for the year 1908.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

AND

SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING.

THE Eightieth Annual General Meeting of the Society will be held on Thursday, April 29th, 1909. The Chair will be taken at 4 p.m. at the Rooms of the Society, 3, Hanover Square.

When the Minutes have been read, the Meeting will at once adjourn to the Theatre, Burlington House (entrance in Burlington Gardens), by permission of the First Commissioner of H.M. Works. PROCEDURE AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

(By-Laws, Chapter VII., Sections 1 and 2, as amended August 18th, 1904.)

SECT. I. Notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting shall be advertised by the Council in four or more of the public Newspapers, at least fourteen days before the same shall take place.

SECT. II. The course of proceeding at the Annual General Meeting, after the Chair has been taken, shall be as follows :---

- 6. Discussion of the Council's Annual Report.
- 7. To receive the report of the Scrutineers on the result of the Ballot.

No other business shall be transacted at such Meeting.

STATE OF THE ROLL OF MEMBERS.

Fellows.

The number of Fellows and Fellows Elect on the 1st of January, 1908, was 4,040.

During the year 238 Fellows were elected or readmitted, whilst 177 died or otherwise ceased to be Fellows, the net addition to the roll for the year being 61; the total number on the roll on January 1st, 1909, thus reached 4,101, the largest in the history of the Society. Foreign and Corresponding Members.

The elections of Foreign and Corresponding Members were not made until January, 1909, and so do not come into this Report.

PRESENTATION OF THE SOCIETY'S SILVER MEDALS.

On October 17th, 1907, but accidentally omitted from the Annual Report of that year, the Society's Silver Medal was awarded to Adam White Guthrie, Esq., F.Z.S., for a series of valuable donations of South African animals.

On June 18th, 1908, the Society's Silver Medal was awarded to D. Seth-Smith, Esq., F.Z.S., for his services in making and bringing home the Society's collection of Australian Fauna.

On July 16th, 1908, the Society's Silver Medal was awarded to Sir William Ingram, Bart., F.Z.S., for his gifts of Birds-of-Paradise to the Society's collection.

SCIENTIFIC WORK OF THE SOCIETY.

According to the terms of the Charter, the Society exists not only for "the introduction of new and curious subjects of the Animal Kingdom," but for the "advancement of Zoology and Animal Physiology." In addition to maintaining the Gardens for the education, study and pleasure of those interested in Zoology, the Society takes a share in the advancement of knowledge in more direct modes. The Evening Scientific Meetings have continued to be fairly well attended and many important contributions to zoological science have been communicated to them. It is to be noted, however, that there is an increasing tendency at this, as at other learned societies, for the more serious and technical communications to be read only in title, or in the form of short abstract, frequently in the absence of their authors, as such papers cannot be adequately discussed until they have been published.

The Annual "Record of Zoological Literature" has

gained in stability by its association with the International Catalogue, and the Society has been able to increase the remuneration of the Recorders for their arduous work.

The Library of the Society has continued to be of great service to Zoologists, and the number of books that have been borrowed by post has considerably increased. The Council has opened negotiations which have been favourably received, with the Councils of the Royal, Geological, and Linnæan Societies, with the object of arranging that all periodicals containing Zoological Literature may be consulted in London by a Fellow of any of these Societies.

The Anatomical and Pathological work in the research laboratories at the Prosectorium has been actively prosecuted, and the Council has arranged for better accommodation for these purposes.

From time to time the Society has aided the work of zoological exploration, either by direct grants of money, or by the publication of the results of such investigations.

The important zoological exploration of Eastern Asia, carried on by the generosity of the President, has been continued into the past year with ever increasing success. Having finished the Japanese Islands and Korea, Mr. Malcolm Anderson, His Grace's collector, has made expeditions on the Mongolian Plateau to the northwest of Pekin, and to various places in the Provinces of Chih-li, Shen-si, and Shan-si, regions in which no systematic exploration had previously been made.

Mr. Anderson's main attention has been devoted to the smaller Mammalia, which at the present time offer the greatest field for the discovery of new forms and for the more accurate study of geographical zoology; but he has in addition obtained considerable series of birds, reptiles, fishes and insects. Many new species, mostly mammals, have been discovered, while exact observations have been made on the distribution, relationships, and habits of the older known forms.

The total number of Aves procured in Japan, Korea and Northern China, by the Duke of Bedford's collector, Mr. M. P. Anderson, amounted in all to 902 specimens. Though the majority of these belong to well-known species, this collection is a very valuable and welcome addition to the series of Palæarctic birds in the British Museum, both on account of the excellent way in which the specimens have been prepared and the care with which all useful particulars have been recorded on the label of each individual. Two species appear to be new to science and, curiously enough, both of these are Nuthatches. One, *Sitta corea*, inhabits S. Korea, while the second, *S. bedfordi*, is confined to the Island of Quelpar. (Cnf. W. R. Ogilvie-Grant, Bull. B.O.C. xvi., p. 87, and xxiii., p. 59.)

The Council has made a grant of £150 to aid in the zoological exploration of British Honduras. Mr. W. K. Pomeroy, F.Z.S., who had already considerable acquaintance with that country, has thus been able to take with him Mr. G. C. Shortridge, an experienced collector. Considerable assistance has been promised by the British Authorities, and it is hoped that when the expedition returns in the early summer of 1909, in addition to specimens for museum work, a number of living birds will be brought to the Gardens.

An important expedition has been arranged by another Society to explore the Charles Louis Mountains in New Guinea. The Council has arranged in conjunction with Sir William Ingram, Bart., F.Z.S., to make a grant to this expedition, and to obtain in return living birds and mammals for exhibition in the Society's gardens.

The Society has decided to publish as a separate volume of the 'Transactions,' the zoological results of the expedition to Mount Ruwenzori, made under the leadership of Mr. R. B. Woosnam. It has also been arranged that the Society should publish in the 'Proceedings' portions of the results obtained by the Committee that is investigating grouse-disease.

SCIENTIFIC MEETINGS.

To the thirteen meetings for scientific business held in the Society's Rooms in Hanover Square in 1908, 95 communications were made. Of these, 84 were from Fellows and 2 from Corresponding Members. The remaining 9 papers were from individuals not belonging to the Society, and were communicated to it by the Secretary or by other Fellows. The corresponding number of communications in the year 1907 was 99.

These communications were submitted to the Committee of Publication, by which 62 were ordered to be printed in the 'Proceedings,' and 1 in the 'Transactions,' such illustrations being in each case allowed as the Committee considered necessary for the purpose. Of the remaining communications, abstracts or extracts were considered to be sufficient for publication.

PUBLICATIONS.

Abstract.

Since January, 1904, the Society has published on the Tuesday following the date of each Scientific Meeting an Abstract of the Proceedings. It is issued, free of charge to all Fellows who subscribe to the Publications, along with the 'Proceedings'; but it may be obtained on the day of publication at the price of Sixpence, or, if desired, it will be sent post-free for the sum of Six shillings per annum, payable in advance.

The Abstract contains no matter that will not be published afterwards in the Proceedings, but is convenient as a more rapid means of publishing new anatomical facts, or the descriptions of new species, and it announces, whenever possible, the communications to be made at the next Scientific Meeting.

Proceedings.

As announced in the Report for 1900, the 'Proceedings' of the year are now issued in two volumes, each of which contains two parts. Beginning with 1906, the two volumes have consecutive pagination throughout, so that the complete reference to any memoir is now as follows :---P.Z.S., 190 , p.

The Reports will form volume XIX. of the 'Transactions,' and will be illustrated with 23 coloured plates, 1 black plate, and 16 text-figures.

The work of the late Mr. George A. Doubleday, publication clerk, has been transferred to Mr. Henry Peavot, who has been appointed Assistant Librarian, with special charge of the Society's scientific publications.

Zoological Record.

The 44th Volume of the 'Zoological Record' (which contains a List of Titles and Subject and Systematic Indices of the work published by zoologists all over the world in 1907) is the second volume under the scheme of provisional amalgamation with the zoological portion of the 'International Catalogue of Scientific Literature' announced in the Reports for 1905 and 1906. Many of the difficulties incidental to the amalgamation of volumes prepared on different systems have now been overcome, and the Editor, Dr. David Sharp, F.R.S., F.Z.S., and his staff of recorders were able to finish their work much earlier than last year. The division relating to Protozoa was published in November, 1908, those relating to Porifera, Cælenterata, Arachnida, Pisces, Reptilia and Batrachia, Mammalia, and the general sections Arthropoda and Vertebrata were published in December, 1908, the remaining divisions in January, 1909, whilst the complete volume was issued to subscribers on January 26th, 1909.

The amalgamation has been recognized in Europe and America as an important step in international co-operation, and it is hoped that it may lead the way to consolidation of numerous other independent scientific bibliographies and year-books, so preventing great waste of energy and money.

Fellows of the Society, learned Societies and Institutions, and members of the former Zoological Record Association, who subscribe through the Zoological Society, will receive the present and future volumes of the 'Record' on the same terms and in the same binding as heretofore that is to say, at a subscription price of 30s. per annum, the subscription being due on the first of July each year.

The complete Volume consists of separately paged Divisions. These may be obtained singly, in paper covers, stitched and lettered.

Garden Guide.

The 'Official Guide to the Society's Gardens,' written by the present Secretary, consists of 112 pages, with 50 illustrations, a Plan of the Gardens, and a Railway and Street Map showing modes of access from different parts of London. The Guide is printed by Messrs. Bradbury, Agnew and Co.; it is published by the Society at the Offices, 3, Hanover Square, and sold there and at the Gardens at the price of sixpence in paper covers. The copyright and the profits of sale belong to the Society. Since 1903, when the first edition was published, 216,299 copies have been sold. A seventh edition, with many new illustrations, will appear early this summer.

Postcards.

Although there was a large sale of Postcards it was less than in 1907, and it seems probable that no increase in revenue is to be expected from this source. Of the series of twelve coloured Postcards, 47,334 were sold, making a total of 113,860 of this edition. Of a new series of uncoloured cards, 20,510 were sold.

The profit to the Society on the sale of Guides and Postcards amounts to about £800 per annum.

LIBRARY.

The Library, under the superintendence of Mr. F. H. Waterhouse, the Society's Librarian, was maintained in good order throughout the year, and has been much resorted to by working naturalists. Altogether 2,200 visits were paid to it by Fellows and persons introduced by them. About 2,050 volumes were borrowed from it under the usual regulations.

PROSECTORIAL DEPARTMENT.

The work in this Department has been carried on actively. The Prosector, whose report is annexed, has made a number of valuable contributions to the Society's Scientific Proceedings, and has been able to assist many individual scientific workers and institutions. The Pathologist has made *post mortem* examinations of the great majority of the animals that have died in the course of the year. Careful records of these examinations are preserved and these, in course of time, will form an invaluable series of data for the study of comparative pathology. A summary of the Pathologist's work was read at a Scientific Meeting in February, 1909, and will be published in the Society's 'Proceedings.' He has also furnished useful practical information to the Superintendent and the Garden Committee.

The Prosector of the Society, Mr. F. E. Beddard, M.A., F.R.S., reports as follows :---

The work carried out in the Prosectorium during the year has been, as in former years, mainly zoological, anatomical and pathological research. The pathological work is reported on separately. The Prosector has also given information to various persons either verbally or by letter upon zoological matters. It will be convenient to classify the zoological work done during the year under the following headings: viz., (1) Research carried out in the Prosectorium. (2) Material supplied for purposes of research or to Museums. (3) Preservation of material for future use. (4) Information given to various persons upon Zoological matters.

(1.) Research carried out in the Prosectorium.

During the year the Prosector has dissected more or

less fully according to the necessity of each case 268 animals, of which 138 are mammals, 102 birds, and 28 reptiles or batrachians. This amounts to nearly onesixth of the total deaths of the year, so that a very large proportion of the animals which have died in the Gardens have been utilised for anatomical purposes. This has not interfered with their subsequent utilisation for pathological purposes by the Society's Pathologist. The information gained by these dissections has formed the chief part of the material for a series of communications to the scientific meetings of the Society, which are published in the 'Proceedings.' During the year the four parts of the 'Proceedings' which appeared contain nine papers by the Prosector amounting to 191 pages of text, and which are illustrated by 67 figures in the text. This forms a considerable proportion of the 'Proceedings,' and the work published will bear comparison with that accomplished in other scientific institutions.

(2.) Material supplied for the purposes of Research or to Museums.

Dr. G. Seccombe-Hett, F.Z.S., has continued to use the laboratory for his investigations into the anatomy of the tonsils. Material has been supplied to him as well as to Mr. E. Nettleship, F.Z.S. The Royal College of Surgeons has acquired a number of anatomical specimens from the laboratory, and a few specimens have been sent to the British Museum and to the Bristol Museum.

(3.) Preservation of material for future use.

The Prosectorium contains a small collection of material preserved with alcohol and formol, which is extremely useful for anatomical research, chiefly for purposes of reference. It is desirable to extend this collection, and during the past year some additions to it have been made, but, as the space is limited, the additions have not been very A number of skins and skulls of mammals large. which have died during the year have also been kept.

(4.) Information given to various persons upon Zoological matters.

The Prosector receives during the year a certain number of letters and personal visits of enquiry upon Zoological matters. These have been attended to, and a record is kept in the Prosector's Diary. Some specimens have also been forwarded for identification. Among the more important of these were some aquatic Oligochætous worms from a well near Cambridge, sent by Dr. S. F.

Harmer, F.R.S., F.Z.S., now Keeper of Zoology in the British Museum, which proved to belong to the genus *Phreatothrix*, hitherto unrecorded from Great Britain, and apparently belonging to a new species of that genus. A short description of the worm was published in the 'Proceedings.' Dr. W. A. Cunnington, F.Z.S., and Mr. C. L. Boulenger, F.Z.S., sent some aquatic Oligochaeta from Lake Birkit el Qurun, which were identified as a species known from various parts of Europe.

The Society's Pathologist, Mr. H. G. Plimmer, M.R.C.S., F.R.M.S., reports as follows :—

During the past year 1,737 animals have died, of which 1,089 have been examined. A detailed record of the examinations is kept at the Prosectorium, of which an abstract has been presented every month to the Prosectorial Committee; and a Paper, dealing analytically with the causes of death and mentioning the most important facts found, together with a lantern demonstration of micro-photographs of some of the pathological conditions and of some of the new parasitic organisms which have been found, was read at a Meeting on 2nd February, 1909, and will be published in the 'Proceedings.' The new material will be published as it becomes ready.

Notifications of a practical kind arising out of the examinations have been made from time to time, so that such alterations as are possible in the conditions under which the animals are placed have been carried out, as well as disinfection in cases where this has been necessary.

The necessity of having a quarantine house and a hospital has been urged on the Prosectorial Committee, and it is most probable that when these important additions to the Gardens can be carried out there will be a considerable reduction in the present mortality amongst the animals.

Dr. L. W. Sambon, F.Z.S., and Dr. Albert Wilson, F.Z.S., have been working during the year in the Pathological Laboratory, and two rare specimens have been presented to the Museum of the Royal College of Surgeons.

THE GARDENS, REGENT'S PARK.

AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND COLLECTION.

In the 'Report' for 1906 the Council expressed the hope that the great success of the Prince of Wales' Indian Collection might lead to the formation of similar collections from other parts of the Empire. It was decided to arrange for a special exhibition of animals from Australia and New Zealand on the Prince of Wales' ground in the North Garden in the summer of 1908. The preliminary negotiations for this were successful, and in December, 1907, Mr. David Seth-Smith, a member of Council, went to Australia to complete the arrangements and to return in charge of the collection. Early in 1908, J. Shelley, keeper, and H. Vinall, helper, proceeded to Australia in charge of a number of animals sent out from this Society to several of the Australian Gardens, and to return with Mr. Seth-Smith.

The collection left Australia early in April, 1908, by the White Star Liner 'Persic,' from Sydney for London, and the animals in the following list arrived at the Gardens on 9th June, 1908:—

* New to the Collection.

The greater part of the collection was placed on the Prince of Wales' Ground in the North Garden, and was exhibited partly in the new Reception Houses and partly in temporary enclosures and sheds. It was maintained as a separate exhibition until late in autumn, when a number of duplicates were disposed of by sale or exchange, and the remaining animals placed in their appropriate places in the general collection.

In connection with the Australian and New Zealand Collection, the Council desire to record the thanks of the Society to the Governments of New South Wales and New Zealand, the Acclimatisation Society of Western Australia, the Zoological Society of New South Wales, the Zoological Society of Victoria, to Mrs. Roberts, of Hobart, Tasmania (who has subsequently been elected a Corresponding Member of the Society); Mr. H. Burrell, Manilla, N.S.W.; Mr. G. S. Cook, N.S.W.; Mr. Falkiner, Boonooke Station, N.S.W.; Mr. F. Gibson; Mr. W. Murray, Wingham, N.S.W.; Mr. S. Newell, Melbourne; Mr. A. E. Ralston, K.C., Sydney; and Mr. W. H. L. White, Scone, N.S.W.

The Council also desire to record their thanks to Mr. David Seth-Smith, on whom the Silver Medal of the Society was conferred in acknowledgment of his valuable services. Gratuities were made to Shelley and Vinall, the keeper and helper from the Society's Gardens, in consideration of their diligence and success during the voyages to Australia and home.

The Australian and New Zealand Collection was of strictly zoological rather than of popular interest, and did not contain any animals that would naturally attract great attention. In the earlier part of the season, the Franco-British Exhibition was a formidable rival attraction, and it cannot be said that this collection was so successful as a public attraction as the Prince of Wales' Indian Collection in 1906. It made, however, a very important addition to the Society's collection, and it renewed friendly relations between this Society and kindred Societies in a distant part of the Empire. The Council have decided to continue their scheme of biennial exhibitions from different parts of the British Empire, and hope to arrange for the formation of a collection from South Africa to be exhibited at the Gardens in the summer of 1910.

Collection of Birds of Paradise.

In co-operation with Sir William Ingram, Bart., and with the kind assistance of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Society arranged for the formation of a Collection of Birds-of-Paradise. The collectors employed were Mr. W. Stalker and Mr. C. B. Horsbrugh, and these gentlemen were so successful that the Society was able to exhibit in the course of the summer sixty-one Birds-of-Paradise, belonging to eleven species. The Council desire to record the thanks of the Society to the Government of the Commonwealth, and to Sir William Ingram, Bart., who was elected an Honorary Life Fellow, and on whom the Society's Silver Medal was conferred in the course of the year.

Collection of Indian Cattle.

Owing to the generosity of the President, the Society received in May a collection of twenty-one Indian domestic cattle, containing magnificent examples of five distinct breeds.

NEW WORKS AND REPAIRS.

NORTH GARDEN.

RECEPTION HOUSES.-Although the Council had intended not to proceed with any large new building in the course of 1908, it was found advisable early in the year to replace the temporary sheds on the Prince of Wales' ground by more permanent structures. Accordingly two buildings, each about 121 feet long by 30 feet wide, were put in hand. Each building contains a service passage at the back, a number of covered wire-enclosed shelters for animals, communicating with open-air wire-enclosed runs. Accommodation for stores and keepers is provided, and one of the two buildings is heated by a hot-water system. The buildings were designed to be suitable for almost any kind of animal except those of great size. They were finished in time to house a great part of the Australian collection, and will be useful for similar collections in future. Their permanent purpose is, however, to serve as a kind of quarantine station, in which new arrivals to the Gardens may be placed, and kept under observation for some weeks before they are put in the general collection. New arrivals frequently require special attention, and not infrequently have introduced diseases into the Gardens.

CANAL BANK.—This was made up in terraces, supported by concrete piers and groins. The wire enclosures on the slope were repaired and put in thorough order, and a new enclosure with stone-work was made for the Rock-Wallabies.

INSECT-HOUSE.—This was cleaned and thoroughly repaired and painted within and without.

Owls' CAGES.—These were cleaned out and re-painted. MOUSE-HOUSE.—The old building, originally a Tortoise-House, and recently used as a Cranes' Winter-House, was restored, the heating system being made good, and was fitted with cages for small mammals such as mice, many of which for want of space had been put in the Insect-House.

HEAD GARDENER'S HOUSE.—This was repaired, the ceilings being white-washed and the kitchen walls distempered.

MIDDLE GARDEN.

CANAL-BANK.—A serious settlement of this bank took place behind the Service Yard and Giraffe-House. A series of deep pits were dug and filled with concrete; the surface drains were put in order, and the bank, flower-beds and paths were made up.

ELEPHANT-HOUSE.—A number of repairs chiefly to the brickwork were made.

HIPPOPOTAMUS-HOUSE.—The concrete floor between the large out-door tank and the house was repaired and relaid with cork-asphalte tiles. This material is much warmer and drier for the animals, and appears to wear well. The rain-water from the roofs of this house and of the adjoining Giraffe- and Zebra-Houses was diverted to form a soft-water supply for the Hippopotamus Tank.

SUPERINTENDENT'S HOUSE.—The ceilings were washed, and rooms and passages papered and painted.

DEER-SHEDS.—The doors, brickwork and floors have been cleaned and repaired, and the woodwork and ironwork repaired and tar-varnished.

BRUSH-TURKEYS' ENCLOSURE.—This has been cleaned and repaired, and the old netting replaced by wire netting.

CAGES OUTSIDE SQUIRREL-HOUSE.—These small cages have been thoroughly cleaned and restored and altered so as to make a smaller number of larger compartments.

KANGAROO-PADDOCK.-The wire-work fence has been repaired, cleaned and tar-varnished.

SOUTH GARDEN.

NEW GROUND.—The fencing of the extension of the Gardens granted in 1907 was completed early in the year 1908. The narrow strip extending from the ReptileHouse to the Swines' House was protected by a double fence consisting of a six-feet high unclimbable iron railing along the Park boundary and separated by a gangway from the inner retaining fence. This arrangement, as was hoped, has proved a sufficient protection both to the public in the Park and to our animals. The strip was divided into a series of paddocks, each with a shelter for the animals. The rock-work of the old Bharal Sheep Yard, which is nearly midway in this new ground, was greatly improved. According to the arrangement made with the First Commissioner of H.M. Works the paddocks in this strip have been laid out so that the animals placed in them are visible to the public in the Parks. This arrangement has been carefully observed, and appears to have been to the advantage both of the public and the Society. As the ground in these paddocks is undrained, it has been necessary to remove some of the animals during winter, but early in Spring they will be replaced.

The wider area of new ground, lying to the west of the South Garden, was granted to the Society without restriction. It has been fenced in, and a hedge planted inside the railings. Part of it has been used temporarily as a paddock for kangaroos and *Cereopsis* geese, but the development of this large area cannot be proceeded with until funds are available. A path has been made round it, but it will be thrown into open continuity with the South Garden by removal of the Swines' and Rodents' Houses and the Prosectorium as soon as the finances of the Society permit.

WOLVES' AND FOXES' DENS.—This old and sunless structure has been converted into a most useful building by important structural alterations. A service passage was formed through the old sleeping dens; new wooden sleeping boxes were placed in the old dens, and on the south side, exposed to the sun, a series of new wirecovered cages were constructed. The roof of the service passage and the new brick sleeping-dens were utilized as platforms on which the animals could lie, and apertures were formed by which the old dens and the new cages were put in free communication.

Section St

WESTERN AVIARY.—Owing to suggestions from the Pathologist, the floors in this building were taken up, and the extensive spaces lying under them, which were found to be filled with dust and organic refuse, were cleaned out and filled in. The compartments were cleaned and limewashed and the roof repaired.

MANDRILL'S CAGE.—The small cage outside the Monkey-House occupied by this fine animal was more than doubled in size.

MONKEY-HOUSE.—The glass in the roof was taken out and refixed on asbestos bedding.

APES' HOUSE.—The galvanized wire netting at the top of the cages was replaced by interlinked wire-netting, and one of the cages was sub-divided to make room for the two large orangs.

SEAL-POND PLATFORM.—The sloping front was replaced by concrete steps giving additional accommodation for visitors.

ANTELOPE-HOUSE.—New ventilators were placed, the top-lights were improved and the interior was cleaned, lime-washed and painted.

LION-HOUSE.—The woodwork of the windows and skylights was repaired and painted, and the ventilation of the service passage was improved.

Swans' Enclosures.—These were re-wired.

CATTLE-HOUSE.—The Cork-Asphalte Company agreed to lay down, free of cost, a flooring of cork-asphalte tiles in one of the compartments. The success of this material in the Cattle Sheds and the Hippopotamus Yard will lead to its increased use in the Gardens. It is not a cheap flooring, but it appears to be durable, and it is much warmer and drier than asphalte or concrete, and appears to be almost non-absorbent.

WADERS' AVIARY.—All the birds were removed from this during extensive cleaning and repairing. The sheds and wire-work were cleaned and tar-varnished; the pond was cleaned out, the shrubs thinned, and the very large population of mice practically exterminated.

EASTERN AVIARY.—The roof of the flight-cages was re-wired and all the iron-work and wire-work repaired and tar-varnished.

BARBARY SHEEP-YARD.-The shed and iron-work were repaired and tarred.

SMALL BIRDS' HOUSE.-The exterior, which had been painted too soon after its erection, was cleaned down and re-painted. The interior was cleaned and white-washed. The small cages were taken down in series and thoroughly disinfected, cleaned and re-painted. Some of the larger flight cages were sub-divided for the accommodation of the large collection of Birds-of-Paradise. Many of the small tropical birds in this house require artificial light by which to feed during the long hours of darkness in the English winter. To prevent too great disturbance and the ingress of cold air when the night-watchmen came in to light the gas early in the mornings, six new lights have been fixed with bye-passes and an arrangement of plugs and pneumatic tubing by which the lights can be turned on without entering the house.

HYÆNAS' AND BEARS' DENS.-The glass-work of the verandah has been renewed.

DIVING BIRDS' HOUSE.-The roof-lights have been repaired and new gear provided; the wire-work has been renewed.

OSTRICH-RUNS.-The old turf runs, which were in a sodden and unhealthy state, have been dug out and replaced by drained brick rubble covered with cinders.

Assistant Superintendent's House.-Three rooms and the passages have been papered and painted.

REFRESHMENT-DEPARTMENT.-Extensive repairs, renewals, cleaning and painting were carried out before Easter.

MAIN ENTRANCE. — The semi-circular area opposite this, used as a stand by private carriages and motor cars, was drained and made up.

MINOR WORKS.—A large number of minor repairs and improvements to buildings, enclosures and paths were done throughout the Gardens. Practically all the iron-work and wire-work throughout the Garden's was cleaned and tar-varnished. Formerly most of this was painted, and as three coats had to be put on, the process was costly and tedious. The use of tar-varnish will make it possible for most of this work to be done annually.

DESTRUCTOR.—With the active sympathy of the local Medical Officer of Health and the District-Surveyor, the Council attempted to dispose of the refuse of the Gardens by the use of a Destructor. It was found that however much care was used, the process was extremely costly and occasionally offensive. The use of the Destructor had to be discontinued, but better arrangements were made for the removal of refuse, which is now placed directly in vans and removed from the Gardens daily.

GARDENING DEPARTMENT.---Under the capable superintendence of Mr. John Young, the Society's Head Gardener, the high character of our floral display was well maintained, and a large amount of planting and of laying out was performed.

NEW WORKS IN PROGRESS.

The most pressing need at the Gardens is a House to serve as an Infirmary or Sanatorium to which sick animals may be removed from the disturbance of visitors, and from other animals. The Garden Committee were engaged on the plans for such a building throughout the greater part of 1908, and the Council sanctioned its construction early in the present year. The building is to be placed in the yard behind the Reptile-House, and there will be constructed at the same time an Operating Room, a Post-mortem Room, and a new Laboratory for anatomical and pathological work. A single heating station will supply these buildings, and at the same time effect a much-needed improvement in the heating of the Reptile- and Tortoise-Houses. The new Sanatorium together with the Reception House ought to provide means for great improvement in the health of the animals, and the new Post-mortem Room and Laboratories, besides giving the necessary increased accommodation for these purposes, will make it possible to clear the site which now blocks the way to the new ground. 'These works will make a heavy drain on the

resources of the Society for 1909, and will probably cause an increase in the deficit at the end of the year, so that it is impossible in the present state of the finances to proceed with the construction of better accommodation for the Bears, Lemurs, and Birds-of-Prey, all of which are urgently needed. In the meantime, besides the ordinary maintenance of the Buildings, some minor improvements are in hand. The clay is being dug out from the Cattle-yards and new Paddocks, and is being replaced by brick rubble and cinders; various alterations in fencing, to secure children more effectively from danger, are being made, but these are designed so as not to obstruct the view of visitors; improvements in the alignment of walks and enclosures are in progress; and the Out-door Flight Cages to the Small Birds' House are being extended for the Birds-of-Paradise.

The permanent staff, reduced in 1907, has been kept as low as possible, additional men being taken on for special jobs as required.

The Council, as reported last year, having carefully considered the responsibilities of the Society under the new Workmen's Compensation Act, and having received proposals from various Insurance Corporations, decided that the Society should carry its own liability. It was arranged to place £25 each year to a special reserve account towards a fund to meet any unusual contingencies. Fortunately there has been no occasion as yet to draw on this fund, and it is proposed to allow it to increase annually.

VISITORS.

Taking into consideration the many counter attractions in London last summer, the number of Visitors to the Society's Gardens was very satisfactory, and well above the average of the past five years. It will be seen from the statement following that the total number of visitors admitted amounted to 861,586. The decrease of 2,367 as compared with the previous year may be attributed to the smaller number of excursionists on the cheap days, as the actual receipts for admission at the gates exceeded those of the year 1907 by the sum of ± 117 . There was a considerable decrease in numbers and receipts until well on in the summer, and this was probably due to the great attraction of the Franco-British Exhibition. Later in the year, when foreign and country visitors became more numerous, our returns more than recovered the lost ground.

The number of Visitors paying at the turnstiles amounted to 597,521, showing a decrease of 4,663 as compared with the year 1907.

There was a marked increase in the number of children from Council and Grant-aided Schools admitted into the Society's Gardens under the recent system of cheap orders.

The total number of Sunday visitors during the year 1908 was 141,044, showing an increase of 1,972 as compared with the previous year.

NUMBER OF VISITORS ON BANK-HOLIDAYS.

The total number of visitors admitted upon the three

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principal Bank-Holidays in 1908 amounted to 92,666, a decrease of 5,214 as compared with the corresponding holidays of the previous year.

There was a marked increase in most of the quantities as compared with those in 1907.

The increase in the quantity of straw, fodder and grain was due to an addition of 27 animals in May, at the Cattle-Sheds. The increase in the quantity of fruit, vegetables, eggs, seed and biscuits was due to the addition to the Gardens of some 700 Animals, Birds and Reptiles forming the Australian collection in June. A further increase in fruit, principally grapes, was due to the addition of 25 Birds-of-Paradise in July, and a further addition of 27 in October. The beef was in lieu of horse-flesh, healthy horses suitable for use as food being frequently unobtainable. The increase in the supplies in every case has been officially made with the knowledge and sanction of the Superintendent.

GENERAL CONDITION OF THE ANIMALS.

The general health of the Collection has been good, and the Council hope that it will be further improved when the system of quarantine for new animals has become effective and when the new Sanatorium is in use. In the meantime closer attention is being given to ventilation, heating, disinfection and general cleanliness. The storage of food at the different houses has been revised, new safes and cutting-up boards have been provided, and the old iron food- and water-pans are being replaced by enamelled or earthenware dishes and troughs. The Council realize, however, that the number of stations and of animals has increased with recent additions to the Gardens, and that much remains to be done to bring the administration of the Gardens into a complete state of efficiency. A Special Committee of the Council has been at work for several months, and it is hoped that great improvements may result from this investigation.

STATE OF THE FINANCES.

The Report of the Auditors of the Accounts for 1908 is issued to Fellows, bound at the end of this Report. In 1905, the Auditors, acting on the advice of Mr. W. B. Keen, Chartered Accountant, the professional Auditor of the Society, issued their Report on the finances of 1904 in a new form, replacing the old statement of Assets and Liabilities by a formal Balance Sheet, and the old statement of Receipts and Payments within the year by a proper dissection of Income and Expenditure belonging to the year. The Auditors of the Accounts of the year 1906, after discussion of the principles involved, continued the new system, which has been followed since. As, however, some of the Fellows prefer a statement on the simple Receipts and Payments system, such information is given in the next paragraph.

The total sum actually received within the year was £37,346. 1s. 1d. On January 1st, 1908, the deficit from 1907, amounting to £1,724. 4s. 9d. (i.e., the Banker's overdraft of £1,826. 9s. 3d., less cash in hand £102. 4s. 6d.), was paid off, leaving £35,621. 16s. 4d. net receipts for the year. A further sum of £450 received from ten new compounders has also to be deducted from the year's receipts, this being no longer regarded as income, and has been separately invested in accordance with the policy of the Council settled on in 1906. As the result of these operations the amount of £35,171. 16s. 4d. was left available for the expenditure for the year. The payments in the year 1908 amounted to £36,504. 13s. 2d., so that the year closed with a deficit of $\pm 1,332$. 16s. 10d. (i.e., the Banker's overdraft of £1,381. 7s. 4d., less cash in hand £48. 10s. 6d.). The deficit has thus been reduced in the course of the year by the sum of $\pounds 391$. 7s. 11d.

The Composition Fund (not separately invested) on the liability side of the Balance Sheet is a liability that will decrease annually as the compositions of new com-pounders are separately invested, and as a proportion of the old fund, calculated as 15 years' purchase, is transferred to income each year. The increase of £2,316 on the Balance of Assets over Liabilities (General Purposes) represents actual improvement in the financial position of the Society. This increase is actually very much greater, as new buildings, and substantial improvements on old buildings have been paid for out of income, but owing to the tenure on which the Gardens are held, the capital value of the buildings and plant cannot be regarded technically as an asset.

The total income was slightly in excess of that for the year 1907. The admissions to the Gardens showed an actual increase of £117; this is specially satisfactory as at the end of July there was an actual decrease of £633, probably due to the special attraction of the Franco-British Exhibition. The decrease, however, was more than made up when the country visitors arrived in the holiday months. There is also a steady increase in the income from Fellows' subscriptions, although a smaller number of new Fellows was elected.

The increase in 'salaries at the Gardens' is due to an

increase in the number of the menagerie staff. With the increasing number of buildings and enclosures, and the efforts that are being made to give greater attention to the animals, it is probable that the expenditure on garden staff will continue to increase. It was found necessary to pay more than in 1907 for a satisfactory Band. The increase in cost of publications was deliberate; as the prosperity of the Society is growing, it is possible to spend a little more on the publication of scientific work.

CONCLUSION.

The Council can again congratulate the Fellows on the prosperous condition of the Society. The number of Fellows and the income from Fellows' subscriptions has increased, although the rate of increase was not so great as in 1907. The surplus of income over expenditure was large, and a considerable sum was invested. The overdraft was reduced, and could have been altogether wiped out if the Council had not decided that it was advisable at once to proceed with the erection of the new Reception House and Quarantine Station.
