdom," but for the "advancement of Zoology and Animal Physiology." In addition to maintaining the Gardens for the education, study, and pleasure of those interested in Zoology, the Society takes a share in the advancement of knowledge in more direct modes. At its evening Scientific Meetings interesting zoological specimens are exhibited, and communications are read, giving the results of the zoological investigations of a large

number of scientific men at home and abroad, the more important of these being published in the 'Proceedings' and 'Transactions.' By its support of the annual 'Record of Zoological Literature' (now incorporated for a provisional period of five years with the zoological portion of the 'International Catalogue of Scientific Literature'), it provides Zoologists with an invaluable aid to their work. The library of the Society is so useful to Zoologists that several have become Fellows with no other object than to take advantage of it. Through the Prosectorial Department at the Gardens, scientific use is made of the bodies of animals that have died. Of these, many go to enrich the collections in museums; others are used for anatomical study, whilst others are preserved to provide material for further research. Recent investigations have shown that parasites play a special rôle in the transmission of many diseases, and in the last three years great attention has been paid to the collection and examination of the rich material at the Gardens. The Pathological Department has the primary function of supplying information that may be useful in raising the general health of the animals at the Gardens and in detecting preventable causes of death, but it is hoped that it may help also in the scientific study of disease.

From time to time the Society has aided the work of zoological exploration either by direct grants of money or by the publication of the results of such investigations.

The zoological exploration of Eastern Asia, which the President has been good enough to undertake in order to further the scientific interest of the Society, has been continued during the past year with considerable success. Mr. Malcolm Anderson, His Grace's collector, has visited the northern islands of Japan—Saghalien and Hokkaido— Korea and the interesting intermediate island of Tsushima, and has now begun work on the Chinese area by a visit to the Shantung Peninsula. From these various localities he has sent a number of insects, reptiles, and birds, but his main work has been with mammals, which at the present time are far the least known, and offer the largest field both for the discovery of novelties and for the more accurate study of geographical distribution, and of the faunistic relation to each other of the different islands and countries concerned. The material

obtained by Mr. Anderson is most carefully and admirably prepared, and the magnificent series of perfect skulls enable conclusions to be reached which were quite unattainable on such material as can be obtained by the ordinary methods.

No such survey has been attempted in Eastern Asia before, its only parallels being those which have been conducted in America by the government authorities there, and in South Africa by the British Museum, with the equally generous help of Mr. C. D. Rudd.

SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.

To the thirteen meetings for the despatch of scientific business held in the Society's Rooms in Hanover Square in 1907, 99 communications were made. Of these, 78 were from Fellows and 3 from Corresponding Members. The remaining 18 papers were from individuals not belonging to the Society, and were communicated to it by the Secretary or by other Fellows. The corresponding number of communications in the year 1906 was 120.

These communications were submitted to the Committee of Publication, by which 70 were ordered to be printed in the 'Proceedings,' and 3 in the 'Transactions,' such illustrations being in each case allowed as the Committee considered necessary for the purpose. Of the remaining communications, abstracts or extracts were considered to be sufficient for publication.

Publications.

Abstract.

Since January, 1904, the Society has published on the Tuesday following the date of each Scientific Meeting an Abstract of the Proceedings. It is issued, free of charge to all Fellows who subscribe to the Publications, along with the 'Proceedings'; but it may be obtained on the day of publication at the price of Sixpence, or, if desired, it will be sent post-free for the sum of Six shillings per annum, payable in advance.

The Abstract contains no matter that will not be published afterwards in the Proceedings, but is convenient as a more rapid means of publishing new anatomical facts, or the descriptions of new species, and it announces, where-ever possible, the communications to be made at the next Scientific Meeting.

Proceedings.

As announced in the Report for 1900, the 'Proceedings' of the year are now issued in two volumes, each of which contains two parts. Beginning with 1906, the two volumes have consecutive pagination throughout, so that the complete reference to any memoir is now as follows:—

The Council regret to record the death of Mr. George A. Doubleday, who had been in the service of the Society for twenty-four years, first as clerk in the Library, and afterwards as publication clerk in special charge of the 'Proceedings' and 'Transactions.' Mr. Doubleday was a most careful and accurate sub-editor, and the late and present Secretaries of the Society, as well as the authors of memoirs published by the Society, owe much to him. On account of his early death and of serious domestic misfortune, the three children of Mr. Doubleday were left without provision. The Council inaugurated a fund on their behalf, to which a contribution of £100 was made from the funds of the Society, and which now amounts to over £200.

Zoological Record.

The 43rd. volume of the 'Zoological Record' (which contains a summary of the work done by Zoologists all over the world in 1906) is the first volume under the scheme of provisional amalgamation with the zoological portion of the 'International Catalogue of Scientific Literature,' already announced in the Reports for 1905 and 1906. The Editor, Dr. David Sharp, F.R.S., F.Z.S., and his staff of recorders had considerable additional difficulties in the first year of the new arrangement, with the result that the volume was later in appearance than usual. The Divisions relating to Protozoa, Cælenterata, Porifera, Protochordata, Vertebrata (General), Pisces, Reptilia and Batrachia, and Mammalia were issued in December 1907, and the remaining portions at intervals since then. It is not anticipated that

these difficulties will recur, and the complete volume for

1907 ought to appear about the end of 1908.

The most obvious difference between the old volumes and the new is that the latter is printed in double columns, in accordance with an international agreement. It is expected that the combined systems of the Record and Catalogue will secure a more complete record of the literature than has been obtained hitherto, and that, when the difficulties of the amalgamation have been overcome, much greater efficiency will be attained.

Fellows of the Society, learned Societies and Institutions, and members of the former Zoological Record Association, who subscribe through the Zoological Society, will receive the present and future volumes of the 'Record' on the same terms and in the same binding as heretofore—that is to say, at a subscription price of 30s. per annum, the subscription being due on the first of July each year.

The complete Volume consists of separately paged Divisions. These may be obtained singly, in paper

covers, stitched and lettered.

Garden Guide.

The 'Official Guide to the Society's Gardens,' written by the present Secretary, consists of 112 pages, with 50 illustrations, a Plan of the Gardens, and a Railway and Street Map showing modes of access from different parts of London. The Guide is printed by Messrs. Bradbury, Agnew and Co.; it is published by the Society at the Offices, 3, Hanover Square, and sold there and at the Gardens at the price of sixpence in paper covers, or one shilling bound in art-cloth cover. The copyright and the profits of sale belong to the Society. 1903, when the first edition was published, 172,306 copies have been sold. The sixth edition, with many new illustrations, and a section specially devoted to the fauna of Australia and New Zealand, in connection with the exhibition of animals from these regions (see p. 29), will appear early this summer.

Postcards.

The edition of uncoloured Pictorial Postcards of the animals was sold out, making a total sale of over 327,000 of these in the last four years. A new series is in preparation. Of the series of 12 Coloured Postcards, arranged for early in 1907, 66,526 were sold in the course of the year.

The profit to the Society on the sale of Guides and

Postcards amounts to about £800 per annum.

LIBRARY.

The Library, under the superintendence of Mr. F. H. Waterhouse, the Society's Librarian, was maintained in good order throughout the year, and has been much resorted to by working naturalists. Altogether 2,150 visits were paid to it by Fellows and persons introduced by them. About 1,850 volumes were borrowed from it under the usual regulations.

PROSECTORIAL DEPARTMENT.

The work in this Department has been carried on actively. In the course of the year, Dr. C. G. Seligmann, F.Z.S., the Society's Pathologist, resigned his post in order to take up an appointment abroad. During his tenure of the office, in addition to making a large number of postmortem examinations, for report to the Prosectorial and Garden Committees, Dr. Seligmann conducted an extensive series of investigations into tuberculosis, the results of which have added considerably to the knowledge of this difficult subject. In succession to Dr. Seligmann, the Council have been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. H. G. Plimmer, M.R.C.S., F.R.M.S., F.Z.S., a pathologist of high standing. They have, in addition, arranged with Messrs. Sewell & Cousens to act as Honorary Consulting Veterinary Surgeons to the Gardens, and these gentlemen, in addition to attending specially a number of cases in the Gardens, have reported monthly to the Garden Committee on the general health of the animals.

The Prosector of the Society, Mr. F. E. Beddard, M.A., F.R.S., reports as follows:—

The work carried out in the Prosectorium may be considered, as in former reports, under four heads, viz., (1.) Anatomical Research carried on in the Laboratory. (2.) Material supplied for purposes of Research or to Museums. (3.) Preservation of Material for future use. (4.) Information given to various persons upon Zoological matters.

(1.) Research carried out in the Prosectorium.

The anatomical work has been, as in former years, chiefly carried out by the Prosector, who has also given facilities to other persons to conduct researches in the Laboratory. Dr. G. Seccombe-Hett, F.Z.S., has devoted some time to the investigation of the tonsils and certain points in the musculature of the Mammalia, and Dr. L. W. Sambon, F.Z.S, has made a large collection of parasites, some of which have proved to be new forms and will be shortly described. The Prosector has dissected more than 100 species of animals which have died in the Gardens during the year belonging to all the orders of

vertebrated animals, and has also, through the kindness of friends and correspondents, been able to compare the structure of some of these with species not represented in the Society's collection. The results of these studies have been communicated to the Scientific Meetings of the Society in a series of papers dealing with Mammals, Reptiles and Batrachians. The amount of the work published during the year will bear favourable comparison with that accomplished in other zoological laboratories.

(2.) Material supplied for purpose of Research or to Museums.

Reference has been already made to material supplied to two gentlemen who have worked in the Prosectorium during the past year. In addition to the material supplied to them the Prosector has provided Dr. Arthur Keith, F.R.C.S., F.Z.S., with a series of hearts to assist his investigations into the structure of that organ. Material has also been supplied to the British Museum, to the Royal College of Surgeons, and to the Bristol Museum.

(3.) Preservation of Material for future use.

The amount of material which passes through the hands of the Prosector is frequently too great for immediate use for anatomical purposes. A certain number of specimens are therefore preserved for future use. During the past year the viscera of several animals and a series of ovaries and oviducts are among the more important specimens that have been thus reserved for study. A number of skins and skulls of Carnivora Lemurs and Apes have been also added to the reference collection of such preparations.

(4.) Information given to various Persons upon Zoological matters.

The Prosector has answered verbally or by letter numerous questions relating to Zoology, and has examined and reported upon various specimens submitted to him for identification. Several memoirs upon Oligochaeta published in the "Proceedings" are based upon such material.

Mr. H. G. Plimmer, the Society's Pathologist, reports as follows:—

I began work at the Gardens in November, 1907, so that only an outline of the work that has been done during the two remaining months of the year can be Examinations have been made of the largest possible number of animals, and especial attention has been given to diseases caused by parasites, and, therefore, theoretically preventable. During November and December 290 animals died and of these 210 have been examined. Of these 127 died of diseases due to parasites—either bacteria, protozoa, or worms. The blood of every animal has been examined, and worms have been very carefully looked for, with a view of determining their particular incidence and effects, and further, if possible, of determining eventually whether anything could be done to destroy these particular parasites, the effects of which, I think, have been underrated.

Notification has been given of animals dying of infectious diseases so that proper disinfection of their cages should be carried out, which has been done. In consequence of representations made to the Garden Committee of the insanitary condition of the structure of the Western Aviary, this has been reconstructed and put into a much better sanitary condition, and it is hoped that a lessened mortality amongst the birds in this Aviary will demonstrate the usefulness of the alterations.

Dr. Louis W. Sambon, F.Z.S., and Dr. Albert Wilson, F.Z.S., have been working in the Pathological Laboratory.

THE GARDENS, REGENT'S PARK.

EXTENSION OF GROUND.

In 1826, when the Gardens were first established, a grant of twenty acres, held on annual agreement, was made by the Crown Authorities. This land lay on both sides of the Outer Circle, corresponding roughly with the existing Middle and South Gardens, but only the portion to the south of the Circle was laid out. In 1829 the tunnel was constructed so as to make possible actual occupation of the land on the north of the Circle. In 1834 an additional plot of ten acres on the south-west border of the Gardens was

obtained at an annual rental on the condition that it was to be used only as pasturage. In 1839 use of land north of the Regent's Canal, corresponding to the existing North Garden, was granted. In 1841 the ground in the occupation of the Society was re-arranged; the strip on the north bank of the canal was surrendered, and a portion at the east end of the Middle Garden was exchanged for a corresponding area at the west end, and permission was given to extend the works over the ten acres granted in 1834. In 1869 the land on the north bank of the canal was again taken over by the Society at an annual rental. A considerable portion of the North Garden, however, was not made use of until after 1903, in which year the present policy of increasing the open-air facilities for the animals was put into active operation. As stated in the Report for 1906, complete use of the North Garden was not possible until in that year H.M. Commissioners of Works gave the Society a right of way over two small unoccupied portions of ground, and agreed to allow the New Bridge to be constructed so that it formed a second means of communication between the North and Middle Gardens. In 1907, H.M. Commissioners of Works, to whom and in particular to the First Commissioner, the Right Hon. L. V. Harcourt, P.C., M.P., F.Z.S., the Council desire to record the thanks of the Society, granted a still greater boon, namely, the use on an annual agreement of a strip of ground along the south-west boundary of the South Garden, and ending in a large triangular area, at the west end, the greater part of which had hitherto been occupied only as a service yard in connection with Regent's Park. The new ground has an area of over three acres, all with an excellent exposure. The Council agreed with the Office of Works that the animals to be placed along the greater length of the new area should be freely visible to the public in Regent's Park. The whole of the new ground has been fenced in, but can be made complete use of only as funds permit. The Council decided to undertake first the laying out of the portion which is to be freely visible from the Park. This work was begun towards the end of 1907, and it is expected that before the Annual Meeting in 1908 it will have been completed, and Cassowaries, Deer, Antelopes, Llamas, Sheep and Emus will be on the new ground.

AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND COLLECTION.

In the 'Report' for 1906 the Council expressed the hope that the great success of the Prince of Wales' Indian Collection might lead to the formation of similar collections from other parts of the Empire. It was decided to arrange for a special exhibition of animals from Australia and New Zealand on the Prince of Wales' ground in the North Garden in the summer of 1908. The negotiations for this object were so successful that the Council sent Mr. Seth-Smith, one of their members, to Australia in December 1907, to complete the arrangements and to return in charge of the collection, whilst early in 1908 two keepers in charge of a number of animals for purposes of exchange proceeded to Sydney, to return with the collection. The Governments of New South Wales and of New Zealand are forming collections for presentation to the Society, and the Zoological Gardens of Perth, West Australia, and Melbourne, and many private and public persons in Australia are taking an active interest in the enterprise. The Council have every reason to believe that the exhibition will be of unusual zoological interest. The animals are expected to arrive in this country towards the end of June.

NEW WORKS AND REPAIRS.

NORTH GARDEN.

Northern Pheasantry.—This old building was out of alignment with adjacent buildings. Leave was obtained to move it backwards, so as to widen the path on the south side, and the opportunity was taken to reconstruct the whole, to re-wire the runs, and to fill them up with clean rubble and fresh soil.

Crane Paddocks and Bustard Enclosure.—Some of these paddocks were enlarged and shrubs planted to form wind screens. One of them was fitted up for the Spanish bustards presented by Mr. W. J. Buck, C.M.Z.S., and a suitable shelter was erected.

Works Department.—The old works' shed and Clerk of the Works' office, at the east end of the North Gardens were demolished and the site cleared.

MIDDLE GARDEN.

Works Department.—Accommodation to replace the old erections mentioned in the last paragraph has been provided in the yard behind the Giraffe House.

ELEPHANTS' HOUSE.—A new cement floor was laid in the store-room, and the muniment room in the loft was cleaned and repaired.

HIPPOPOTAMUS HOUSE.—Additional coils of hot-water piping were laid on to the tank, and a tortoise-stove was provided so as to raise the temperature for the young hippopotamuses.

Canal Bank Aviary for Parrots.—The whole of the wirework was repainted.

Punjab Sheep yards.—New railings were placed round these.

SOUTH GARDEN.

REPTILE House.—It was found necessary to re-roof this building.

SMALL BIRDS' HOUSE.—This was completed.

ANTELOPE HOUSE.—New ventilators were fitted.

KITES' AVIARY.—A new set of large open-air flights was erected.

Goose and Duck Paddocks.—These were re-fenced and re-arranged.

DEER AND CATTLE House.—The doors between the stables and the yards were fitted with ropes and pulleys, so that the keeper can open and close them from the passage.

SMALL MAMMALS' House.—Three long sky-lights were made in the roof to improve the lighting of the building.

Eastern Aviary.—Open windows were cut in the partition walls between the heated inner chambers and the outer unheated compartments, to improve the ventilation as had been done in the Western Aviary.

Fellows' Tea Pavilion.—This was cleaned and re-painted and a considerable extension of the Fellows' Garden was laid out behind the Pavilion Pond.

LLAMA House.—A new six-foot fence was made round the yards attached to this house, and a double railing was placed to protect these irritable animals from being teased by visitors.

Gulls' Aviary.--This was re-painted.

Ostrich Paddocks.—In two of these the old soil was dug out and replaced by brick rubble and burnt clay. The other yards are to be treated similarly so as to replace completely the contaminated soil.

Refreshment Rooms.—Extensive painting, cleaning and general repairs were carried out before Easter.

Prosectorium and Pathological Laboratory.—These were cleaned, painted and repaired and considerable improvements made in the *post mortem* room.

TELEPHONE SHELTER.—In accordance with an arrangement made with the General Post Office, a shelter was provided for a public telephone call-box near the Bears' Dens.

Tunnel Wall.—One side of the retaining brick-wall of the north approach to the Tunnel had to be taken down and rebuilt.

Bharal Sheep Yard.—The old rock-work was restored and improved by Messrs. Harpham so as to harmonize with the rock-wall of the adjacent Sea Lions' Pond.

New Ground.—Considerable progress was made with fencing in and laying out the new ground on the south boundary of the Gardens.

FIRE PROTECTION.—Hand fire extinguishers were placed in all the houses where there was any possible danger from fire.

Destruction of Rats.—In addition to regular trapping, two extensive applications of a rat-virus were made. Like similar applications made in 1906 with similar viruses prepared by other manufacturers, there was no visible success. It is probable that unless a simultaneous attack could be made in Regent's Park and along the canal, such methods would have little chance of success, as the abundant supply of food in our gardens is a constant attraction to rats from outside our boundaries.

Gardening Department.—Under the capable superintendence of Mr. Young, the Society's Head Gardener, the high character of our floral display was well maintained, and a large amount of planting and of laying out was performed.

NEW WORKS IN PROGRESS.

The laying out of the new ground from the Reptile House to the Gulls' Aviary, with the erection of fencing and shelters, and the formation of new walks, will be the most important new works of 1908, the greater part of which will be completed by the Annual General Meeting. The Wolves' Dens are being practically reconstructed, additional covered runs being provided. The remainder of the new ground will be fenced in and a boundary hedge planted, but it is probable that the state of the finances will not permit of any further important works in 1908.

The permanent Works' Staff was reduced in course of the year and some of the work put out to contract.

The Council carefully considered the responsibilities of the Society under the new Workmen's Compensation Act, and after receiving proposals from various Insurance Societies, decided that, for the present, the Society should carry its own liability. A small sum is to be put every year to a special reserve account to form the nucleus of a fund to meet any unusual contingencies.

VISITORS.

Notwithstanding the unfavourable weather experienced during the past Summer, the total number of Visitors to the Society's Gardens during the year 1907 amounted to no less than 863,953, showing a decrease of only 32,470 Visitors as compared with the year 1906. Upon reference to the table of Visitors on p. 35, it will be seen that the year 1907 ranks as the third best year, as regards the attendance of Visitors, since the foundation of the Society. This fact, together with the increase of Visitors on shilling days, as well as on the day reserved for Fellows, points to the increasing popularity of the Society's Gardens. The following table summarises the different classes of Visitors to the Society's Gardens during the last two years.

Of the total number of visitors in 1907, no less than 139,072 were admitted on Sundays, showing an increase

of 5,817 as compared with the year 1906.

The total number of visitors admitted upon the three principal Bank Holidays in 1907 amounted to 97,880, a decrease of 8,844 as compared with the corresponding holidays of the previous year.

There is an increase in some of the quantities as compared with those in 1906. The increase in quantity of straw and dry fodder is due to the addition of 27 animals (asses, sheep and deer), at the North Bank (a new station); also to a number of additional animals at the new Cattle Sheds, to Hippopotamuses at the Giraffe House, and young Rhinoceroses at the Elephant House. The increase in the supply of fruit is due to additional animals at the Squirrels' House, and to the increase in the number of birds at the Western Aviary and New Bird House.

There is an increase in the supply of lettuce caused by extra animals at the Squirrels' House, and for the better feeding of birds at the Pheasantry and Duck Ponds.

The beef supplied was in lieu of horse-flesh, healthy horses at the time being unobtainable. The increase in the supplies in every case has been officially made with the knowledge and sanction of the Superintendent.

GENERAL CONDITION OF THE ANIMALS.

Although the year was not favourable from the point of view of weather, the general health of the collection was good. The new heating and ventilating system in the Monkey House has proved successful, and the fine condition of the Birds of Paradise and other tropical birds in the Small Birds' House forecasts a useful future for that House. The birth of a young giraffe, the first for many years, was a most welcome event, and the calf, a female, is doing extremely well. The grey squirrels and crested doves, at liberty in the Gardens, appear to be establishing themselves there and in Regent's Park. It was considered wise to abandon the experiment of setting kites at liberty, lest they should alarm the doves and prevent them settling in the Gardens. The Open Air Aviary for Parrots continues to be successful, and last year a pair of Cockatoos bred in it. The breeding of the Avocets and Redshanks in the Wading Birds' Aviary was another interesting event.

STATE OF THE FINANCES.

Young, Mr. H. N. 1 Patas Guenon.

The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1907 is issued to Fellows, bound at the end of this Report. In 1905, the Auditors, acting on the advice of Mr. W. B. Keen, Chartered Accountant, the professional Auditor of the Society, issued their Report on the finances of 1904 in a new form, replacing the old statement of Assets and Liabilities by a formal Balance Sheet, and the old statement of Receipts and Payments within the year by a proper dissection of Income and Expenditure belonging to the year. The Auditors of the Accounts of the year 1906, after discussion of the principles involved, continued the new system, and the same course has been followed this year by the Auditors dealing with the Accounts for 1907.

The total sum actually received within the year was £37,307. 6s. 8d. On January 1st, 1907, the overdraft from 1906, amounting to £4,968. 0s. 1d. (i.e., Banker's overdraft, £5,073. 11s. 1d., less £105. 11s. 0d. cash in hand), was paid off, leaving £32,339. 6s. 7d. net receipts. In accordance with the decision of the Council, announced

in last year's Report, not to treat the compositions of new Fellows as income, the sum of £810, representing the amounts paid by 18 new compounders, was placed to the new composition account, leaving a sum of £31,529. 6s. 7d. for the purposes of the year. The money paid out amounted to £33,253. 11s. 4d., leaving a deficit at the end of the year amounting to £1,724. 4s. 9d. (= Banker's overdraft, £1,826. 9s. 3d., less £102. 4s. 6d. cash in hand on December 31st, 1907). The overdraft at the Bankers has thus been reduced in the course of the year by the sum of £3,247. 1s. 10d.

Of the sum placed to the New Composition Account $(\pm 945 = \pm 135 \text{ from } 1906 + \pm 810 \text{ from the current year})$ $\pm 855 \text{ was actually invested in the course of the year, and } \pm 90 \text{ received in the end of December, } 1907, \text{ carried } 1907 \text{ carried } 190$

forward to be invested in 1908.

The Society has moreover a sum of £25 placed to the credit of a Workmen's Liability Account, the nucleus of a fund to meet any unusual emergency arising under the new Act.

The Committee of Auditors of the Zoological Society of London (with the assistance of the professional Auditor, who has certified the whole of the accounts in detail) having examined the books and accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1907, submit to the Society an abstract of the accounts, together with an estimate of the assets and liabilities at the close of the year.

It will be seen that the excess of ordinary income over ordinary expenditure has been £6,894. 8s. 1d., while there has been an extraordinary expenditure of £1,576. 8s. 9d. The Bank overdraft has been decreased by £3,247. 1s. 10d., namely, from £5,073. 11s. 1d. to £1,826. 9s. 3d., and the amount owing to sundry creditors has been reduced by £744. 19s. 0d., and now amounts to £1,386. 10s. 5d. The composition fees of new Fellows received during the year have been invested, so that the amount placed to the New Composition Fund is now £945.
